COMMANDER'S MESSAGE What Business Are You In? Cdr David Atwood, AP

[Presented at the 24 April Change of Watch.]

A few years ago, being new to boating, I took the basic boating course in Orleans and was fortunate to have dedicated, inspiring instructors such Karl Davis, N, D/C Art Kimber, SN, and P/C George Pettengill, AP*, just to name a few. I immediately joined the Cape Cod Sail and Power Squadron and began taking other courses which I found to be worth my time and improved my boating knowledge.

My ambition was to become an instructor.

Little did I know that I would receive a call from P/C Joan Croft, AP*, asking me to join the squadron leadership team.

I thank Bob Bach, the bridge, and the executive committee for their contribution during this past year and I especially want to thank Joan Croft for the incredible volume of work she does for your squadron and the support she has given me.

I look forward to working with your new leadership team as we face the challenges before us.

I see this as a time of change driven by an emerging new national direction.

Our national organization's leaders have a vision that will establish us as the premier recreational boating education organization in the country. Such a national vision cannot become reality without local action. With a membership of 40,000, we are the nation's largest organization of recreational boaters. However, there are somewhere between 7-9 million registered recreational boat owners who could still become students or members.

The new national direction is demonstrated through new course releases, existing course revisions, and renaming of courses. This steady stream of educational products clearly tells us that there is a new emphasis on one of the three primary USPS objectives: continuing education.

As an example of these national changes, what we and I just called the public basic boating course, properly named The Squadron Boating CourseSM, is now named America's Boating Course[®], a much more marketable name, will be prominently featured in the organization's public advertising.

The many new seminars are short, specific learning packages suited for today's boating students. We have also adopted a new message that will be incorporated in all our publications:

boating is fun . . . we'll show you how

To achieve this vision and message, it must be supported at the squadron level with more instructors and on-the-water experience opportunities for students and, at the same time, still be fun for all.

In all organizations, as they grow or mature, there is a tendency for operations and activities to expand beyond the organization's primary objective. Sometimes we can be diverted by other squadron activities and forget that our core business is recreational boating education.

One of the points that some consultants make is, that to succeed, organizations must keep the main thing, the main thing. In other words, focus on doing what you were established or organized to do.

However, to do this we must make sure there is an answer the question: What's the main thing?

Every member must be able to answer that question by saying: Boating education is our business; we want safer boaters, better boaters.

To state that convincingly, it's necessary to be part of what the squadron does. At the moment we have a great need for additional instructors. If you can and would like to help the squadron in this capacity, please contact our Squadron Educational Officer.

With this focus on recreational boating education, we will be better recognized both locally and nationally and that recognition will help us prosper as an organization.

At the recent district meeting, a member of the national team made reference that our designation as USPS has little or no name recognition, other than we might be mistaken for the post office. We will need to strengthen our appeal to recreational boating families with an identity that clearly tells them about the opportunity we offer for boating education and fun.

At that same meeting we discussed the topics of member recruitment and retention.

A key learning was that people need clearly identified bite-size tasks in order to accomplish our goals as a volunteer organization. This is something that the bridge and committee chairmen will be working on this year.

Also, at the meeting, a set of annual goals was presented for our consideration. (I've listed them here and identified the effect they would have on our squadron.) I intend to embrace them and ask you to do the same. They are:

- Increase membership by 1%
 - = 3 new members
- Have 25% of the membership take, teach, or proctor a course
 - = 58 participants
- Increase attendance at squadron activities by 10%
 - = 2 more at water activities,
 - = 2 more at parades and the boat show booth.
 - = 5 more at dinners
- Meet 5 members that you have not yet met

To get all this done, at every opportunity we must remember that I am the squadron, you are the squadron, and we all are the squadron together.

Only together can the Cape Cod Sail and Power Squadron be recognized as the premier boating education organization in Barnstable County that inspires recreational boating families to become members.

S.O.S. – Seconds Of Spray Lt Barbara Garrett-Wilcox, AP

As written in the latest online April issue of BoatUS, Don Casey has some fire extinguisher realities. They don't give us much confidence in the event of a large fire on our boats. Here is what he has to say:

"Here is a statistic you should know. Those 10-BC dry chemical fire extinguishers we all carry (designated B-I by the Coast Guard) will discharge for about 10 seconds. For an onboard fire with a head start, that won't be long enough to put out the fire. Then what?

"If your boat is larger than 26', Coast Guard regulations require a second B-I extinguisher aboard, either that or a larger B-II. A second 10-BC gives you another nine second shot-if the fire hasn't put this second unit out of reach. A B-II extinguisher is better, carrying at least a 60-BC rating, which doesn't mean the extinguisher will discharge for six times as long, but does mean it has six times the extinguishing capacity. But if your single B-II is on the other side of the flames...

"Meeting Coast Guard requirements equips your boat to extinguish only the smallest of onboard fires. For real protection, take aboard B-II extinguishers, or at least the larger B-I, rated 40-BC. All but the smallest watercraft should have at least two extinguishers aboard, mounted in opposite ends of the boat."

It is always better to be on the side of over protection, but it sounds as if, to me, with only seconds of spray protection from the fire extinguishers, in case of a large onboard fire, I'm heading for the nearest exit with my life jacket on!

OAK BLUFFS RENDEZVOUS More fun, less hassle this year Lt/C Hugh Blair-Smith, SN

First rendezvous (14-15 June) of the season, with a new twist: we've been so good at bringing substantial hors d'oeuvres for the Saturday dockside cocktail party that we won't schedule a dinner anywhere.

Oak Bluffs Marina has a new feature this year: a launch service (\$4 per person round trip), so we could pick up moorings. Rafting limit is 4 per ball. Moorings cannot be reserved but there will be enough (12 boats could use just 3 moorings, for instance). Oak Bluffs Launch monitors VHF 71.

Slips can be reserved for an in-season rate of \$3/ft (\$90 minimum) up to 40 feet; two-night reservation rule waived when you identify yourself with the CCSPS group.

There's also a \$1 infrastructure fee. The best way to reserve a slip is to visit www.oakbluffsharbor.com and fill in the secure reservation form, remembering to mention the Squadron on the cost page.
