Two will focus on the Soybean Science Kit training which has often been asked for. Even if your kit coordinator can't attend, send a teacher, volunteer, FFA member or others that might use the kit so that you have someone with "fresh training" available to help with your kit and increase usage. The Ag in the Classroom Information Meetings offer an opportunity to learn more about Ag in the Classroom, Soybean Science Kit training, educational resources, and activities you can use to teach others about agriculture. The meetings and training are open to Ag in the Classroom (AITC) volunteers, 4-H Extension staff and club leaders, agriculture education instructors, FFA Food for America committee chairmen, FFA Alumni, commodity groups, home school parents, teachers, Farm Bureau members and others interested in learning more about Ag in the Classroom. We're looking for a high school to participate in the AFBFA Essay Contest!

It's that time again! We are gearing up for the 2013-2014 Agriculture in a Growing World Grant and Essay Contest. The first part of this program is the grant. States can encourage schools to apply for a grant of up to 20 copies of *The Man Who Fed the World* and accompanying curriculum. **Applications will be online starting August 1**. When someone submits an application from your state a copy of this application will come to the State Literacy Coordinator (Darlene Arneson in Wisconsin). **Only one school per state will be selected.**

When the grant closes on October 1, 2013 we ask that you select one of the schools that applied to be the winner of the grant.

We hope that you will help promote the Agriculture in a Growing World Grant and Essay Contest as the American Farm Bureau Foundation for Agriculture continues to build awareness, understanding, and a positive public perception of agriculture through education. Are your county reports turned in?

Your reports are critical in supplying the information I need for my required reports.


The county AITC coordinator is responsible for compiling the <u>County AITC Report</u> which is due July 1. At the time of printing, I <u>DO NOT</u> have reports from: Brown, Clark, Door, Dunn, Eau Claire, Green Lake, Jackson, Jefferson, Kenosha, Kewaunee, LaCrosse, Lincoln, Marathon, Marinette, Marquette, Milwaukee, Monroe, Ozaukee, Polk, Portage, Price, Rock, Rusk, Shawano, St. Croix, Trempealeau, Waukesha, Winnebago and Wood. If you are one of these counties, please take time to fill it out! Additional copies can be found under "Volunteer Resources" on the www.wisagclassroom.com website. Please check with the other coordinators (Soybean Science Kit, Essay Coordinators) to provide accurate numbers – so that only one report is sent in from the county!! Some of you wear all three hats for your county (Ag in the Classroom, Soybean Science Kit, and Essay Coordinators) but many counties have different people or have multiple Soybean Science Kits. I really would like to have ONE report come back from the county that reflects everyone's numbers! On the www.wisagclassroom.org website under COUNTY INFORMATION, you can see who is listed as your county contacts for these three areas. Some of you also have two people listed as the County AITC Coordinator. Please work together to compile your numbers and just send back one report if possible.

Why fill out the reports? They help us to document in both reports Wisconsin Ag in the Classroom is required to provide to the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection and to the USDA. I need to document the number of students, schools and teachers reached; the number of dollars invested by county programs and sponsors; the number of volunteer hours; the types of activities that are being conducted; and other information asked in your report. Usage reports are also critical as I approach sponsors and funders who help offset the costs of many of our Soybean Science Kits, Amazing Corn Books and other resources.

Confirming Essay Contest Coordinators Too!

Having one person as the essay contest coordinator allows us to have direct communication with one person about essay judging, distributing information, offering teachers and parents one place to send essays, give WFBF Women's Committee members a county contact to receive winning essays from and other valuable advantages. In order to get all my materials ready for the August meetings, I need to verify who your county contact will be. A mailing was sent out to the 2012-13 essay coordinators asking them to respond. If I don't hear back from your county by the end of next week, I will assume that I can use last year's essay coordinator's name. If there is a unique situation with your county, I'll be in touch with you directly or with the District Coordinator. For counties that didn't have a coordinator last year and I was listed, I would really like to have someone in charge of the contest! This list will go out with the essay mailing and will be available on-line as the contest continues throughout the year. As changes occur, we'll update the website listing so teachers and students have the correct address to send their essays to.

Watch the **www.agfoundation.org** website (under What we support- Scholarships) for the 2014 White-Reinhardt Scholarships to the National Agriculture in the Classroom Conference. Two Scholarship opportunities are now available, one for Educators and one for Volunteer Educators. This Scholarship program is to provide travel expense funds to attend the national conference and then use the information gained to expand their outreach to students regarding food, fiber and fuel.

The White-Reinhardt Fund for Education is a special project of the Foundation in cooperation with the AFB Women's Leadership Committee. It was established to honor two former chairs of that committee, Berta White and Linda Reinhardt, who were leaders in the national effort to improve agricultural literacy.

Each application once submitted will be sent to your State Farm Bureau Agricultural Literacy Coordinator for approval. Transporting the kiosk

The kiosk is a two-person loading/unloading item! It also requires a van with stow-n-go or no seats, a truck that has an enclosure, or a cargo van. In the wintertime or extreme heat in the summer time, it shouldn't be left out in a vehicle as the computer and monitor are fragile. I really do not want it transported in an open pick-up truck if possible! In my van (Dodge Caravan), I put the base in the center section (with seats down) and put the monitor section in the far back with the back seat and a blanket or something to support it. The key is not breaking that monitor and trying to keep it upright if possible!

Where to find volunteers for a County AITC Committee

- 1. Review your county Farm Bureau membership lists
 - a. Sort by township and highlight names from each school district
 - b. Do you recognize members that are teachers? Have youth in school? Are active in other groups that promote agricultural education activities?
 - c. Ask your county Farm Bureau board members to provide 1-2 names from areas they represent or that they have signed up for membership
- 2. Submit articles in your county newsletter
 - a. Explain what AITC is and what your county is doing (or plans to do)
 - b. Ask for volunteers and provide a contact person for them (your county AITC coordinator)
 - c. Find out if members already are working with schools or hosting farm tours
 - d. Ask if any of the members are teachers, retired teachers, 4-H leaders...
- 3. Contact agriculture education instructors from your county
 - a. Find the listing at http://www.dpi.wi.gov/ag/pdf/ageddirectory.pdf
 - b. Agriculture education and FFA chapters may have active Food for America programs, students that would like to use agricultural literacy activities as their Education SAE (Supervised Agricultural Experience Project), or with the PALS (Partners in Active Learning Support) projects.
 - c. Contact local FFA Alumni affiliates- many members have an interest in ag literacy!
- 4. Involve teachers on your committee- they can provide information on their needs, how to contact schools, and other information on distributing materials
 - a. You can find school directories on the DPI website
 - b. Public schools- Elementary, middle and high school (any subject)
 - c. 4th grade (because we study Wisconsin in that grade)
 - d. Private schools
 - e. Agriculture education instructors
 - f. Home school parents or home school groups that meet in your area
- 5. Contact county extension and 4-H programs
 - a. Is there an after-school program in your county?
 - b. Do any 4-H clubs want to work with agricultural literacy programs?
 - c. Is there a county 4-H leaders group that might be interested in joint projects?
- 6. What other groups are in your county that might be good partners?
 - a. Dairy promotion and commodity groups
 - b. Chamber of Commerce programs
 - c. Other farm organizations and groups
 - d. Check your phone books, do Internet searches, and other sources!
 - e. Submit articles to local papers, commodity newsletters and email groups to contacts in various groups and organizations.
