ROLES & RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE ASSISTANT GOVERNOR 2011-2012 DISTRICT 7750

1. To understand the Rotary structure at the club, district, and international levels.
2. To promote the themes, goals, and events of the district, RI, and the Rotary Foundation.
3. To develop future district leaders. You are in a position to inquire about and meet potential district committee members and DG candidates in the clubs. This information should be shared with the DG and DGE.
4. To promote and attend AG training sessions, PETS, District Conference, Foundation dinner and other district training and fellowship events (see planning calendar).
5. To visit each club in your area regularly with a minimum of one visit per quarter.
6. To communicate with your Club Presidents on a monthly basis to determine the status of progress on their goals and objectives. Suggest practical solutions to problems that challenge the club.
7. To assist each club in completing the “Planning Guide for Effective Rotary Clubs” and forward a copy to the DG by June 11, 2011.
8. To help clubs plan for the District Governor’s visit. Participate in all DG visits within your area.
9. To encourage clubs to submit articles and pictures to the governor’s newsletter.
10. To make quarterly status reports to the DG taking notice of your area club’s strengths and weaknesses.
11. To complete “Memo of Club Visit” after your final visit to the club and submit it to the DG by June 1, 2012.
12. To encourage Club Assemblies and attend them as often as possible.
13. To encourage and assist clubs in achieving Gold Club Status.
14. Most importantly, *be available and approachable*. Visit clubs regularly. Communicate regularly with clubs via e-mail, telephone, or mail. Provide club leaders with the opportunity to give feedback about the quality of your assistance and support of their club.



Assistant Governor Budget Rotary Year 2011-2012

Effective July 1, 2011 each Assistant Governor in District 7750 is eligible for \$500 to be used for the following items:

- Mileage at the rate of 51 cents per mile to attend club meetings and district functions (rate subject to change)
- Promoting and recruiting of new members (receptions, featured speakers, marketing material, etc.)
- Providing food for monthly meetings with Presidents

The district has also budgeted funds for AG's to attend Carolinas' PETS in Greensboro, NC – mileage (please keep odometer readings for mileage), registration, hotel room (double occupancy).

All Assistant Governors are expected to attend District Conference and the Foundation dinner at their own expense.

It would be helpful if you would think through your year and prepare a preliminary budget to be submitted to District Treasurer Bobby Elrod. Expense reports will need to be submitted to Bobby Elrod with receipts attached.

RI President Kalyan Banerjee 2011-2012



Kalyan Banerjee, a member of the Rotary Club of Vapi, Gujarat, India, since 1972, is the selection of the Nominating Committee for President of Rotary International in 2011-12. Banerjee will become the president-nominee on 1 October if there are no challenging candidates.

Banerjee said he would like to see Rotary "blossom from being the world's most recognized service organization to being the most important NGO [nongovernmental organization] in the world.

"Rotary, it is said, has the strength of a government and the tenderness of a parent," he added.

Banerjee is a director of United Phosphorus Limited, the largest agrochemical manufacturer in India, and the chair of United Phosphorus (Bangladesh) Limited. He is a member of the Indian Institute of Chemical Engineers and the American Chemical Society, a past president of Vapi Industries Association, and former chair of the Gujarat chapter of the Confederation of Indian Industry. He earned a degree in chemical engineering from the Indian Institute of Technology, Kharagpur, in 1964.

Banerjee has served Rotary as a director, Rotary Foundation trustee, committee and task force chair, International Assembly group discussion leader, president's representative, and district governor.

The chair of the Southeast Asia Regional PolioPlus Committee, Banerjee has served as a member of the International PolioPlus Committee for many years and has attended international meetings with the World Health Organization and UNICEF in that capacity.

Banerjee is a Major Donor, Benefactor, and Bequest Society member, and has been awarded the Foundation's Citation for Meritorious Service and its Distinguished Service Award.

Banerjee also serves as a trustee of Rotary club-sponsored trusts that support many educational and community development programs in India, including a 250-bed hospital.

He noted that Rotary's strengths include its ability to attract leaders from different vocations around the world, as well as its role in promoting peace. "Rotary needs to become the preferred organization for today's generation to join and participate in, to make the world better and safer and happier," he said. Banerjee's wife, Binota, is a social worker and Inner Wheel club member. The couple have two children and four grandchildren.



John Smarge has been a Rotarian and resident of Naples, Florida since 1981. His classification is Moving and Storage. John and his wife Cindy are Major Donors, Bequest Society Members and Paul Harris Society Members.

John graduated from Fairleigh Dickinson University with a degree in Entrepreneurial Management. At the age of twenty-two, John left his home state of New Jersey, moved to Naples, FL and purchased a year old struggling moving company. His multi-office operation handling local, interstate and international moving is now the largest relocation business in SW Florida.

