From The Helm

This past weekend, the 'big prize' was finally delivered...sort of. What was the 'big prize', you ask? You probably remember that last year we conducted a naming contest for the BLSA pontoon boat. I asked members to submit names for the pontoon boat that reflected my desire to make the boat an asset for all BLSA members, not just our racing program. Many members submitted names...including myself. All those names were distilled down to a final list of four, and those four finalist names were submitted to you, our members, to vote on which one you preferred. Wouldn't you know it? I won. The winning name, "BLSA Barge", was my suggestion. How embarrassing. It's really bad form for the Commodore to win his own naming contest.

So, you'll remember at the Annual Meeting, last November, I held a drawing so that someone else would receive the 'big prize', a picnic cruise of Brookville Lake from Hanna Creek to the dam and back. I had a blast bragging to Jim and his friends about the lake as we proceeded south. After a while, Jim suggested we find a quiet place to drop anchor so we could have lunch and give it the attention it deserved. I motored to the little shallow cove south of Kent's, next to the golf course, and set the lunch hook. And that's when the day took a bad turn. The Barge's outboard engine suddenly got an ugly attitude, and quit running. Emphasis on'suddenly'.

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Now, one thing we all know: when a power boat loses it's power, you've got nothing -NOTHING - left. A half-hour of repeated attempts at starting the #@X% engine got zero results...zero, as in nada, zip, nothing. And that's why cell phones and VHF were invented. Several rather anxious cell phone calls to Ernie Hauser provided several helpful, insightful suggestions...but no positive results from the #@X% engine.



On to Plan B. VHF calls to Randy Jones (at anchor, up-lake in Big Ellie's Creek) got some wheels in motion. Meantime, our guests - sated with Jan's fine lunch and a couple of glasses of fine wine - were still in good spirits, calm and not rebellious, but definitely keen to find an answer...soon. I, on the other hand, was sweating .45 caliber trip after a couple of weeks or so. But bullets.

While Randy, at the north end of the lake,

tried to put some sort of rescue together, I was busy recognizing an opportunity that unexpectedly came along: another pontoon boat with an unsuspecting family aboard, came happily cruising into the same cove where we were marooned. After some wild arm-waving and pitiful begging on my part, they agreed to take us under tow and haul our sorry butts back to Hanna Creek. Can you guess how humiliating it is to be rescued when your boat has big signs on the side saying "Safety Boat"?



When we were safely back at Hanna Creek and tied up at the guest dock, our onboard guests were still in good spirits and pretty good sports about the whole thing. One said, "If we had just motored down to the dam and back as planned, we'd probably have forgotten about this now, we have a STORY to tell at our next party, and Lord knows it will grow over time." As I said, these were good folks.

Embarrassing as the events were, some good came out of it. Randy Jones - who knows more about how engines work than anyone I know - figured out that my problem had been an airlock in the fuel line. How the airlock came about is anyone's guess, but Randy quickly figured out the problem and got it fixed. And Rick Keeler and Steve Bossert kicked in their help by switching over the battery (which I had drained in my attempts to start the #(a)X% engine) to another, fully charged one. After a little fussing, they got the #@X% engine started again. Ernie came out to the lake later in the evening and added his help. And we all agreed that a little professional engine service was probably in order for the #@X% engine.

So, 'the best laid plans of mice and men'.... The 'big prize' turned out to be something less, and yet everyone still had fun despite the unexpected turn of events. I received very nice 'thank you' emails from Jim and his guests, gracious to the end. And the #@*X% engine WILL get serviced very soon, so that no one else is likely to be stranded. As Steve and Jan Cornell, two of Jim's guests said,
