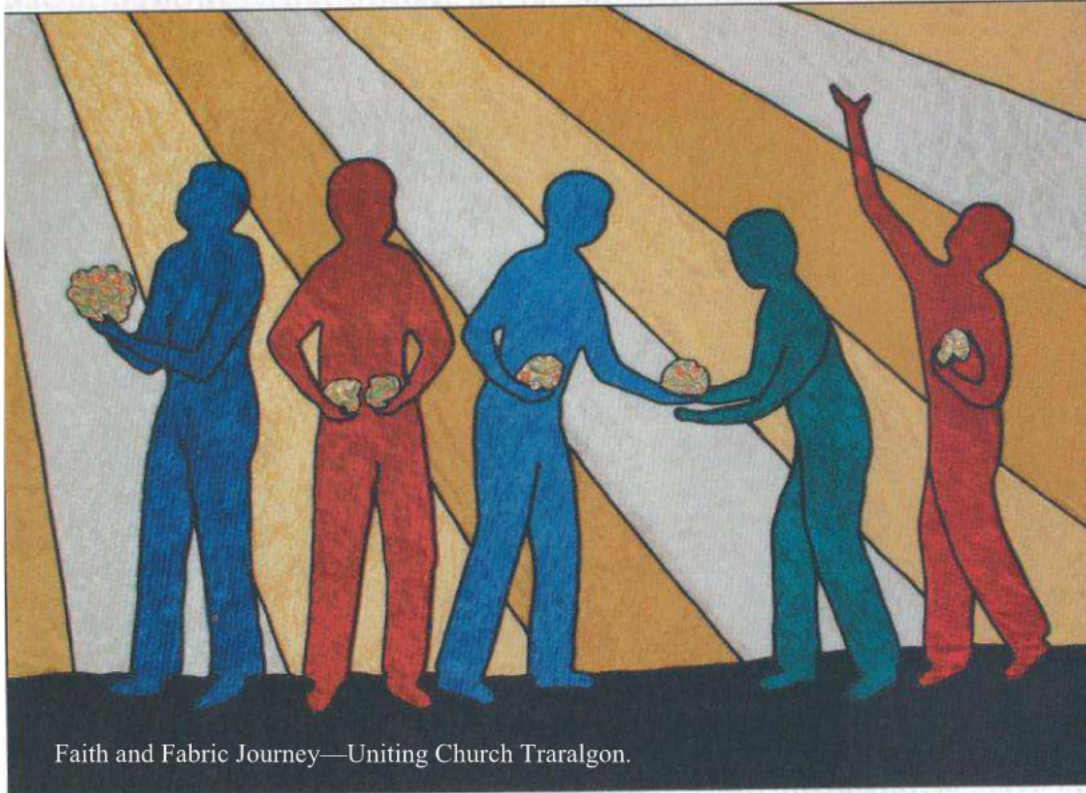

EXPLORING FAITH THROUGH FABRIC

During September I had the great opportunity of viewing the work of a small group from the Uniting Church at Traralgon, huge banners made from materials displayed at the Uniting Church at Bacchus Marsh.

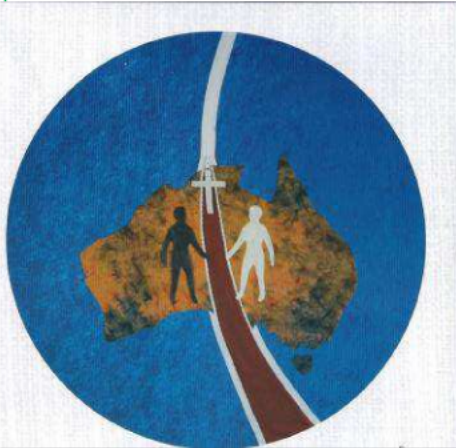
The fabric art is an expression of their spirituality. By using familiar objects and features of the Australian landscape as contemporary symbols of the human journey and our awareness of God as a vital presence in that journey, they produce these works of vivid colour and creativity.

