

# “Mollie Barnes is my name ...”: a New England Daughter Identified

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*Genealogy of the Joseph Barnes Family  
of Concord, Mass.*

*compiled by Karen (Weisgarber) Smithson & Bunny V. Averill*

The following genealogy presents in detail our findings regarding the ancestry and descendants of Joseph Barnes of Concord, Mass. who is listed below as Joseph “II”. We believe, on strong evidence, that he was the son of Joseph “I” of Bradford, Mass. but the connection is not yet proven. For a complete listing of source references see the Sources and Bibliography section on p. 72.

## *1<sup>st</sup> Generation*

**JOSEPH BARNES “I”**, we believe, was born in England, pos. in Manchester or nearby, in ca. 1676 and emigrated to America at the age of 18 in 1694.<sup>1</sup> He possibly made a first marriage to a **PHEBE AMES** say in around 1696.<sup>2</sup> He settled in Bradford and there married on Dec. 8, 1712, **HANNAH BOYNTON** who was born Feb. 7, 1682 in Bradford, the daughter of John and Hannah (Keyes) Boynton.<sup>3</sup>

1736/7, Mar. 19: the first of several mentions in the early town records of Acton when the agenda was put forward for the next meeting which was to take place at Joseph Barnes' home, Mar. 28, 1737; on the agenda was whether the town would pay Joseph Barnes 9:7:6 out of the tax money for framing the meeting house [ATR, p. 12]

1737, Mar. 28-29: town meeting held at Joseph Barnes' home, begun on Mar. 28, adjourned & resumed on Mar. 29 [ATR, p. 13]

1737, Apr. 12: town meeting held at Joseph Barnes' home [ATR, p. 14]

1737, June 6: the Acton treasurer was ordered to pay Joseph Barnes £80 as a first payment from the tax money for finishing the meeting house & at the same time it was ordered to pay him a further £100 as a second payment [ATR, p. 17]

1737/8, Feb. 16: the order to pay Joseph Barnes along with Joseph Fletcher & Jonathan Billing £80 for finishing the meeting house was ordered [again?] [ATR, p. 19]

1738/9, Mar. 3: an order to pay Joseph Barnes 12s. 6d. out of Mr. Parlin's rate [ATR, p. 24]

1738/9, Mar. 5: elected one of the surveyors of highways [ATR, p. 24]

Joseph Barnes was married by Justice Flint in Concord, Middlesex Co., Mass., Mar. 18, 1735/6 to SARAH MELVIN<sup>22</sup> who was born June 23, 1716 in Concord, the daughter of Jonathan and Sarah (Hartwell) Melvin.<sup>23</sup>

Charles Prescott for the expedition against Canada, 1760<sup>49</sup>; appears on the list of his father’s creditors, being owed 11s., 4d., Sept. 7, 1761<sup>50</sup>; private, liv. in Concord, on payroll of Capt. William Barron’s co. for service Mar. 26 – Nov. 28, yr. not given but endorsed 1762, length of service 35 weeks, 3 days, dated Boston, Mar. 10, 1763<sup>51</sup>; 4s. of his tax rate that he could not pay was paid on his behalf by Oliver Farrar who was reimbursed by the town, Feb. 28 1763<sup>52</sup>; one of 7 men chosen as hayviewers, Mar. 6, 1769<sup>53</sup>; enlisted in the Rev. War army, Jan. 15, 1776, Concord, Mass.<sup>54</sup>; his wife was paid 21s. by the Town of Concord for “keeping Saml Blood’s Dau.” for 12 weeks, Oct. 10, 1776<sup>55</sup>; pro. mov. to Peterborough Slip, N.H. aft. 1777<sup>56</sup>; He was an inhabitant of Temple, N.H. along w/ Reuben Law (famous as Sharon’s first permanent resident) & members of the Milliken & Swan families, 1784<sup>57</sup>; They settled on Lot 519, south of the North Cemetery, apparently in Bagley Corner.<sup>58</sup>; may be the Joseph Barnes who granted land in Middlesex Co., Mass. to J. Cheney, May 4, 1784<sup>59</sup>; was he in Francetown, N.H., 1790?<sup>60</sup>; are he & his wife the Joseph Barnes couple age 45+ liv. in Sharon, N.H., 1800 w/ a couple age 16-25?<sup>61</sup>

He married **SARAH** \_\_\_\_.<sup>62</sup> She is called “Granny Barnes” in Sharon, N.H. where she liv. for a time with her son Asa. She was a spinner and took her threads & those of her neighbours by horseback to Boston to sell, sometimes taking a neighbor girl with her.<sup>63</sup>

John was one of 22 men captured by the British from the Wethersfield vessel *Gen. Greene* & one of the 9 men from Rocky Hill (Stepney) who d. in N.Y. while still a prisoner.<sup>84</sup>
