ELCA colleges link service and learning with faith

As colleges of the church, Wartburg College and Luther College offer unique opportunities for students to express their faith and learn through service to others. Community service projects, volunteer programs, and mission trips energize students to make a difference, put their faith into action, and develop talents to share with others throughout their lives.

Luther College

A few years back, a group of Luther College students was completing a service learning trip to the Navajo Evangelical Lutheran Mission at

Rock Point, Ariz., when they were invited to the small, humble home of a 104-year-old Navajo woman who lived nearby. Her mind was sharp, but her eyesight was limited, so she touched each student's face and hair to connect with their names. She told them, "Now that you have come into my home, you are all my children."

The students had spent the week at the Navajo community assisting with an after-school program, working on a clean-up project, troubleshooting computer issues, and helping wherever they were needed. According to the Rev. Mike Blair,

Luther College campus pastor, the highlight for the students, faculty and staff during that trip was the rich blessing they received from the elder Navajo woman.

"The students understood why they had come — to receive a blessing, and they took that to heart to share that generosity with others," Blair said. "We go on these trips expecting to give, and often we find that what we receive is much greater than the experience of giving. It's the Gospel surprise."

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Luther College service trips take students to destinations abroad and in the U.S. to build houses. experience cross-cultural learning, and build relationships of learning and service. Last year, some 43 students, faculty and staff helped build Habitat for Humanity houses in Columbia, S.C., during spring break. The group members found benefit in limited Internet access and spent their evenings building relationships with each other by playing board games, reconnecting with their core commitments, and reflecting on their day's events.

"In higher education in general, many schools are understanding the value and impact of service learning that intersects with reflection, conversation and study," Blair said. "These service opportunities are a core way to live out our faith by following the example of Jesus."

"Being active in Habitat for Humanity at Luther for three straight years has been a wonderful blessing to me. I really feel that I am living out Luther's mission through my Habitat experiences. It is so humbling to know the impact we have made on the community just by nailing and painting. I am excited to see what God has in store for this upcoming trip in March."

Students say the service trips have helped them discover clarity about their own sense of calling by serving others. Blair cites an example of one Luther student who recently applied to join the Young Adults in Global Mission (YAGM) program as a way to grow deeper in her faith

and her understanding of the world. Her experiences studying abroad in Israel, Palestine and Jordan while in college and working two summers at a Lutheran camp in Colorado inspired her to intentionally accept the call to serve others.

Closer to home, Luther College students volunteer for the local food pantry, free clinic, schools, nursing homes, community organizations and student-led events. They are involved with local congregations to connect with other generations, and they volunteer to help survivors of domestic violence. In the fall and spring they join in community-wide clean-up days. This spring, Luther's Habitat for Humanity chapter and Education Department are both sending groups to work with Habitat for Humanity in Florida. A new event in the fall will give incoming freshmen an opportunity to make blankets and school kits for Lutheran World Relief.

Wartburg College

Service opportunities at Wartburg College center around the examples set by St. Elizabeth of Hungary and St. Francis of Assisi. The college devotes an entire week each year in November to community service and activism in celebration of St. Elizabeth. Student-led activities include food drives for the Northeast Iowa Food Bank, collections of clothing and funds for the homeless around the Cedar Valley, campus events to create "Blankets of Love" for youth at the Bremwood campus of Lutheran Services in Iowa, and learning sessions about hunger and homelessness.

"St. Elizabeth and St. Francis were young people who looked at their lives and the world around them and realized things weren't right," said the Rev. Dr. Ramona Bouzard, Wartburg Dean of Chapel, Moehlman Chaplaincy Chair. "They committed to giving up their

worldly possessions to serve people in great need and to care for the sick and dying. A core piece during St. Elizabeth Week is to educate and involve students in thinking about service, faith and justice."

"We are so grateful for the work the congregations have done to involve young people in service and reflection in faith."

Wartburg students can engage with the local community year-round as part of the "Orange Corps." Service-learning activities include volunteering at the local retirement center, assisting with childcare and working with the Iowa College AmeriCorps Program.

Students can also join a Wartburgsponsored service trip for hands-on volunteer work in communities across the U.S. Twelve trips are planned for the 2015-16 academic year, immersing students in communities where they can work with animal shelters, homeless populations, children and adults with disabilities, youth development programs, a native American reservation, and more. Students design and lead the trips, with Wartburg faculty and staff serving as trip advisors. They often stay at churches where congregation members welcome them with meals and hospitality.

"All of the trips are designed so students get to meet and talk with people," Bouzard said. "Even if the students are building homes or working with the environment, they are very much embedded in the community."

Reflection is built into the trips so that the students can think about

Human Trafficking Workshop at Decorah

Sunday, April 17 First Lutheran, Decorah 4 p.m.