Their work began in 1984 in a simple way but has now developed into more complex visuals. Contemporary social issues are expressed to challenge the viewer to respond.



The exhibitions have been held throughout Victoria leading to exciting and moving exchanges with a wide variety of people, which reveals the God who speaks through the Fabric art created.

The group choose not to sew and seldom glue because they discovered the joy and freedom of pinning. 25cm thick polystyrene boards are used as the base and are cut to match the style of the building and the hanging space. When the design sketch is finalised it is transferred onto an overhead projection Acetate, then drawn onto paper attached to the wall to be traced. Lace, wool, hessian, overlays of tulle or crystal organza have been used for special effects. Stockings can be stretched and pinned into interesting shapes. One technique used involves 4cm squares of fabric inserted into the polystyrene with a wooden skewer –no pins, no glue.



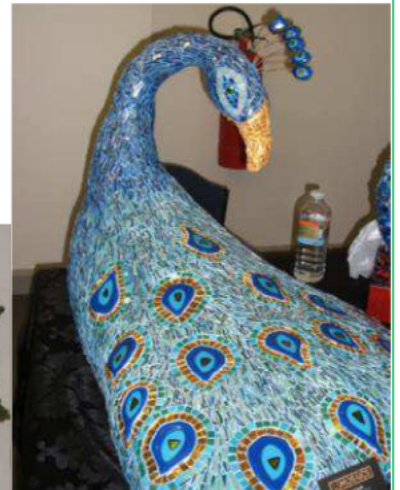
A big display of their work will be held in November in Gippsland in conjunction with an Art Festival. The group have exhibited in many parishes but never a Catholic Church or Hall. So my challenge is—do not miss out on the richness of this exhibition and invite them to your parish to share their work with the local community.

THE AUSTRALIAN CAMINO—MARY'S WAY-Karen Ward

Sticks tapping and a morning prayer of encouragement, reminiscing on an aspect of Mary's life, relating it to our own is how we start our day on the Aussie Camino – Mary's Way from Portland to Penola.

On the 21st September 24 individuals met for the very first time, at the Mary MacKillop Heritage Centre in Melbourne, jumping into the cars of complete strangers to travel to Portland, where this Camino commenced and 24 Pilgrims evolved.

The dynamic of our group was as varied and dramatic as the landscapes we travelled. A delightful bunch of likeminded pilgrims, all up for a very long walk... Our ages ranged from the pre 30 to the way post 30.... We had the Catholic Priest, the Marist Brother, the Anglican Minister and a big bunch of lovely caring others. It was truly a very caring considerate group of people from all backgrounds and area's of Australia. I felt very humbled to be part of group with such an adventurous spirit.



Melbourne schoolteacher Luke Mills designed the pilgrimage around the life and times of our Saint Mary MacKillop. Our days would range in kilometres from 24 – 39km per day. For some of us it was a little daunting the anticipation of those long days, could we do it? Could our feet and bodies hold up? Thank goodness for Kevin, the driver who supported us along the way...he was sent from Mary to assist on many an afternoon.

For some our walk was the opportunity for some solitude, time to contemplate, reflect, decide, move forward, for others it was about being out amongst the nature and the great outdoors, being social and some just wanted to go on a long walk. There were no ego's, just companions. From Portland our walk kicked off from the Lighthouse after a visit to the Mary MacKillop school. If you closed your eyes you became Mary and could feel that isolation and freedom she had felt back then as the new chapter of her life was about to begin.

"Little did either of us then dream of what was to spring from so small a beginning" she is quoted to say in 1891.

We walked 3 days along some of Australia's most divine uninhabited coastline, along cliff tops and through dense scrub weaving past inland lakes and waterholes. Sometimes there was no way out -the only way was forward. Quietly walking along the beaches, you could see heads down, all focussed on one step in front of the other, looking ahead the beach just didn't seem to end... then looking up again and you are there at the end...not noticing the time or distance past.

