## March Madness

In a few weeks many in our congregation will be fretting over their brackets for the NCAA basketball tournament to decide the number one team in the nation. While I enjoy a variety of sports and growing up in suburbs of Los Angeles my father would make sure that I was at least conversant about the Dodgers, Rams and Lakers along with both USC and UCLA, however I am not usually laser focused on any particular sport. It was not until a few years ago when I was asked to join a Presbyterian Youth Worker brackets pool that I was reminded of the excitement of rooting for the teams that you have chosen to win. Now I can't wait each year for March Madness just to see how close my predictions come to reality. Of course I have sentimental favorites from the west coast and some teams I pick because I like their mascot and a few due to their season records. For me it is all in fun.

The thing about the NCAA basketball tournament is that we are often reminded that anything can happen, that when the tournament begins with 64 teams becoming a champion is still possible for any team regardless of where you are seeded. Ask anyone who had their brackets busted last year by Florida Gulf Coast, a 15 seed team that knocked of 2 seed Georgetown and then San Diego State.

The movie, *Glory Road*, immortalizes the 1966 NCAA champions from Texas Western College upsetting the number 1 ranked Kentucky in the championship game. The Texas Western coach, Don Haskins, is portrayed as taking a risk by creating a predominately black mixed race team in an era of limited racial integration. With mounting pressure including death threats to his family due to the racial tensions exposed by the success of

his basketball team, Haskins plays only the black players on his team against the all white Kentucky team.

Haskins is later quoted as saying he never set out to be a racial pioneer or to change the world, however his decisions in 1966 are credited for setting in motion the desegregation of college sports in the south.

March Madness is madness because in any given year, at any given time the under dog, the teams with what appears to be the least potential can prove to be winners, can achieve the extraordinary, can change the world.

Jesus filled his brackets with the under dogs, with the last seeds that normally would have no chance at success. Jesus created teams of disciples and followers that were filled with the down trodden, the outcast, the orphaned and forgotten and set them on a course for greatness.

Jesus declared that the Kingdom of Heaven is the ultimate bracket buster, he said, "The last shall be first and the first shall be last." It seems, in fact, that this idea of the last becoming first is a distinctive feature of the Kingdom of God and that Jesus' followers should be people who are marked by a predisposition to put the "least of these" before themselves and their own interests.

It is interesting how we will often root for the underdog in athletic competitions, last year I guarantee Florida Gulf Coast became the darling of many a basketball fan who, until they beat Georgetown, had never heard of them before. We love the come from behind win, the David's who beat the Goliaths.

# Mission

## These are gold!

Imagine getting that reaction for giving a person a pair of socks. Yet, that is exactly what he told me. I was helping out at Mercy House recently. One of my duties was to oversee the clothing distribution tables. The reaction when a homeless person received a pair of clean socks was just amazing. They were so grateful. They said things like, "Thank you so much." "These are wonderful. I had to throw out my other socks because they had worn out." "You don't know how much this means to a person on the street." "Gotta have clean socks 'cause your feet need to stay healthy." But, I was almost moved to tears when one man said, "These are gold." Thank you to everyone at CHPC church who donated to the "Knock Your Socks Off" campaign. It is not too late to donate more ---new ones but clean, gently used socks are ok too.

One of the most frequent requests was for underwear. They have an opportunity to shower at the facility. Imagine taking a shower, but having no fresh underwear to put on. You can donate new packaged underwear too. Sometimes women's underwear isn't packaged but it still has the tags on it. These are acceptable as well. It just has to be new. So when you spot an underwear or a sock sale, think about purchasing some for the homeless who access Mercy House. Many of the clients there need the larger sizes. But there is a need for all sizes.

Bob Lewis and Dwight Peterson helped out on different Monday evenings at Mercy House. The men were requesting long pants. They saw the need and shared the need with the mighty Men's Breakfast. Mike Landreth put the plan into action and suggested that each of them bring at least one pair of pants to the breakfast the next week. They responded with an incredible donation of an assortment of over **sixty** long casual pants and shorts.

Jan and Dwight Peterson then sorted them and had each pair labeled with waist and length on masking tape. This month we were able to distribute them to many very grateful men. The fact that they were labeled by size made the "shopping" experience so much easier. So if you have long casual (not dress) pants – men' or women's – that you haven't worn in long while (and might never wear again) that you would be willing to donate, bring them to church. All sizes are appreciated. Jeans and sweats are very popular. All that is required is that they are clean, not stained nor torn. If you could label them with the size written on masking tape, it would be so helpful.



