# What's in your Book Bag?

- 1. Using the attached chart, fill in information pertaining to the story elements listed from the book that you chose. You may use lists, bullet points, or abbreviations as needed so you can fit your information in the box. Be short and sweet. If you need more space you can always write on the back of a separate sheet of paper.
- 2. For each element, choose an object to represent it. For example: if I were reading The Three Little Pigs, I might choose a stuffed pig as the object to represent my characters. Or, perhaps if the character is strong, you may choose a rock to represent her.

If there is more than one character, setting, problem, event, etc. you can choose one object to represent all of them or you may choose just one character or one setting to represent with an object.

- 3. Give a reason as to why you chose each item.
- 4. Collect the objects (may be household items, things you already own, things you draw or make yourself—all will be returned and money need not be spent!) and place them in a bag of your choice (brown bag, grocery bag, cloth bag, cinch sack...any type!) The type of bag could also represent your story, too!

You will use the items in your bag to retell the story to the class when we return to school.

Be creative! You can get as imaginative as you wish in choosing your objects as long as there is a good explanation for why you picked it! Have fun with it!

# 4<sup>th</sup> Grade Summer Math

Summer vacation is a time for fun, rest, and relaxation, but it is also time to keep your mind sharp, especially when it comes to math skills, so you are ready to go in 4<sup>th</sup> grade next school year!

I am asking you to complete <u>500 minutes</u> of math activities this summer. These can be completed by participating in any of the following activities and then logging your minutes and the type of activity on the attached log. You may certainly complete more than 500 minutes!

The minutes you put into these math activities will go toward your first math grade of the year. Here is how I will grade it:

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500-460 minutes = A
459-410 minutes = B
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409-350 minutes = C

349-320 minutes = D

< 320 minutes = F

There are many options to choose from, but your log must reflect that you tried each of these activities <u>at least 2 times</u>.