We passed through Cape Nelson, Cape Bridgewater, Nelson and Port McDonnell... We experienced amazing hospitality from the locals, were accommodated in the local pubs where a cold beer welcomed our arrival each afternoon.

We headed north towards Mt Gambier, along the scenic farm tracks, tree lined dirt lanes with gates to open and close, fences to jump over. We made it to Kalangadoo and then followed the disused railways tracks onto Penola all proud that we finally reached our destination.

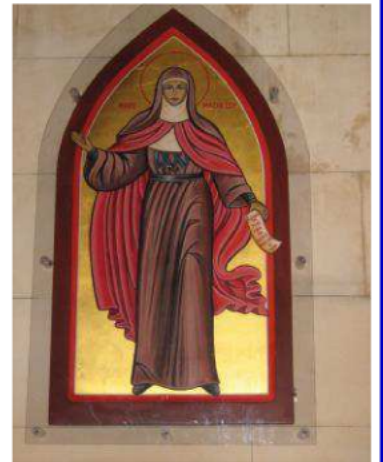

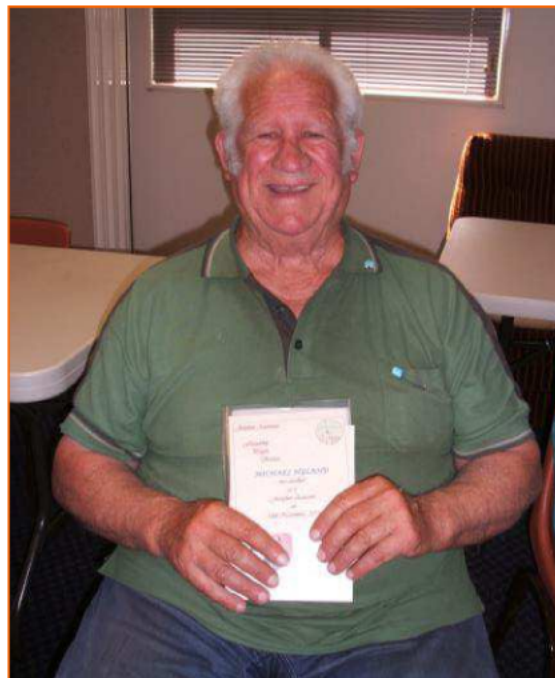
WONTHAGGI

Here is a report the students wrote themselves and presented to parishioners on the Feast of Mary MacKillop at both Sacred Heart Church St Albans and Emmaus Church Sydenham.

The Mary MacKillop group has been working hard to follow Mary MacKillop's footsteps. We meet every Tuesday and Wednesday where we pray and discuss how we can make our school a better place. We recently visited Emmaus Primary School and presented to the Grade 5 and 6 students about the work that we do as part of the Mary MacKillop group and to encourage them to form a similar group in their school.



The activities we do are: Every Friday we visit Spring Time Nursing home. We interact with the residents through various activities like playing bingo, colouring, puzzles and dominoes. We talk to the friendly residents and enjoy the time we spend with them. They tell us they are happy to have us there.

We prepare posters on the quotes of Mary MacKillop and these posters are displayed all around our school. We helped the Grade Fours for their First Holy Communion by laminating their seat names. Every Tuesday we help clean up after Mass and fill up the Holy Water fonts in every classroom. We have a prayer board where students put up their prayers and special intentions. The Mary MacKillop group engages the Grade One students at snack time. We read stories to them about Mary MacKillop and together work on activities to help them learn more about Mary and her life.

We are always ready to help around the school when required. These activities mentioned are ongoing and constant throughout the year.

In the words of Mary MacKillop: ***We must teach more by example than by word.***

2015 JOSEPHITES ASSOCIATES CONFERENCE

Annemarie Wilkinson and Christine Nicholls-van Order attended this conference as representatives of Victoria and Tasmania. This report is adapted from the report on the website sosj.org.au.

