Nervous, scared, and excited, we awaited Emily's birth. Our doctor scheduled a C-Section delivery on Friday, January 3rd. A few days before her birth, I began to feel Emily knocking at the doors of life. By the time I arrived at the hospital on January 3rd at 6:00 am, Emily was ready to be born. The day started out with hospital routine, triage, nurses checking vital signs, and IVs going into my arm. However, as the staff began to trickle into my room, we realized it was no ordinary day. No, I am not talking about my daughter about to be born, for we were overwhelmed by the sea of scarlet and gray colors that the hospital staff and visitors wore. It was the day of the Fiesta Bowl 2003 after all, and we just happened to be having a baby on this day. My doctor arrived a few minutes before surgery to check on me. She sported a scarlet red blazer, and an Ohio State turtle neck. As I looked up at the nurse helping me along to the surgical room, I noticed that she was wearing Ohio State earrings. During my surgery prep, the discussion didn't circle around what we would name the baby, what sex we anticipated, or how Dad was holding up. Instead, questions began with what time is kick off, where are you watching the game, and how everyone hoped the Buckeyes would win the national championship. As the clock ticked ahead, Emily was born at 8:24 am and within seconds we heard the scream of life. The cry from a newly born baby is the most beautiful sound. It was clear and loud as Emily let us know she was ready to begin her life.

As I gazed at Emily for the first time, the words of the *Shehechiyanu* went through my mind. What else is there to say. Thank you God for her life. We praise You, Eternal God, Sovereign of the Universe, for giving us this child, for sustaining us through surgery, and for enabling us to reach this day together as a family. Amazing! Truly Awesome! There are no other words to express the miracle of birth. Of course, the Buckeyes went on to win on Emily's birthday, and we knew we would forever be a family of Buckeye fans, as all Columbus celebrated. Please join with David, Jeremy, and me on Saturday morning, March 8 at 10:30 am, as we give Emily Hallie Lefton her Jewish name.





Approved Policy Statement Regarding Burial and Purchasing of Burial Plots in Temple Israel Cemeteries

Any Jewish person, his/her spouse/partner, his/her dependent children, and others as approved by the Senior Rabbi of Temple Israel may be buried within any of Temple Israel's cemeteries. The liturgy to be used will be that of a Jewish funeral. Only clergy of Temple Israel may officiate or other Jewish clergy, as approved by the Senior Rabbi of Temple Israel. Any individual may purchase a burial plot on behalf of any individual eligible for burial in Temple Israel cemeteries. The cost of burial plots and associated opening/closing fees will be determined from time to time by the Temple Israel Foundation, in consultation with the Finance Committee and the Cemetery Committee of Temple Israel.

The following guidelines will be followed for the purchasing of plots after January 1, 2003: A congregant in good standing may at any time purchase "family plots" at the Temple Israel Cemetery located on Performance Parkway. There is no limit to the number of family plots a congregant may purchase. A congregant in good standing may at any time purchase a plot for self, dependent children or spouse/partner at the current congregant rate. A congregant in good standing may at any time purchase a plot for ANY family member (parents, adult children, siblings, grandparents, grandchildren) at the congregant rate plus a 40% surcharge. Any individual may at any time purchase a plot for a person eligible for burial in Temple Israel cemeteries at the congregant rate plus a 50% surcharge.

At the time of death, if the deceased (or dependent child or spouse/partner) is a member of Temple Israel in good standing, there are no additional fees/assessments (other than those levied for the purpose of opening/closing the grave). If the deceased (or dependent child or spouse/partner) is a member of Temple Israel NOT in good standing, the responsible party must make payment/arrange for payment of any arrears or be treated as a non-member. If payment and/or arrangements are made, there are no additional fees/assessments (other than those

levied for the purpose of opening/closing the grave). If the deceased is not a member, Temple Israel will charge a "Funeral and Burial Services Fee." This fee will be determined by the Finance Committee, in consultation with the Cemetery Committee and the Senior Rabbi. (NB: The Cemetery Committee recommends a fee of \$500 if Temple Israel clergy is requested. A portion of the fee, as determined by the above committees, should go to the appropriate clergy's Discretionary Fund. The Cemetery Committee recommends a fee of \$250 if Temple Israel clergy is not requested.) If the deceased is not a member and is indigent as outlined in the Columbus Jewish Family Services program, no fees are levied.

