The days before Easter are busy ones in our parish. Volunteers in Parish Outreach packed up items donated to our food pantry to make Easter Dinners for area families in need. Members of the St. Patrick School Student Council donated decorated bags with Easter candies to go with the Easter dinners. Our parish celebrated Holy Thursday with the Mass of the Lord's Supper. Our priests washed the feet of 12 of our RCIA participants to remember Jesus' washing of his disciples' feet. On Good Friday, members of our Youth Community gave a live presentation of the Stations of the Cross. And on Holy Saturday, 19 people received sacraments at the Easter Vigil.

From the Pastor's Desk

Peace be with you! These are the words of greeting from Jesus to His disciples we hear in today's Gospel as He appears to them after rising from the dead. This greeting was truly a source of peace. The disciples were gathered behind locked doors for fear that if they were known as Jesus' disciples they too would experience rejection and perhaps even crucifixion. In addition to their fear of the reaction of others, they had to be full of disappointment. In Luke 24:13-35 we see the account of two disciples leaving Jerusalem after the death of Jesus for the town of Emmaus. As they are walking with sad hearts Jesus approaches and walks with them, but they do not recognize Him. They express their disappointment when they say to Jesus. "Are you the only visitor to Jerusalem who does not know of the things that have taken place there in these days?" And he replied to them, "What sort of things?" They said to him, "The things that happened to Jesus the Nazarene, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, how our chief priests and rulers both handed him over to a sentence of death and crucified him. But we were hoping that he would be the one to redeem Israel; and besides all this, it is now the third day since this took place. Some women from our group, however, have astounded us: they were at the tomb early in the morning and did not find his body; they came back and reported that they had indeed seen a vision of angels who announced that he was alive. Then some of those with us went to the tomb and found things just as the women had described, but him they did not see." Jesus who cured the sick, raised the dead, and proclaimed the good news of God's kingdom and love, was crucified. From their point of view, everything was now over. There were reports that Jesus had risen, but they were skeptical and leaving the scene of this tragedy.

Not only were their hopes and dreams in Jesus disappointed, they also had to be disappointed in themselves. They did not have the courage to speak up for Jesus and testify to His goodness once He was arrested. In this appearance in today's Gospel, Jesus dispels all disappointment. His Risen presence assures them that He truly has risen from the dead and that He does have power over sin, evil, and death. They are also reassured that He still loves them. "Peace be with you," He says twice and then breathes the Holy Spirit into them. Not only are their hopes in Him rekindled, but His love for them is clearer than ever. In greeting them with "Peace be with you" he expresses His love that says He knows them, understands them, and surely loves them. Not only does He express love, forgiveness, and a desire for them to be one with Him even after His Resurrection, He also expresses His faith in them as He says to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." And when he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained." (John 20:21-23) Sin separates us from God and one another. Jesus is the complete opposite of sin - His desire is always to unite us with God and one another. Once the disciples realized how much He loved them in spite of their faults, lack of courage, and misunderstanding, they

began to build up the first generation of the Church. They lived up to His faith in them and became the very foundation of the Church, the Church we are blessed to be part of today.

Where do we hear Jesus saying to us, "Peace be with you?" Each time we come to Mass we hear this greeting just before we recite or sing the Lamb of God and then are invited to receive Jesus in the Eucharist. "May the peace of the Lord be with you always!" May we know the peace that we see was so life giving in today's Gospel! Not only are we wished this reality from the words of the priest celebrant of the Mass, we, like the disciples in today's Gospel, are called to share this peace with one another. Our very simple greetings to one another at this point in the Mass unite us with one another as at that very moment we are together in the presence of God Himself in the Eucharist. The key is to take this peace to heart and leave the Eucharist with hope, love, and a true desire to seek peace and strengthen our bond of peace with God and one another. Our ideal peace can easily be shaken by the simplest of gestures or words from others. Words that express anger, disappointment, disrespect, and rejection make it more difficult to allow the peace of Jesus to come to the fore in our minds and hearts. Our temptation is to respond to negativity with more negativity and evil through words and actions. Then the reality of sin has taken hold of us because instead of looking for a way to restore our unity and bring about reconciliation, we only alienate ourselves from each other even more. We have all used harsh words, the silent treatment, the cold shoulder, and angry glances. But in the end there is no peace. Winning an argument or putting others in their place does not really bring peace. Peace only comes when we realize our need for it is founded on our life in God. And we cannot possibly be at peace with God if we are not seeking to find peace with one another.

It is very easy to build up anger and disappointment in our hearts when we see the violence and injustice in our world everyday. How can we possibly find peace as a nation when we are struggling with our own government for one of the basic rights of our National Constitution, Religious Freedom? As great as our nation is, we have come to the point where freedom is becoming enshrined as license to do whatever we want for our own convenience and pleasure, rather than freedom based on true love and respect for God and one another. We certainly need to listen to the words of the Risen Jesus echoing in our hearts, "Peace be with you." Jesus does not stop the chaos in our world but is present within it, calming and untroubling our hearts, bringing peace.

May we all open our minds and hearts each day, especially in times of conflict and disappointment to hear the words of Jesus loudly and clearly, "Peace be with you!"



News & Notes from Catholics for Freedom of Religion

"I am the way, the truth and the life" (John 14:6) "You will know the truth and the truth will make you free" (John 8:32)

Religious Freedom Restoration Act (RFRA): Fact vs. Fiction: This past week, journalist abuse has exploded into controversy over an innocuous religious freedom law in Indiana. The federal RFRA was signed into law by Pres. Clinton in 1993 and 20 states have substantially the same law. (the federalist.com, 3/30/15)

Don't be fooled. The RFRA does NOT legalize discrimination. Anyone that says that is misinformed or worse. RFRA merely allows business owners to refuse to perform their services if doing so is a violation of their faith. (catholic vote.org, 4/2/15)

Under the various RFRAs, a state or the federal government may not substantially burden an individual's exercise of religion unless the burden is in furtherance of a compelling government interest and is the least restrictive means of furthering that interest. If the government's interest is not important enough - literally compelling - it cannot outweigh an individual's right to practice his religion as he sees fit

RFRA is a shield, not a sword. It can be used to defend oneself against lawsuits or administrative action. It can't be used to try and deprive others of

the protections of law. Despite there being no evidence for discrimination under this law, journalists will simply repeat this fiction as if it were true, and hope that incurious, unsuspecting people will assume it. (the federalist.com,3/30/15)

Reflections on the Sunday Scriptures

April 19, 2015 The Third Sunday of Easter Readings: Acts 3: 13-15, 17-19; 1 John 2: 1-5A; Luke 24: 36-48

The two disciples recounted what had taken place on the way, and how Jesus was made known to them in the breaking of bread. While they were still speaking about this, he stood in their midst and said to them, "Peace be with you." But they were startled and terrified and thought that they were seeing a ghost. Then he said to them, "Why are you troubled? And why do guestions arise in your hearts? Look at my hands and my feet, that it is I myself. Touch me and see, because a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you can see I have." And as he said this, he showed them his hands and his feet. While they were still incredulous for joy and were amazed, he asked them, "Have you anything here to eat?" They gave him a piece of baked fish; he took it and ate it in front of them. He said to them, "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you, that everything written about me in the law of Moses and in the prophets and psalms must be fulfilled." Then he opened their minds to understand the Scriptures. And he said to them, "Thus it is written that the Christ would suffer and rise from the dead on the third day and that repentance, for the forgiveness of sins, would be preached in his name to all the nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things."