The conference was held in Sydney on 16-18 October. On the first evening Associates reported on significant happenings in their areas revealing trends on hospitality, prayer groups, youth, Masses and pilgrimages.

Saturday was significant and Sr Monica Cavanagh's presentation on the Chapter booklet "At the Heart of Life" raised questions regarding how we might deal with the future and how we can refresh and challenge our commitment. Monica looked at pathways to the future including : *Induction process; ritualising the commitment; On-going commitment to Friendship Prayer and Service;*

Sr Clare Noonan spoke on four key areas: Future; Governance; Change; Sustainability. Three quotes were:

The future is not the same place we are going to, but one we are creating.

The paths to it are not found, but made.

The making of those paths changes both the maker and the destination.

Also discussed was governance and finance and whether there is a need to be incorporated or not.

Three key questions were then discussed in groups:

What is the deepest desire for the Associate Movement as we move into the future?

What will be the Roles and Relationship of the Sisters and Associates in the future?

Communication—ways and means?

It was decided there will be a three-five year plan and that Common/Core Principles and components for this plan need to be developed to ensure all regions are "on the same page" with uniform processes.

A focus on formation of Leaders to build confidence and competency in their abilities.

The next Conference is scheduled for 7-9th April 2017 and the International Josephite Associates Leadership Team (IJALT) will plan this conference. Regional groups were left with a mandate to report back to local areas and hold mini-conferences with an emphasis on renewal, formation and induction.

JOSEPHITE ASSOCIATES ANNUAL MASS

Josephite Associates from across Victoria gathered to celebrate our Annual Mass together. They came from Eaglehawk, Wonthaggi, Broadmeadows, Pakenham, Iona, Koo Wee Rup, East Brighton, Ashwood, Carlton, Sunbury, Woodend, East Keilor, Richmond, Greensborough (and maybe somewhere else!!!) together with Sr Kerrie Cusack, our Regional Leader and Sr Marion Gambin from North Sydney, a member of our Congregational Leaders team.

Fr Michael Kalka, pp from Kew, also an Associate was our celebrant, who spoke challengingly about living the Gospel as Associates, also calling to mind those who had suffered from the violence in France the day before.

After the homily Dorothy Rowlands from Pakenham and Aarti Munohur from Camberwell were enrolled as Associates, with all present renewing their own commitment to live the Josephite Charism in their local area. Dorothy and Aarti then brought up the gifts.

Annemarie Wilkinson had brought along her keyboard with which she expertly accompanied and led the singing. Annemarie had also prepared the liturgy and the booklets for the Mass. We are grateful for the way she so generously shares her gifts of music.

After Mass we listened to an inspirational talk given by Aimee Suchard-Lowe, part of the team at Kids Under Cover and who is their National Marketing and Fundraising Manager. Aimee explained the work of KUC in providing fully equipped studios that are set up in backyards to provide accommodation for families who need space. A video telling the story of grandparents who found themselves caring for five grandchildren in a three bedroom house and how they were blessed to come into contact with KUC, who set up a studio for the eldest in their back yard. These studios which last about 20 years, can be moved four to five times, cost about \$50,000. Funding of about \$1000, to enable students to complete their studies, is also provided. A good number of these have been referred by Mary MacKillop Family Services, one of seventy groups who work with them.

A delicious afternoon tea was then enjoyed by all and opportunity was given to buy calendars and handcraft from Peru.

This was the largest Mass attendance we have had so far and we hope 2016 will be even larger. Annemarie announced that a couple of the team members had decided that next year when we celebrate 150 years of the Sisters of St Joseph, the Associates will invite the Sisters to Mass and Afternoon tea. Sounds a good idea!!

Numurkah's 125th Celebrations.