These policies may be changed only under two conditions. Permanent changes may be made by the appropriate committees/boards of the Temple Israel Foundation and Temple Israel according to the constitutionally approved method. Temporary changes may be made by the Senior Rabbi (or his/her designate) in consultation and agreement with the President of Temple Israel (or his/her designate) if it is determined that extenuating circumstances exist in a given situation and may modify aspects of the current policy.

Administrator's Report

(As reported at the January Board of Trustees Meeting) Bequests: Temple Israel has received notification of two bequests from the estates of Miriam Cohen and Lillian Callif Gross.

Facility Update: A digital copier has been leased for five years from the Gordon Flesh Company. As part of the arrangement, Temple Israel will keep the former analog office copier for use by the Pre-School and Religious/Hebrew School. The leasing arrangement is costing \$162 more a month, but the long-term goal is to print the Bulletin in-house at a savings of \$500+ a month. American Air replaced burned-out "heat boards" in three of the eleven roof-top units. Electrical surges were suspected to be the cause of failure. Backflow certification was done on a 3" backflow valve in the southwest corner of the Mechanical Room. City records show that the boiler (removed for reno-

vation) is still in place, as the proper paperwork was not submitted by the plumber to the city clarifying removal during remodeling.

Library Grant: Temple Israel reapplied for a \$1,000 grant from the Columbus Jewish Foundation for participation in the Columbus Online Jewish Resource Center to computerize the learning center's 7000+ holdings to allow on-line data base connectivity via the Internet. Temple Israel was approved for this two years ago, but did not implement the program at that time due to the added cost of data input.

January 2003 Board Highlights

Annual Meeting The Annual Meeting, at which time election of officers and trustees will take place, is planned for Sunday, April 27, and will be a breakfast meeting held during Religious School.

Strategic Planning Dan Finkelman, Vice President, distributed his report. In summary, the board "pretty much agreed on the high and low priorities," namely: High – Budget, Staff Quality, Membership, Religious/Hebrew School, Fundraising; Low – Constitution, Technology, Communities of Interest, Cantor, Role/Use of auxiliaries. It was commented that the second or middle group (Youth Ed, Board Leadership, Adult Ed, Family Ed, Board role, governance, security, youth programming) are only possible if the "high" marks group is achieved. "We have to take care of the fundamentals." Dan suggested that this exercise be undertaken every two years or so.

Fundraising Brian Tuckerman, Chair, reported that the God Squad event will take place on Sunday, May 4. The committee is pursuing sponsorships again this year. Videotapes have been prepared for potential sponsors – including a sponsorship form, information about the God Squad and about Temple Israel in the tape case.

Finance Ted Smiley, Vice President, reported that, through November 30, the synagogue projected \$695,000 in income but collected \$812,000. The projection was for \$602,000 in expenses, but expenses have been held to \$579,000. He also reminded the board that approximately \$100,000-140,000 will be lost in the next fiscal year in gifts/grants.

Shabbat & Holidays Committee Irv Boiman stated that the committee is in the initial stages of defining the process and guidelines to make recommendations to the Executive Committee and Board. He announced that three congregational potlucks are planned. Rabbi Nemitoff reported on the pilot prayer book, saying he'd received a few hundred responses. The committee met and filled out the CCAR survey. Opinions were split between positive and negative reactions. The next copy of the prayer book will be sent to rabbis by the end of the year. The prayerbook will be produced in 2005.

Education Search Committee Rabbi Nemitoff reported that our current model is that two rabbis run our Religious School program but that a new staffing structure is being considered – that will not create a net change in staff expense. Rabbi Lefton wishes to curtail her hours in the future as she wishes to spend more time with her family. A job description for the Educator position is being created. Co-chairs of the search process are Ted Fireman and Alice Simon. It is hoped that by July 1, someone will be in place.

