

S.O.S. – Safe "Oar" Suggestions Lt Barbara Garrett-Wilcox, AP

With two paddlers' rendezvous scheduled for this fall, it seemed an appropriate time to offer some safety tips. Also, after seeing the number of paddlers attending the Egg Island outing, these safety reminders should benefit many in our squadron who either are now or are thinking of becoming kayak/canoe enthusiasts.

Kayaks come in all sizes and shapes, so it is important to decide how and where you want to use it before buying or renting one. Shops dealing in just kayaks can give you expert advice and it's wise to consider going to more than one before making a decision.

Safety advice:

- 1. Wear a PFD at all times even though state law requires it only between 15 September 15 and 15 May. Attach a whistle to it, preferably plastic without the little "ball" in it.
- 2. Keep a bailing device, compass and flare handy and a 360-degree flashlight.
- 3. If you capsize, stay with your kayak as it will provide floatation and a large colored object to be easily seen by rescuers.
- 4. Consider tethering your paddle to your wrist (lanyard on a wrist band). Once that paddle is dropped, it is extremely difficult to catch up with it (especially without a paddle!!).
- 5. A float plan is always a wise precaution. Let someone know your plans; when you are leaving, where you are kayaking and when you plan to return.
- 6. Check out your route, where you will put in and take out, what the current is like and if there is a tide, whether it is coming in or going out. It is very enjoyable going with the current and hard work paddling against it.

The date for the next rendezvous is the 21 October, at a Middle Cape location. Get your kayaks/canoes outfitted and join the fun in the water with these small crafts.

Most of all, be safety conscious.
