5 MINUTE DROP OFF ZONE / LOADING ZONE

It has been brought to the school's attention that some of our parents are parking, and leaving their cars, in Belmont High School's "5 min Drop Off Zone" which is located outside our administration building in Rotherham Street.

Please note that parking is not allowed in this area. City of Greater Geelong Parking Officers have indicated that they are aware that vehicles are being parked there and left unattended. They will be monitoring the parking situation there on a regular basis and issuing fines to anyone who breaches those parking conditions.



There is clear signage indicating that it is a "5 minute Drop Off Zone" in the mornings and then this area becomes a Loading Zone during the school day. There is no reason for anyone to park there unless they are stopping to pick up or drop off Belmont High School students.

CONTINUING WITH A LANGUAGE STUDY

It is often not really understood that there is considerable evidence to suggest that learning another language can enhance literacy in a student's first language.

At the core of Languages learning is the development of communication skills, both written and oral. The development of all these skills prepares students for success in all subject areas and later life. Second language proficiency opens career opportunities for students that wouldn't otherwise exist.

In response to a rapidly changing global marketplace, all economically-developed countries now recognize the importance of a highly skilled, multilingual workforce. Students with good language skills enhance their future career prospects and opportunities in fields such as aid agency work, business services, engineering, finance services, government and public administration, health, hospitality, marketing, media and journalism, technology, and travel and tourism.

Second language proficiency is also valuable to students for a range of personal reasons. Overseas travel, participation in exchange programs, and worldwide communication via the internet are increasingly part of students' lives. The pleasure and value of these activities can be significantly enhanced by being able to talk to the people you are mixing with.

Additionally, for students who carry a language study into Year 12, the VCE assessing authority 'scale up' study scores for each language. This in effect means that students gain additional points on their ATAR score at the end of year 12.

To further enhance the languages program at Belmont we have sister schools in northern Italy and on Lombok, Indonesia. This enables our students to study overseas for periods of time, as well as to host students from the country of their study. Further information about these opportunities is available from language staff.

LIMITING SCREEN TIME YIELDS MULTIPLE BENEFITS

The amount of time young people spend on computers, iphones and watching television is an issue often raised by parents with teachers and Principals. Management and control of this is often difficult for parents but the evidence appears overwhelming about the benefits of 'stepping in'.

Parents may not always see it, but efforts to limit their children's screen time can make a difference. A new study, published in *JAMA Paediatrics*, found children get more sleep, do better in school, behave better and see other health benefits when parents limit content and the amount of time their children spend on the computer or in front of the TV.

EDUCATION MAINTENANCE ALLOWANCE

Applications for the second instalment of EMA must be submitted to the school by the due date: 1 August 2014

Please note: you only need to make a second application if your child changes schools between March and August, of if you did not receive the first instalment of EMA and have since become eligible.

The Pension Concession Card (PCC) or Health Care Card (HCC) is subject to electronic confirmation with Centrelink to verify that the cardholder is receiving a benefit.

To be eligible for the EMA:

- Your child must be under the age of sixteen; and
- Your child must be enrolled at a primary or secondary Government or registered school in Victoria on, 28 February 2014 for the first instalment and 1 August 2014 for the second instalment; and

You must on 28 January 2014 for the first instalment and 14 July 2014, for the second instalment:

- be a parent or legal guardian of the student; and
- be an eligible beneficiary within the meaning of the State Concessions Act 2004, that is, be a holder of Veterans Affairs Gold Card or be an eligible Health Care Card (HCC) or Pensioner Concession Card (PCC) holder or
- be a temporary foster parent.

Belmont High School will be hosting some students from Italy who are expected to arrive start of Term 3 2014 for 8 weeks. The 12 girls and boys are 16 years old. As they will be attending school we need to organise homestay arrangements now

Homestay requires that the girls and boys are cared for by your family and take part in normal family activities during the weekends. The goals for the program are both cultural and language.

As a part of the program there is a reimbursement of \$240 per week per student for the homestay family. These students must have their own bedroom, be provided with 3 meals per day and laundry of their clothing.

This is a wonderful opportunity to host an overseas student for a short period of time with mutual benefit for the visiting student and the host family. This would be a beneficial experience for Belmont High students who study Italian as a language.



Health does NOT qualify students as dentists and is NOT a pathway to the **Doctor of Dental Surgery** at the University of Melbourne. It is a 3-year degree with four main components: clinical and preventative dentistry, dental and health sciences, social sciences and health promotion, and vocational clinical practice. Oral health allows graduates to practice as an oral health therapist, a dental hygienist or a dental therapist. WHAT CAN I DO WITH A PUBLIC HEALTH AND HEALTH PROMOTION DEGREE? Public health and health promotion combine a range of activities directed at improving the health of people in the population. Some well-known activities include those run by organisations such as SunSmart, TAC, and QUIT. Public health seeks to understand and act on the social and environmental factors that cause poor health, with the factors that create and sustain good health. Those suited to this occupation have good communication and negotiation skills, can relate to people from different backgrounds and are able to work as part of a team. Graduates work for government, health agencies, community services, universities, aid and not-for-profit organisations. Suitable courses are Deakin University B. Public Health and Health Promotion, La Trobe B. Health Promotion, Monash B. Health Promotion, Swinburne B. Health Science (Public and Environmental Health), and ACU B. Applied Public Health. ATARs required range from around 55 to around 75. Pre-requisites vary from university to university.

SO YOU WANT TO GET INTO A TRADE? Thinking of being a plumber, carpenter, electrician, motor mechanic, refrigeration mechanic, tiler, brick layer, auto electrician, lift mechanic, or one of many other trades people? Most students think first of being a **carpenter**, **an electrician or a plumber**. However, there are so many others to choose from. Apprenticeships generally take four years, but, if an apprentice is competent, they may be able to complete sooner. Plumbing and electrical apprenticeships take four years.

Employers often look for three things in an applicant: Year 12 completion (VCE or VCAL), being 18 with a driving licence and vehicle, and completion of a pre-apprenticeship course. Pre-apprenticeships can be completed in about four of five months at TAFE (after finishing school) or sometimes while at school. Finding an employer can be a challenge. Suggestions are to try family contacts, sporting club contacts, letting people know that an apprenticeship is being sought. Alternatively, Group Training Organisations can often assist.