Security Jeff Ungar distributed copies of an Emergency Procedures Manual, an in-house document for all Temple Israel staff. Upon recommendation by the committee, consisting of Harvey Schwager, David Lamden, Elaine Tenenbaum and Jeff Ungar, the following motion was made by Jeff Ungar, seconded by Alan Lichtcsien and unanimously approved – that additional needed wiring and telephones be purchased to enable front-door entry from the telephone system along with the purchase and installation of a magnetic lock for the front door, allowing access from the receptionist's desk. The cost of these is estimated at \$1,792 for the door lock and approximately \$3,000 for the wiring and phones. The committee also looked at the need to lock the Sanctuary doors – if the synagogue pursues facility rental on a large scale. This item was placed on-hold. Parking lot lighting was also discussed and tabled due to the \$30,000-35,000 price tag.

Use of Facilities Committee The committee, chaired by Harvey Schwager, has been meeting regularly to discuss on-going facility issues and recently held a focus group of bar/bat mitzvah parents to

discuss facility usage fees. At its most recent meeting, the committee advocated using "this great untapped asset" for rental income. Further it was recommended that \$1,350 – 2,500 be earmarked for a Grand Opening Event, targeted to prospective corporate/association renters. All comparable facilities in Columbus were examined. Although the pricing structure has not been set, it was reported that the Athenaeum, for example, charges \$3,000 for facility use and that the Greek Orthodox Church covers their entire operating costs by their facility rental fees. The board unanimously approved the expenditure to plan and produce this event to showcase our facility to prospective corporate/association renters. The committee will now develop a competitive pricing structure, taking into consideration all associated costs and wear-and-tear on the facility.

Cemetery Report Gary Cooper, chair, distributed the Recommended Policy Statement Regarding Burial and Purchasing of Burial Plots. He thanked the committee, comprised of Ken Chambers, Michael Epstein, Bernie Friedman, Tod Friedman, Rabbi Nemitoff and Elaine Tenenbaum. The recommended policy was unanimously approved. Membership/Finance Joint Committee Artie Isaac reported on several meetings with Ted Smiley and Elaine Tenenbaum. There will be no across-the-board dues increase, but the following was recommended to and unanimously approved by the Board: A membership includes all family members living in the same house, with no limit for the number of generations and relationships. A membership excludes all living in another house, even in cases of recent marital separation or divorce. Members should pay dues at 1.5-2% of their adjusted gross income. A Fair Share dues levels chart will be provided to members for ease in calculating. If the Fair Share level presents a hardship, then members are expected to pay at minimums set forth in Categories of Membership. If this is not possible, then the member is expected to fill out the Dues Abatement Form. The individual who pays for the membership will be designated as the member unless another party is delegated by the payer as the member. The Capital Assessment should be merged with the Building fund. Member education regarding this should begin in early 2003. No separate membership/dues categories should be set for Single, Senior or Divorced households. The Fair Share level applies to all member households. All members will be asked to fill out an Annual Commitment Form, to be mailed to households in early May. Categories of Membership will now include: Full Member* (Age 30+: \$1,500/Age 31-35: \$1,200); Junior Member (to Age 22 or Full Time student:\$18/Age 22-25:\$400/ Age 26-30: \$600); Associate Member (one who is a full member in good standing of another synagogue: \$500); Legacy Member (a oneyear trial membership for the adult child of a member, after which the legacy member needs to decide whether to become a full member: \$180); Joint Membership (applies to families consisting of adult parents and children living under the same roof: \$1,500) * Full dues is expected unless a financial hardship is determined, in which case a Dues Abatement Form is submitted and approved by the VP-Finance and the Administrator. Members are expected to pay dues of at least the minimums indicated above up to 2% of adjusted gross income. Courtesy membership has been dissolved. Out-of-town and elderly memberships do not exist.

Rabbi's Report Rabbi Nemitoff encouraged the board to attend the First Friday Shabbat dinner. He also reminded the board that he will be on Sabbatical during the month of February.

Congregants are welcome to attend board meetings. All meetings begin at 7pm. Upcoming board meetings will be held March 25, April 29, May 27 and June 24. 