Other heavily requested items are long sleeve t-shirt or sweatshirt type tops. There is a need for all sizes but especially the larger sizes – extra- large and plus sizes. Again, if they are clean, not stained or torn, they are welcome. Warm jackets of any size would find a new home too.

Finally, consider volunteering one Monday evening at Mercy House. It was a great experience and not at all difficult. I am a novice- only been there twice. I was a little hesitant and unsure about going, but Joan Herrick and Dwight and Jan Peterson invited me to go with them and that is all it took. If you are interested, sign up on the patio and indicate you would like to carpool with someone and I am sure those arrangements can be made.

Remember the words of Jesus, "I tell you the truth, whatever you did for one of the least to these brothers of mine, you did it for me." Matthew 25:40

# Worship and Music

## FINDING PERSONAL RELEVANCE TO OUR WORSHIP

I am reminded that part of the uniqueness of our church is in the myriad of worshippers who came from different faith backgrounds before attending Canyon Hills Presbyterian Church. As a former practicing Catholic, I can attest to this uniqueness and subscribe to its origins.

But why is this case? Why do we attend CHPC? Here are some answers that were brought to my attention:

“I want a fantastic youth group for my teenager.”

“I want a Sunday school theology lovingly taught to my children.”

“I found a relaxed atmosphere to practice my faith without the fire and brimstone of my earlier memories of church.”

“I can give of my talents that would not be accepted elsewhere.”

Most of these comments were made from attendees who had previous worship experience in their lives. But what about those who are coming in for the first time and do not recognize what we find relevant?

Here are a few things we, our church, does on Sunday to help make church connect with daily life;

1. Our connect table – Our greeters near the steps and our connect table with brochures and refreshments help our visitors and members feel they can participate in something greater than themselves. A warm handshake, smile and hello remind everyone that we are in this world together, struggling through similar things. One day a week we can freely meet without judgment and set aside our griefs at the foot of the cross.

2. Clothing – From three piece suits to shorts and Birkenstocks, our freedom of dress exemplifies our tolerance to what we wear on Sunday. Our focus is bringing our internal selves to God and not the external.

3. Styles of Music – Don't know about you, but I have 100 selections of music my family listens to on Pandora. Each channel describes not only what we like, but what mood we are in for that particular day. Our church has organ preludes, piano postludes, hymns, a sentimental benediction, a band and choir that present music anywhere from blue grass and spirituals to gospel and contemporary praise songs. This flexibility speaks volumes on how we welcome our worshippers and their choice of music.

4. Liturgy – Our Call to Worship, Assurance of Pardon, Affirmation of Faith, Lord's Prayer, Sermon, Doxology, Communion and Benedictions remind us of our origins. Its structure, common participation, and connection to our Presbyterian faith allow us a chance not only to find comfort in tradition, but to find Jesus in our proclamations. It can change our attitudes, help us experience joy regardless of our circumstances and be open to epiphanies that can set us on fire.

5. Joys and Concerns – Our opportunity to express moments in our daily life is a crucial part of worship. It trickles down to outcomes such as prayers, meals, cards and love and care for each other.

As we move through new ways to address growth and mission, let us remember our roots and the incredible tradition we preserve as faithful Presbyterians.



The church season of Lent begins on Ash Wednesday. Our evening worship service will be a time of reflection and preparation for the season of Lent. All are invited to join us for this special service.

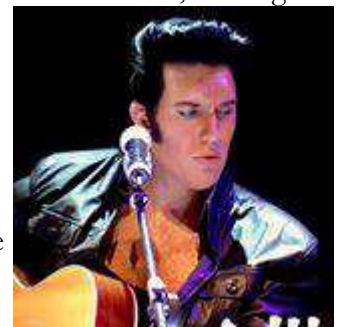

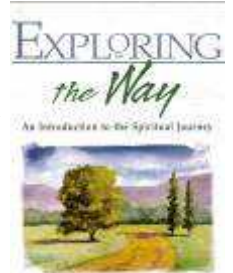
## EXPLORING THE WAY: AN INTRO TO THE SPIRITUAL JOURNEY