The Parish and School in Numurkah came alive last week-end when celebrating the foundation of the school in 1890. Friday was children's day with a program of games and activities; a shared family lunch; a special school assembly where sisters who had ministered there were introduced with some sharing of memories, and an address by Sr Kerrie Cusack. Later in the day there was the opening of the Art Show by Mr Terry Jarvis who is a very well-known local water colour artist.

On Saturday, the special commemorative Mass was celebrated by Bishop Les Tomlinson of Sandhurst with assisting priests, Frs Michael Grace, Parish Priest of Numurkah, Chris Reay, Parish Priest of Nathalia and Frank Jones, previously Parish Priest of Numurkah. The children had obviously taken time to learn the hymns and the graceful actions for the "Cross of Stars". A large colourful mural portraying St Joseph's School - past and present - was painted by the children under the tutelage of Mr Terry Jarvis. This painting was the backdrop for the Mass celebration

In his homily, Bishop Tomlinson connected this celebration with the fifth anniversary of the canonisation of St Mary MacKillop and her "Celebrating God's love through faith in service to others" and encouraged all to accept this challenge as well.

After Mass, all moved to where an unusual statue of St Mary MacKillop was to be blessed. The statue was located in the Mary MacKillop Garden in the school yard. Tracey Tymeson, a local sculptor and a parent at the school, created the elegant statue from chicken wire.



The next item on the program was the digging up the time capsule that Sr Madeleine organised in 1990. Mr Glen Atkinson who was a school captain in 1990 helped to dig it out. This presented some difficulties and even caused a spade handle to be broken. The contents of the capsule were in perfect condition and were extracted one by one by Glen and Mr Paul Arnel, the school principal. Some of the items were:

programs, school uniforms, letters children had written, a local newspaper, church and school newsletters and the like.



Provided by the school and parish community, all were invited to enjoy lunch in the Hall and encouraged to visit the Art Show and History Display which were displayed in the old convent. Mr Paul Arnel invited Sr Colleen O'Dwyer to share something of her memories as a local and past lay-teacher at Numurkah. Sr Mary Ryan added that her great-Grandfather was present

when Mary MacKillop opened the school and that her mother also attended St. Joseph's while preparing for the Sacraments. Sr Audrey Thomson rsj, an ex-pupil was also present for the day. To conclude the day, Sr Kerrie Cusack thanked the community for their generosity and explained how this generosity had supported sisters at all points of the journey, from the time Mary MacKillop came with the first sisters, to the present day.

NO FUTURE WITHOUT FORGIVENESS Bishop Tutu

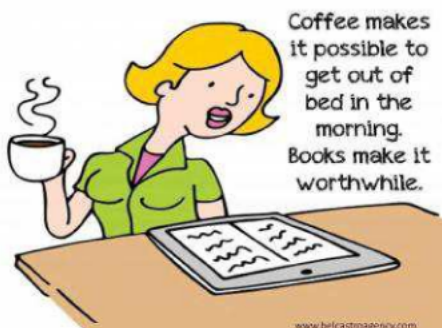
In this book, Bishop Tutu traces the origins and work of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission in South Africa, of which he was Chairperson. At times this book is difficult, when reading the witness statements of the torture and atrocities under apartheid.

Bishop Tutu believes the day of voting was a miracle of joy and peace for his country when violence seemed imminent. With the leadership of Nelson Mandela, forgiveness was the order of the day and many smaller miracles occurred during the commission's hearing. ACROSS MANY MOUNTAINS –Yangzom Bruen

When China invaded Tibet life became very difficult for the Tibetans, especially the monks and nuns. This is the story of a Buddhist Nun and her husband, a monk, who with their two daughters, both under seven years, travelled across the Himalayas to India looking for safety. Sonam, the surviving daughter, married a Swiss and life changed. Her daughter, Yangzom, has recorded the story as a memoir. The book describes many Tibetan traditions and values and the effort of the mother to retain these values within her family. A very compelling tale of courageous people.
