# **ADMISSIONS**

#### Requirements

Graduation from secondary school required; GED accepted. General college-preparatory program recommended. 4 units of English, 3 units of mathematics, 2 units of science, and 2 units of social studies required. 4 units of mathematics, 3 units of science, 2 units of foreign language, 1 unit of history, and 1 unit of academic electives recommended. Minimum composite ACT score of 18 (combined SAT Reasoning score of 860) and minimum 2.2 GPA required; rank in top half of secondary school class recommended; some academic areas have other ACT requirements. Conditional admission for applicants not normally admissible. ACT required of some applicants; SAT Reasoning may be substituted. The SAT or ACT writing component used for placement and advising. TOEFL required of international applicants. Campus visit and admissions interview recommended. Off-campus interview may be arranged with an admissions or alumni representative. Application fee \$30 (may be waived in cases of financial need or with SAT, ACT, and NACAC waivers), nonrefundable.

## **Basis for Candidate Selection**

### **Admissions Procedure**

Normal sequence: Standardized test scores must be received by August 15. Suggest filing application by April 1; deadline is August 1. Common application form accepted. Notification of admission is sent on a rolling basis within two to three weeks after receipt of application. No set date by which applicants must accept offer. \$150 tuition deposit, refundable until May 1.\$200 room deposit, nonrefundable. 5% of freshmen enter in terms other than fall. Admissions process is need-blind.

Transfers: Transfer students are accepted. Application deadline is rolling for fall, spring, and summer. Minimum 24 semester hours required to apply as a transfer. College transcript required. Minimum 2.0 college GPA required. Lowest course grade accepted is "C." Maximum number of transferable semester hours is 32 from two-year schools; 84 from four-year schools. At least 40 semester hours must be completed at the school to earn a bachelor's degree.

International Students: One degree-seeking undergraduate student enrolled. Minimum 550 TOEFL (79 Internet-based) score required.

Learning Disabled Students: Support services available. Untimed standardized tests accepted.

Placement Options: Credit may be granted for CLEP subject exams. Placement may be granted for DANTES exams and life experience.