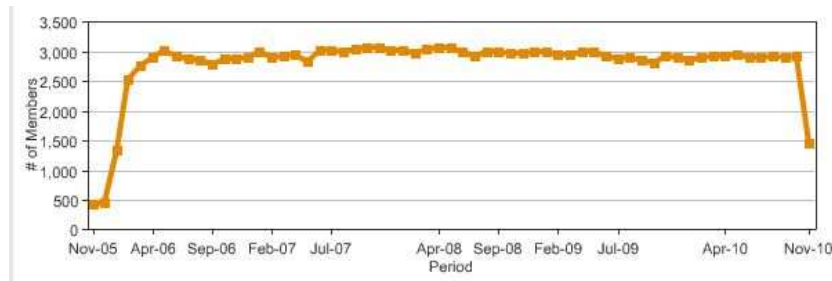

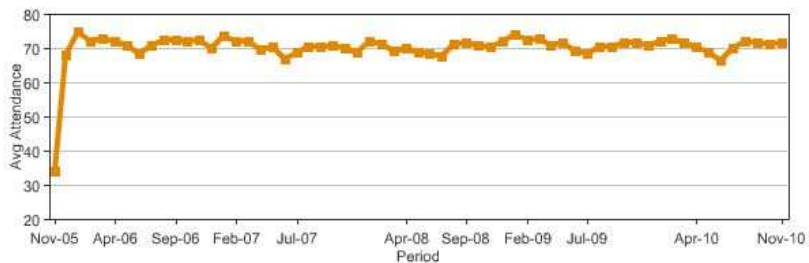

District 7750 Membership Trend:



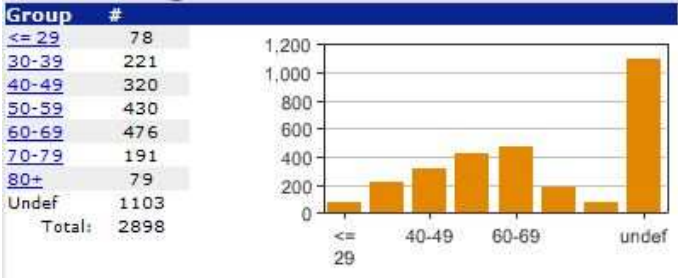
District 7750 Average Attendance Trend:



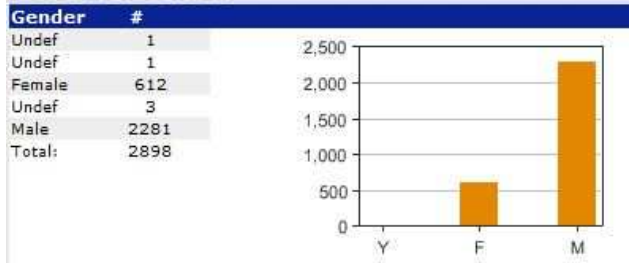

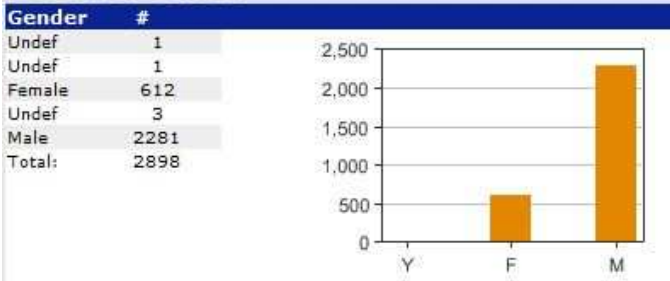

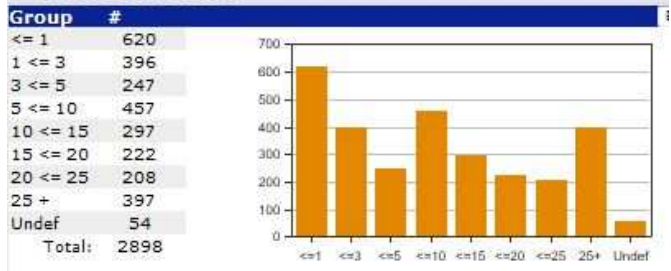

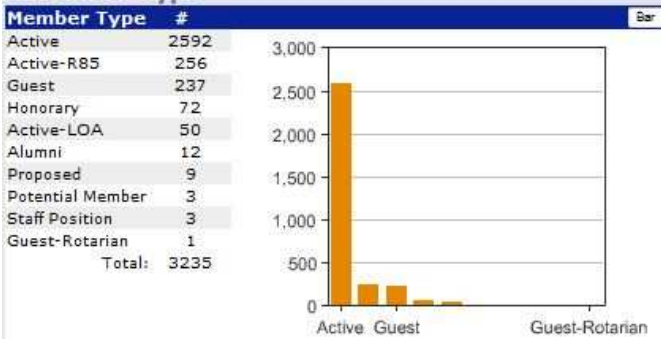

Prior to the District Governor's Visit

1. Attend Club Leadership Training and Membership Seminar on June 11, 2011. Get as many as possible of your incoming club officers and committee chairs to attend.
2. Make sure the upcoming president completes "Planning Guide for Effective Rotary Clubs" and submits it to you by June 11, 2011.
3. Confirm time and location of the President/Secretary meeting and the club assembly at least one week prior to the DG's visit.
4. Check with the President to be sure that the club has NO other program scheduled for the day of the DG's visit.
5. Confirm to the president that the District Governor will be the club program on the day of the DG's visit to the club.
6. Suggest to the president that members should wear their Rotary pins and/or Paul Harris pins when the Governor is in attendance.



Meeting With President, President-Elect and Secretary

This will be an informal discussion with the AG regarding club goals, strengths and weaknesses.

It will last approximately forty-five minutes.

The President may have questions regarding the district or RI for the governor or assistant governor.

The AG will conduct the meeting.

Club Meeting--Governor's Visit as scheduled with the club

1. Contact the Governor to let him or her know that you are planning to attend his or her visit to the club.
2. Make sure the president is aware that you will be coming with the Governor. You will sit at the head table with the Governor if space is available. You can introduce the Governor if asked to do so.

Summary

Be prepared for the DG visit, and everything will go well.

This is your chance to learn more about clubs in your area and assist the Governor by working with the club committees.

Remember to use the resources available to you--the Governor, the District Office and Rotary International.
