

Please read the first weekend in Lent

To: Clergy, Religious and Laity of the Archdiocese of New Orleans

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ:

As we begin our Lenten journey this year, I assure you of my prayerful support. Through prayer, fasting and almsgiving may each of us grow in a deeper relationship with Christ and experience the conversion of mind and heart to which he calls us.

On Ash Wednesday, we initiated two new pastoral programs in the Archdiocese of New Orleans. I ask for your support in prayer and through action.

First, we will sponsor a program called "Catholics Come Home." Through T.V. ads and other media we are inviting inactive Catholics to return to our family. You will also have the opportunity to send me confidentially the name of someone who is inactive. I will write and invite them to become an active member of our Catholic family. Please join me in praying for those away from the Church. Hopefully we all will become the voice and heart of Christ to welcome them home.

Secondly, this Lent we will pray for peace in our community using a new prayer calling for the intercession of Our Lady of Prompt Succor at every Mass celebrated in the Archdiocese of New Orleans. This prayer will be said immediately before the final blessing to ask God to use us to rid our society of murder, violence and racism. We won the Battle of New Orleans in 1815; this new battle can be won by prayer and by acts of charity.

Multiple murders have become part of our daily experience in this local Church. We must focus again on God's commandment, "Thou shalt not KILL." Jesus gives the commandment: Love one another; forgive your enemies. We are called to be the peacemakers of our time and we share this responsibility.

Please join me in asking God's blessing on these new pastoral programs as we begin our 40 day Lenten journey.

LENT AND EASTER REGULATIONS

The Lent and Easter regulations as published in the Archdiocesan Policies book are reproduced below for your convenience and use during Lent and the Easter Triduum.

ASH WEDNESDAY

BLESSING AND DISTRIBUTUTION OF ASHES

The blessing and imposition of ashes takes place only on Ash Wednesday, ordinarily during the celebration of the Eucharist. The Sacramentary contains the Rite for the Blessing of Ashes within Mass. The Order for the Blessing and Distribution of Ashes outside of Mass is found in the *Book of Blessings*. If the Eucharist is not celebrated, the blessing and distribution is to take place within the celebration of the Liturgy of the Word. The minister for the blessing of ashes within the Mass is a bishop or priest. The minister for the blessing of ashes during a service of the word is a bishop, priest or deacon. Other persons may be associated with the bishop or priest or deacon in the imposition of ashes: e.g. extraordinary ministers of holy communion, and other lay persons, when there is a true pastoral need. These persons do no, however, bless the ashes. Special ministers of communion may bring blessed ashes to the sick and those confined to their home. If a minister is not available, a member of the family or another person may bring blessed ashes to a shut-in, using one of the formulas in the Sacramentary to impose the ashes.

LENT AND EASTER REGULATIONS

A DISTINCTION IS TO BE MADE BETWEEN Lent and the Easter Triduum. Strictly speaking, Lent ends with the beginning of the Triduum on Holy Thursday, The Ordo notes: "L:ent runs from Ash Wednesday until the Mass of the Lord's Supper of Holy Thursday.

Fasting is to be observed on Ash Wednesday by all Catholics who are 18 years of age but not yet 59. Those who are bound to fast may take only one full meal. Two smaller meals are permitted if necessary to maintain strength according to each one's needs, but eating solid foods between meals is not permitted. Abstinence from meat is to be observed by all Catholics 14 years or older on Ash Wednesday ad on all Fridays of Lent. The determination of certain days as obligatory days of penance should not be understood as limiting the occasions for Christian penance. the Spirit of the reason of Lent should be maintained throughout the weeks of Lent. The obligation to observe penitential days of the Church is serious. Failure to observe individual days of penance is not necessarily considered serious. No one should be scrupulous in this regard. People should seek to do more rather than less, since fast and abstinence on the days prescribed should be considered a minimal response to the Lord's call to penance and conversion of life.