The Northeastern Iowa Synod is partnering with the Iowa Department of Justice to present a second workshop about human trafficking. The "Stop Human Trafficking" workshop will be presented Sunday, April 17, 4 p.m., at First Lutheran, Decorah. Clergy members, hotel staff, law enforcement officials, first responders, teachers, social service professionals and others are invited to learn about human trafficking in Iowa and how to identify possible victims.

Michael J. Ferjak, senior criminal investigator with the lowa Department of Justice – Office of the Attorney General, will answer questions and present information about human trafficking, how local hoteliers and law enforcement can combat it, and available resources to respond.

Human trafficking is a form of modern-day slavery in which children and adults are illegally traded and exploited for sex or forced into labor against their will. The Northeastern lowa Synod is committed to offering workshops to raise awareness about human trafficking and how to respond if someone suspects a human trafficking situation.

they are not here just to care for themselves," Bouzard said. "Many students report that these trips have changed their life. They learn so much about what kind of needs are out there. We all kind of live in a bubble, and these trips help us see that there are real people in need."

Congregations lay the groundwork for service

The number of college students seeking service opportunities has grown over the years, and Bouzard and Blair credit the students' home congregations with nurturing that interest in mission and service in young people.

Blair points out that 15 years ago it was uncommon for college students to take international service trips. Today, he says that a growing number of students who enter college at Luther and apply for scholarships indicate they have already been on some type of domestic or international mission trip.

"Congregations have embraced the importance of service mission trips in young people, and it has shown in this generation," Blair said.

Bouzard says that students across the board are energized and they want to make a difference, and service volunteering has helped move them toward that.

"We are so grateful for the work the congregations have done to involve young people in service and reflection in faith," Bouzard said. "It makes a huge impact on students at Wartburg College. Even those students who did not have a faith background become involved in service through their friends who did."

From the President

The Power of Prayer and Easter Miracles

A few years ago, our middle child, Amanda, left in the middle of January for a semester in Scotland to study religion and history. After arriving in Scotland, and attending just three days of classes, she fell backwards out of a third story window. I received a phone call from the hospital, and after calls to my husband, Wartburg College, our family doctor, and others, I immediately started to pray unceasingly for her recovery. Not only did I pray, but my husband was in Florida at a continuing education event and all the ELCA pastors in attendance also prayed, and the entire Wartburg campus and our church family. Although Amanda had an unstable fracture of her first lumbar vertebra, which could easily have left her paralyzed or worse, she made a complete recovery—nothing short of a miracle. But I knew better. The power of prayers on her behalf and for the surgeon and nurses and all who cared for her made the difference in the outcome. Amanda still tells the story of feeling the prayers surround her as she lay in ER and as she fell, the hands of God holding her and my grandmother's voice telling her everything would be ok. (My grandmother had been dead over 10 years.) This all happened during the Lenten and Easter seasons, and each Easter (and every time I see her) I thank God for sharing this miracle with us, just as He did that first Easter morning! Never forget the Power of Prayer and to share it with all you meet!



WHO MAY REGISTER?

Voting members to the Synod Assembly will be the following:

- 1. All rostered individuals under call on the roster of the synod.
- 2. The formula for congregational representation for the Synod Assembly follows:
 - The total lay delegation from any congregation be as nearly as possible 50% male and 50% female.
 - Two voting members elected by each congregation,
 - plus one youth voting member elected by each congregation (must be eligible to vote in their congregation),
 - plus an additional lay voting member for every 750 baptized members, i.e., 750=1 additional, 1500=2 additional, 2250=3, etc.

- 3. Members of the Synod Council.
- 4. All retired clergy on the roster of the synod shall elect 10 percent of their number to be voting members; all other retired clergy shall be advisory members with voice but not vote.
- 5. All rostered persons on leave from call for reasons of disability shall elect 10 per cent of their number to be voting members to the Synod Assembly. There shall be a minimum of one (1) such person provided both voice and vote.

VISITORS

Any interested person may register as a visitor to the Synod Assembly; visitors do not have voice or vote. Rostered persons-not under call and retired clergy-not elected to represent retired clergy are permitted voice but not vote.

ON-CAMPUS HOUSING

Housing will be assigned on a first-registered, first-assigned basis in college residence halls. All rooms are air conditioned. Most rooms are double occupancy and have single beds, none are bunks. Sheets, blanket, pillow, towel and washcloth are provided. For your personal comfort, you may wish to bring an additional pillow or blanket. You will need to bring your own toiletries, such as soap and shampoo. Bathroom and shower facilities are shared, but designated as Men's or Women's.

MEALS

Registration fees include the following meals: (no meals on Friday, June 10)

Saturday, June 11: breakfast, lunch and dinner.
