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

Since I spend much of my time teaching, or preparing to teach, it is a *mechaye* (a life-giving experience) to refresh my intellectual and spiritual engines when I get an opportunity. Furthermore, I consider it my sacred duty to continue my own learning and deepening of my Torah knowledge. So every other summer, I embrace the opportunity to spend almost two weeks in July as a full-time student, which I did this year. With dozens of colleagues, the setting in which I learned is the rabbinic seminar at the

Shalom Hartman Institute in Jerusalem. "Hartman" is a pluralistic Jewish education organization, a think-tank for innovative Jewish ideas, and an oasis on the rough terrain of Zionist and Israeli ideologies. Today, the SHI runs a variety of programs for Jewish professionals and lay leaders from the Diaspora, for Israeli educators, and it is the home of a highly-respected Israeli high school. The Hartman Institute is one of few genuinely pluralist purveyors of Jewish life, sometimes paddling upstream against the strong current of denominations and ideologies hardly distinguishable by most: ultra-Orthodox, Conservative, Reform, Reconstructionist, Hasidic, modern Orthodox and the list of narrow groupings goes on and on.

Some say that the multiplicity of thinking within the Jewish people tears us apart. After all, the Jewish people is a fragile house which can hardly tolerate domestic strife. On the other hand, it is also our internal diversity that makes the Jewish people so unusual, interesting and colorful. Nowhere is the multihued fabric of our people on display more than in the State of Israel. One need only walk down any street from Haifa to Eilat, from the Golan Heights to Ashkelon, from Jerusalem to Tel Aviv, to experience the vitality of our people in our homeland. The wonderful yield of the blood, sweat and tears of Israel's pioneers, the founders and their children is in plain view everywhere one looks, from Israel's diverse and robust economy to its leadership in creating a civil society amidst some of the world's most violent and oppressive authoritarian regimes.

All of this is reason to celebrate Israel's achievements in its young history, and yet, even after 63 years of independence and amazing contributions to the world in industry, agriculture, science and technology, not to mention philosophy, governance, literature and religious thought, the world still has a problem with Israel. In our day, we are experiencing a systematic and dangerous attack on the Jewish people's historic ties, our unbroken connection to the Land of Israel. The mantra our young adults hear on their campuses is "BDS, BDS, BDS: Boycott, Divest, Sanctions," a loosely-organized international campaign to, what the movement calls, "delegitimize" the State of Israel. In truth, this campaign uses fancy language to hide what it really is: an assault on Israel that singles it out from the nations of the world and demonizes it. BDS is a propaganda tool to create an image of Israel as an apartheid state run by Nazis. Such a

state, goes the mantra, should be destroyed through isolation and punishment.

I am happy to say that here in Columbus, support for the State of Israel remains strong, among both Jews and Christians. However, in other parts of the country, some Jews have been slowly influenced by the campaign to create a new narrative that chips away at the Jewish people's historic and legitimate claim to our fair share of Eretz Yisrael. And while the Jewish people has and still can withstand diversity in its house, we cannot stomach serious doubt about the justice of the Jewish people's right to our homeland, our democratic and Jewish state. We must persevere against such doubt. That said, there are no simple solutions that will bring the Arab-Israel conflict to an end simply because we want everyone to get along. The situation is complex and challenging. Moreover, Arab Israelis and the Palestinians do indeed have legitimate grievances.

Truly, the very best way to understand the miracle that is Israel, even as it confronts extraordinary challenges, is to join me in becoming a student of history and politics, an informed member of our people or a fellow-traveler. **Come to Israel with me April 22** – **May 4**, experience the exquisite Israeli countryside first-hand, especially with people from your home community with whom you can form bonds of friendship, trust and memory. An adult group shall travel to Israel as a Temple Israel family; you will see how we are a part of the much larger and astonishingly varied Jewish people. Seriously consider exploring with me the bustling boulevards of the State of Israel, set right alongside the ancient alleyways of our biblical forebears. Once there, you will see, experience and understand what an astonishing people we are. See page 9 for details about our journey.

May this be a year of peace for us, for the People and State of Israel and for all humanity.

Many of us have read When Bad Things Happen to Good People by Rabbi Harold Kushner. I know I received this book from Brotherhood years ago and read it cover to cover trying to understand my own personal tragedy. Well, what about the good things happening to good people? I found some research on exactly this – Why Good Things Happen to Good People: The Exciting New Research That Proves the Link Between Doing Good and Living a Longer, Healthier, Happier Life.

So here are 7 tips from that research for permanent happiness, all based on reaching out & offering yourself to life.

1. Make a Celebratory Visit. This is a special visit that celebrates what someone else means to you & what they have given to you. It demonstrates gratitude, which has been proven in studies to boost mood & health.

2. Look at the Big Picture. Remember that you are an essential part of a very alive universe, no matter how tough a day or week or even

So be sure to remind yourself of that by looking up at the night sky, volunteering or going to temple. Each of our lives has ups & downs, but be sure to embrace the larger scale of all of life & its diversity.

3. Be a Keeper of Meaning. Knowing that your life has meaning brings a deep-down satisfaction that offers lasting happiness. One way to experience more meaning is to bring meaning to the lives of others by teaching them a special skill of yours. This can be as simple as showing how to listen & be a caring person.

4. Forgive Yourself. Okay, you've made mistakes. We all have. However, going over (& over) your mistakes keeps you feeling disconnected & unloved. Instead, think back to a time where you were forgiven. Remember the good feelings. Ask God for forgiveness. Try to see yourself from the perspective of someone else & ask yourself whether they would judge you as harshly as you judge yourself.

5. Tune in to Those Around You. For one day, decide to be courteous to everybody in your path – even buoyantly so. Whether it be a neighbor, a stranger, or of course, friends. Maybe even reach out & be extra nice to a congregant. At the end of the day you'll feel much happier, relaxed & more connected.

6. Be a Good Friend. A good friend wants the best for you & is happy when something great happens in your life. Be that friend. Repair any issue or rifts in your friendships when possible. And rekindle old friendships – look up friends from childhood or college, or those who have moved away, & reach out to them. Reshape your friendship networks.

7. Nurture Your Creativity. Creativity brings joy, & the personality trait most linked to creativity is being open to experience – trying new things, being open to fantasy, discovering new connections. Listen to music, read books, go to a museum. Try a different approach to a familiar routine. Maybe that different approach is reaching out to someone to join you for a Shabbat dinner or a cup of coffee.

So what if each of us tried even just a couple or a few of these 7 steps? My guess is we might just find that good things can, in fact, happen to good people.


