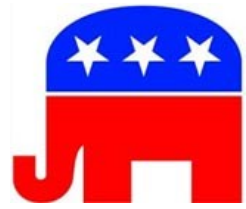

but four counties in a Democratic state, Martinez said "Republicans need to stop making assumptions, and they need to start talking to younger people, people of color, and ask them—not talk to them—ask them, 'What is it that we can do better? How do we earn your vote? How do we earn the ability for you to see that we can be the party that will make your life better and that of your children?' But we can't be the ones that come and tell them how things are going to be and how we have all the solutions."

President Barack Obama in 2012 expanded his lead among Hispanic, black, Asian and women voters, according to exit polling, leaving many Republicans wondering what they need to do to adapt to the nation's rapidly shifting demographics.

Martinez said Mitt Romney writing off 47 percent of the electorate as inevitable Obama voters was "ridiculous. That unfortunately is what sets us back as a party, our comments that are not thought through carefully. We need to embrace them not just at election time. We should not visit them when we need their vote and then walk away; and then four years go by and we go visit them again. We have to make them part of the solution, and the way you do that is by listening to them and then making that part of 'How do we do this together to make our lives all better?' And then once you've done it, you tell them we did it together."

The California state legislature allowed the Secretary of State's office to develop a way of using everyone with a drivers license signature and access to the Internet to register to voter. Gov. Brown speaking on college campus and other events that attract large number of your people got them to use this new system to register. In the last few days of the 2012 campaign more than 38,000 new voters registered in Sacramento County and about 75% percent of these registered as Democrats. Statewide over 500,000 voters used the new system to register to vote in the few weeks the system was available. Is it any wonder we lost?

WELFARE

Taxpayers last year spent \$1 trillion on welfare programs for households below the poverty line of \$23,000. This is enough money to give each of these households nearly \$60,000.

According to a report from Sen. Jeff Sessions of Alabama and the Senate Budget Committee's Republican staff, the federal government spent \$746 billion on welfare in the 2011 fiscal year, and states paid out \$254 billion in matching funds.

The federal total was up from \$563 billion in fiscal year 2008 and up from \$692 billion in fiscal 2009.

The federal welfare spending cited in the report does not include programs such as Medicare and Social Security, which are not means-tested and directed toward lower-income Americans or programs for veterans.

The Congressional Research Service reported that federal spending on health benefits for people with low income totaled \$339 billion in fiscal 2011, with \$295 billion spent on Medicaid. The second largest category, Cash Aid, totaled \$145 billion.

Federal welfare included \$101 billion for food assistance, including \$80 billion for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (food stamps). That's double what was spent in 2008. The total also includes \$2 billion for Nutritional

Assistance for Puerto Rico.

Taxpayers also provided \$41.4 billion on Pell Grants, \$46 billion on Housing and Development, \$7.5 billion on Head Start, and \$5 billion on Energy Assistance.

According to the Census Bureau, last year 16.8 million U.S. households were below the poverty line of \$23,000 per year for a family of four. If all households received an equal share of the \$1 trillion in welfare spending, they would each get \$59,523. And if only the federal share of welfare spending is considered, without state matching funds, each low-income household would still receive \$44,404 — nearly double the federal poverty line of \$23,000.
