Fire Danger Level on the Angeles National Forest was raised from "High" to "Very High," on Sunday, July 12, 2009. Open wood and charcoal fires will only be permitted in developed campgrounds and picnic areas where fire rings and grills are provided. Gas and propane powered stoves and grills are permitted in backcountry areas with a valid California Campfire Permit. Campfire permits are available free of charge at all U.S. Forest Service offices and most visitor centers and fire stations.

Welcome to the Forest Service: A Guide for Volunteers, (Tech. Rep. 0967-2813-MTDC) is available to all volunteers. This guide will provide you with a brief history of the Forest Service, an overview of the volunteer program, and some information you will need to work safely and productively for the agency. VOLUNTEER GROUP NEWS

The summer has arrived as have all the festivities and nature lovers to our National Forest. Chantry Flat has been very busy of late and with the crowds come various challenges that we have either witnessed first hand or heard through one of our colleagues reports. May and June have had attendance numbers of 1600+ people on a weekly basis. That's 536 rolls of toilet paper (single ply of course), 280 bags of trash and 48 bags of recyclable materials collected.

With the crowds, comes the need for patience and perseverance. All of the volunteers at chantry contribute in many ways. In just the last two months, the team has worked 557 hours. There have been numerous public assists, 13 rescues, over 250 noncompliance notices written, equaling \$1250.00 in revenue. Tina alone has probably sold 320 passes by directing the public to the pack station to purchase their pass before going on a hike, again bringing in \$1600.00 in revenue.

The volunteers at Chantry work very well together. They have developed their skills through training provided in the classroom and on the job training under the guidance of Kevin Hunt.

The volunteers practice smooth public service habits and respond to the many duties that are required. Together, they have cleaned graffiti off of many a beautiful boulder and picked up trash. With a kind word, a smile or the use of our authority, we can go a long way on a very HOT day.

Always at the ready, the team of volunteers has hiked 85 miles collectively over the months of May & June, provided directions to hundreds of visitors and have helped keep people safe on the trails. The presence of the volunteers on the weekend has added to the peaceful and lawful experience our visitors expect in our National Forest.

Maintenance duties are not always the fun part of the job but necessary and done without complaint. The bathroom facility at Chantry Flat, Roberts, Spruce Grove, and Hoegees campground are kept clean and stocked constantly.

Special Recognition is deserved by two of our very dedicated volunteers. Chris Kasten because of his long standing interest in the National Forest, his value to the volunteer program and the attention he provides on a weekly basis to Spruce Grove is unmatched. He Hikes in 4.0 miles every week. He provides campers a great experience and is certain to make sure that all of the visitors are fire safety compliant. And Tina Chamley because over the past fifteen years she has given almost every weekend of her time to the needs at Chantry. Tina is the welcome committee that our visitors have come to recognize and her ability to direct the public and provide them with accurate and vital information makes for a safe and successful outdoor experience.

The loyalty and commitment of this group of people is to be credited. These are people who can be counted on. And they count on one another's dedication in order to get the work done. They keep tight schedules, they arrive early, divvy- up the duties and communicate the needs of the day as well as report the results.

If you have ever hiked East Fork Trail along the river toward the famous "Bridge to Nowhere" you have probably walked across a rickety old wooden foot bridge that spanned Laurel Gulch, a twisted "Indiana Jones" kind of bridge that might have made you pause a moment to ponder whether the bridge was actually safe or not.

Well, there's a new wooden bridge spanning Laurel Gulch.

October 25th 2008, the wooden beams, planks and posts that were to be used for the bridge were unpacked and assembled at the Rincon Fire Station by the San Gabriel Mountains Trailbuilders April 18, 2009, Trailbuilders worked on excavating the ground where the concrete bridge footings would eventually be built. Rock was broken up with picks, a rock drill, and a lot of hard, hot, sweaty work until the lower footing was almost completed with perhaps half of the work done on the upper footing.

May 9th, was a day back at Rincon and the Trailbuilders disassembled the bridge, packaging up each piece until there were two transportable sections of approximately reasonable weights. Bolts and other hardware were carefully packaged along with the tools and equipment that would be needed to reassemble the bridge after the helicopter carried the bridge sections from Rincon to the Gulch. San Gabriel Valley Conservation Corps and the Trailbuilders teamed up with Boy Scouts, Forest Service personnel and other volunteers to reassemble the bridge and to work on the approaches to the bridge. A rock wall was built for the lower approach by hauling in huge boulders, large rocks, and a thousand pounds of dirt, and then the new Laurel Gulch bridge was complete.

Forest Service Bi-monthly Volunteer Meeting Notes July 15, 2009

Brian Marcroft proposed moving the Forest Service bi-monthly volunteer meeting to the Angeles Crest Fire Station or until the Hahamongna Annex Project is approved and available for meetings.

Gary Hilliard has been clearing trees on Silver Moccasin NRT, Gabrielino NRT, between West Fork and Kenyon DeVore, and West Fork to Shortcut. He will not be doing anymore tree clearing until after Mt Disappointment Race scheduled for August 8th. DeVore Trail Camp to road needs poison oak removal.

Patty Dwyer reported Gould Mesa Trail Camp latrines were pumped. They painted over graffiti. If you want a Red Cross class with Tom, you need to request it in advance.

Mr. Marcroft reported there's graffiti at Echo Mountain. The Mt Lowe Road is open to Markham Saddle from the bottom. Eagle Scout candidate is working on reconstructing a bench on Mt Lowe, putting a sign at Mt Lowe East/West junction, and working the trail crossing at Mt Lowe Trail Camp. July 4th hike had only 2 people.

Terry Tanner reported mapping Grizzly Flats around Mt Lukens. Sister Elsie Trail is in bad condition. Someone is constructing an illegal spur trail at Mt Lukens.

Kathie Reilly reported on National Trails Day, June 6. There were over 100 volunteers at Mt Wilson on a cool, foggy day, perfect working weather. A lot of work was done on Mt Wilson Trail and the surrounding trails. Forest Service had arranged for Subway sandwiches, cookies and fruit platters that were awesome. Also at the pavilion were 2 busloads of Korean elders hosted by Wednesday Hiking Club having some sort of ceremony. They shared their BBQ food and gave us gift bags of medicinal salt. At 1:30 the Mount Wilson Institute group gave a short talk before the tour, about their plans to replace the pavilion with an information center/gift shop/restaurant.

Jim Henderson of bicycle patrol reported an illegal trail behind Riverwood created by mountain bikers. CTUC is taking the lead on resolution of this trail.

LA Conservation Corps has completed maintenance on Doc Larsen and Oak Springs Trails.

Next meeting is September 16 and Terry Tanner will talk about how he does mapping with GPS. Mr. Marcroft will inform us of the place.

We are in an era of climate change, and we will continue to respond accordingly. The Forest Service is in a unique position to provide solid climate change science and solutions for mitigation and adaptation----and we need to apply these solutions on a landscape scale.

In this era of climate change, the challenge with the fire seasons will only continue to increase. But we know based on our experience that we can continue to reduce the risk to firefighters and the public, while increasing the effectiveness of our suppression actions.


We will also continue reconnecting Americans to nature, especially kids. We want all Americans to appreciate the vital role our nation's forests and grasslands provide in their lives.