THE PASCHAL FAST

All Catholics of the appropriate age (see above) are to fast and abstain on Good Friday. The Second Vatican Council observed "Let the paschal fast be kept sacred. Let it be celebrated everywhere on Good Friday and, where possible, prolonged throughout Holy Saturday, so that the joys of the Sunday of the Resurrection may be attended with uplifted and clear mind."

EASTER VIGIL

TIME FOR THE CELEBRATION OF THE EASTER VIGIL

The Roman missal states that the entire celebration of the Easter vigil takes place at night. The Vigil is not to begin before nightfall and is to end before daybreak on Easter Sunday. No Mass may precede the Easter Vigil. The <u>Circular Letter Concerning the Preparation and Celebration of the Easter Vigil</u>, ISSUED BY THE Congregation for Divine Worship in 1988 notes that the very concept of the vigil has almost come to be forgotten in some places with the result that it is celebrated as if it were an evening Mass, in the same way and at the same time as the Mass celebrated on Saturday evening in anticiptio0n of the Sunday. The <u>Circular Letter</u> repeats the norm of the Roman Missal and adds that "this rule is to be taken according to its strictest sense". Pastors are reminded that daylight savings time this year will begin at 2:00 a.m. on Sunday, March 13, which is the First Sunday of Lent. This year, 2011, the Vigil will take place during Central Daylight Savings Time. The United States Weather Service states that on Holy Saturday, April 23, 2011, the sun will set at 7:32 p.m. Central Daylight Time. The Easter Vigil liturgy may not begin before 8:00 p.m. Central Daylight Time.

WEDDINGS, BAPTISMS, AND FUNERALS

Weddings may not be celebrated on Sundays, during the Easter Triduum, or on Holy Saturday after the Vigil.

BAPTISMS

The Sacramentary states that baptism is one of the four parts of the Easter Vigil, "When new members are reborn as the day of resurrection approaches." Te RCIA is geared and planned for the reception of the sacraments of initiation at the Vigil. The *Rite of Baptism of Children* states: "To bring out the Pascal character of baptism, it is recommended that the sacrament be celebrated during the Easter Vigil or on Sunday when the Church commemorates the Lord's resurrection." The Ordo recommends that the celebration of the sacrament of baptism be deferred, in the spirit of Lent, until Easter Vigil or Easter season.

Funerals may be celebrated on Holy Thursday Good Friday, and Holy Saturday, but n within the context of Mass. The Eucharist may not be celebrated or distributed at a funeral on these days.

IMPORTANT REMINDERS FROM LITURGICAL DOCUMENTS

FROM THE RITE OF PENANCE: The season of Lent is most appropriate for celebrating the sacrament of penance. Already on Ash Wednesday the people of God has heard the solemn

invitation "Turn away from sin and believe in the good news." It is therefore fitting to have several penitential celebrations during Lent, so that all the faithful may have an opportunity to be reconciled with God ad their neighbor and so be able to celebrate the paschal mystery in the Easter Triduum with renewed hearts. (13) *The Rite of Penance ritual book contains two sample Lenten penitential services*.

FROM THE GENERAL INSTRUCTION OF THE ROMAN MISSAL:

Moderation should be observed in the decoration of the altar. . . . During Lent it is forbidden for the altar to be decorated with flowers. Laetare Sunday (Fourth Sunday of Lent), solemnities and feasts are exceptions.

In Lent the playing of the organ and musical instruments is allowed only to support the singing. Exceptions are Laetare Sunday (the Fourth Sunday of Lent), solemnities, and feasts (313).

FROM SING TO THE LORD:

During the season of Lent, alternate acclamations [to the *Alleluia*] with their proper verse are used, as found in the *Lectionary for Mass* (or, when there is only one reading before the Gospel, the Psalm alone may be used). The Gospel Acclamation may be omitted when it is not sung. (163)

Although it is not necessary to sing a recessional hymn, when it is a custom, all may join in a hymn or song after the dismissal. . . At times, e.g., if there has been a song after Communion, it may be appropriate to choose an option other than a congregational song for the recessional. Other options include a choral or instrumental piece or, particularly during Lent, silence. (199)


