A few of your PFLAG Portland Board Members have expiring terms of service though I am happy to report that each has agreed to continue to volunteer. PFLAG Portland has been hard at work! As we close the books on another successful year, I'd like to give you an update on some of our recent activities.

We had another very successful year of grant-making through our PFLAG Portland Mini-Grant program. We were able to extend a total of 6 grants this year to very worthy organizations: The Sunnyside Environmental School, Portland State University's Queer Resource Center, Benson High School and Franklin High School's

"I think people were surprised that somebody who's Phillipina could be gay.." says Remie who shares how challenging it is to come out as lesbian in Philippine culture.

PFLAG National and PFLAG Portland celebrated today's victory at the United States Supreme Court, striking down both Section Three of the so-called Defense of Marriage Act (DOMA) as unconstitutional, and Proposition 8 on standing, which means the restoration of marriage equality to the state of California. But there is still much work to do. Oregon United for Marriage will mount a challenge to Constitutional Amendment 36 – restricting marriage to one man and one woman – in 2014. Gay/Straight Alliances, the Sexual and Gender Minority Youth Resource Center, and the Student Alliance Project. If you are not familiar with the Student Alliance Project, it is an amazing, youth-led organization whose mission is to inspire youth to realize their power individually and collectively though mentoring programs with the goal of encouraging these young people to become tomorrow's social justice leaders. Our gift - the last of this year's grant cycle - went specifically to help support their 5 week Summer Leadership Camp.

In other recent PFLAG Portland news, Joyce Liljeholm, PFLAG Portland Board Member, and I just wrapped up a three year project to assist in changing the culture of the Beaverton School District (BSD) in their goal to be inclusive of their LGBTQ students. Along with our colleagues at Basic Rights Oregon and OGALLA (the Oregon Gay and Lesbian Law Association), our efforts resulted in some very tangible changes to the District including the development of a screening tool to survey school physical environments for their welcoming appeal to LGBTQ youth, youth of color and those living in poverty. The BSD also adopted a new policy which includes, "sexual orientation, gender identity and gender expression." As a Beaverton parent, I can only say that the changes have been stunning, much needed, and very welcome.

Portland PFLAG Board members the Rev. Paul Davis and Mark Weinsoft are hard at work, helping to form the nation's second Gay/Straight Alliance chorus patented after the only such chorus in the country, Seattle's Diverse Harmony. The mission of Diverse Harmony is to "... use our passion and the power of music to inspire all to (continued on page 3)

Joyce Liljeholm: Queer Hero NW

Joyce Liljeholm, PFLAG board member, was honored as one the Queer Heroes Northwest for 2013 by Q Center and the Gay & Lesbian Archives of the Pacific Northwest

(GLAPN). The organizations announce a Queer Hero (or ally) for each day in June as part of their celebration of Pride, and Heroes profiles become permanent parts of the websites of both groups.

Joyce's passion for youth advocacy turned into a statewide effort when she helped found Oregon Safe Schools and Communities (OSSCC) in 2001. OSSCC



resulted from Joyce's lead in organizing a state department funded workshop to better meet the needs of sexual minority youth. As the workshop pointed up the serious need for more work, OSSCC was formed.

As an OSSCC Board Director, she helped organize the first Oregon Safe Schools Training in 2002 for teams of youth and adults to meet the needs of LQBTQ youth. She then helped organize the Oregon Gay-Straight Network and assisted students to put on the first GSA Summit in 2006.

Joyce was a regular visitor in Salem as she lobbied for the Oregon Equality Act (2007), to prohibit discrimination based on sexual orientation and gender identity in education and other areas, and the more recent Safe Schools Act (2009).

Joyce works with the Community of Welcoming Congregations to make faith communities welcoming to LGBTQ individuals. She has served as a board member of Gay, Lesbian Straight Education Network of Oregon, Portland Parents, Families & Friends of Lesbians and Gays and served on the City of Portland Sexual Minority Roundtable.
