ADMISSIONS

Requirements

Graduation from secondary school required; GED accepted. General college-preparatory program required. 4 units of English, 3 units of mathematics, 2 units of science (including 1 unit of lab), 2 units of foreign language, 1 unit of social studies, 1 unit of history, and 1 unit of visual/performing arts required. 4 units of mathematics and 3 units of science (including 1 unit of lab) recommended. Minimum composite ACT score of 19 or minimum 2.3 GPA required. Audition required of music program applicants. Additional secondary school units and interview required of nursing program applicants. Exceptional admission possible for applicants not normally admissible. ACT required; SAT Reasoning may be substituted. No policy for SAT or ACT writing component. TOEFL required of international applicants. Campus visit and admissions interview recommended. Off-campus interview may be arranged with an admissions representative. Application fee \$25 (may be waived in cases of financial need), nonrefundable.

Admissions Procedure

Normal sequence: ACT or SAT Reasoning scores must be received by August 15. Suggest filing application by July 1. Notification of admission is sent on a rolling basis beginning September 1. No set date by which applicants must accept offer. \$100 room deposit, refundable. 5% of freshmen enter in terms other than fall. Admissions process is need-blind.

Special programs: Early admission program.

Transfers: Transfer students are accepted. In fall 2013, 2,230 transfer applications were received, 1,595 were accepted. Application deadline is rolling. Minimum 12 semester hours required to apply as a transfer. Secondary school transcript and college transcript required; additional requirements vary. Minimum 2.0 college GPA required. Lowest course grade accepted is "D." At least 30 semester hours must be completed at the school to earn a bachelor's degree. Credit only granted for courses equivalent in content to those offered by the school.

International Students: 331 degree-seeking undergraduate students enrolled, 49 countries represented. Minimum 500 TOEFL score required. Preapplication form and separate application required. Application deadline is July 1 for fall; November 1 for spring.

Learning Disabled Students: Personal interview recommended. Specific support program available. Untimed standardized tests accepted. Required secondary school courses in specific area of disability may be waived. Lighter course load and additional time to complete degree permitted.

Placement Options: Credit may be granted for CLEP general exams, CLEP subject exams, DANTES exams, and International Baccalaureate. Placement may be granted for Regents College Exams, home school portfolio, challenge exams, military experience, and COMPASS exam.
