I am very proud to be your representative, to serve as your County Council President, and stand along side you as we continue to work for *every*child.*one*voice.



# Fathers, Food & Children

The number of overweight children and fathers is increasing. Currently, over 64% of the U.S. population is overweight, and 22% of kids between 6 and 18 are considered obese (obesity being 20% or more overweight). Being overweight has health disadvantages, but children who are overweight are often victims of ridicule and teasing as well.

At the University of Minnesota, researchers surveyed over 4,000 7<sup>th</sup> through 12<sup>th</sup> graders on body satisfaction, self-esteem, depression, and teasing. They found 30% of adolescent girls and 25% of boys were teased by peers concerning their weight. Additionally, 28% of girls and 16% of boys were teased by family members.

To combat this trend of unnecessary weight and body image problems, the American Academy of Pediatrics recommends that parents have an annual Body-Mass Index (BMI) check to identify and prevent obesity. One study (Golan, 1999) found that both fathers and children lost weight when fathers were educated on the importance of exercise, good eating habits, and the dangers of a sedentary lifestyle.

#### To Think About...

What kind of influence are you having on your children's health habits? One of the most important factors is your *modeling* -- your own diet and exercise habits. A <u>1999 study by Child</u> <u>Trends</u> concluded that, "the most serious threat to the health of American children is the behavior of their own parents. " Other research found that families where fathers modeled and supported good eating habits tended to eat more meals together, watch TV less, and exercise more often.

There are about 26,000 Orange County students receiving services under the Exceptional Education Department. Their placements range from homebound to fully included in all regular classrooms. They are a huge portion of our population and their parents and guardians are as talented and diverse as the students are. They do have some special issues, but PTA should recognize that it is our responsibility to address these issues with our other issues. We truly need to live *"every*child, *one*voice".

#### Governor Jeb Bush's annual Black History Month Essay Contest Official Rules and Guidelines

Governor Jeb Bush's annual Black History Month Essay Contest is open to all K-12 students in the state of Florida. Three winners will be selected: one elementary (K-5 student), one middle (6-8 student) and one high school (9-12 student) student. Winners will be notified on **January 26, 2004.** 

- Entries must be emailed to *blackhistoryessay@myflorida.com*, or mailed to Ricardo Rodriguez in the Governor's Office, 206 the Capitol, Tallahassee, FL, 32399, by **5:00p.m. Monday, January 5, 2004.**
- Essays should address the following topic: "What Impact has an African American Entertainer, 'Singer,' 'Dancer,' 'Director,' or 'Actor/Actress' from Florida Had on My Life."
- · Each student may enter only one essay.
- Essays should be no longer than 500 words in length.
- A parent must sign or type name on a waiver form allowing publication of the student's essay in the event that they
  are selected as a winner. Parental waiver can be obtained by logging onto the Governor's Black History Month
  webpage on the *myflorida.com* web portal or

http://www.myflorida.com/myflorida/governorsoffice/black\_history/essay.html A parental waiver must accompany.

- Essays submitted must include: contestant's name, home address, telephone number, school the student attends, grade level and title of the essay.
- Winners will receive a 4-year full tuition scholarship to any Florida state college or university of their choice, provided by Florida Prepaid Education Foundation.
- All travel and lodging expenses will be paid for the winners and their immediate family members. Winners will be awarded their scholarships at the Governor's annual Black History Month reception, which will be held on February 2, 2004 at the Governor's Mansion in Tallahassee.


