

Hunterdon. We were up 2-0, playing very well and gave up a bad goal right before halftime then they came out like gangbusters in the second half. It was sad, disappointing for us but that's part of the game," Kapner said.

With an 11-1-1 start, the Blue Devil defense and athletic goalie Mike Lessner were superb but the midfield strength made it much easier by controlling to ball in opponents' territory.

"The defense played well. That was obvious. The power of the team was midfield. Mike Irving, Pat Tresnan! One of the great losses we had was not only did we lose two of the four in the back but we felt it necessary to move Pat out of the midfield. Outside halfbacks Andy (Flood) and (Kevin) Murphy, and Ryan Heine in the middle played wonderfully. Midfield dominated the ability to control the ball and kept it in the attacking third," Kapner said.

Through the efforts of the midfield, senior strikers Tom McManus, who led the team with 10 goals and seven assists, and Mike Forgash (5 goals, 2 assists) reeked havoc on opponents' goal area. Murphy had three goals and an assist. Irving also got in his licks with nine goals and four assists but the team that outscored opponents 34-11 rarely scored more than two goals in a game until the end of the year.

"If there was one weakness it was we didn't score enough goals. We were creating tons of opportunities. The irony is the last two games of the year, we scored six goals and we averaged about one-and-a-half goals a game," said Kapner.

Saunders and Tresnan made First Team All-Union County (UC) for defense. Irving was All-UCFirst Team as a midfielder, McManus as a striker and Lessner, who recorded 11 shutouts, as goalie. Breza was named to the All-UC Second Team, while Flood, Forgash and Murphy were Honorable Mentions.

In his sophomore season, Lessner took over for the injured Greg O'Brien at goal then was a starting striker his junior season when the team advanced to the sectional finals.

"He's a three-sport guy, a basketball player and he had not really stepped on the goal since his sophomore year. When we put him out there, it was like he didn't miss a beat," Kapner said. "He basically was our sweeper and our goalkeeper. To go from goalkeeper to striker back to goalkeeper and run 11 shutouts is a pretty cool thing."

Judy Zeikel has been pals with Doug and Lane Kehler for almost as long as she can remember. She's known Doug since the fourth grade at Franklin School and she's been buds with the former Marie (Lane) Priscoe since the seventh grade at Roosevelt. They all graduated in WHS's Class of

Her friendship with Lane continued through their college days—Zeikel at St. Lawrence and Priscoe at Vermont – and three years as roommates in Boston beginning their adult lives. Eventually Zeikel married Jonathan Stavis and moved to Cohasset, Massachusetts, just south of Boston where they began raising a family, which now consists of Minnie 9, Nicholas 7 and Callie 5. Lane and Doug Kehler married and settled in Westfield. About 51/2 years ago they had triplets: Wil, Jackson and Laurajane.

In the last year, things went very awry for the Kehlers. First grandpa Gary, the legendary WHS football, wrestling and golf coach, passed away last December at age 71. Then within a week of his fifth birthday in July, Wil Kehler was diagnosed with osteosarcoma in his left femur, a very rare and very malignant form of bone cancer. After undergoing months of treatment, including nearly five months of chemotherapy at Memorial Sloane Kettering Cancer Center in Manhattan, young Wil finally underwent limb-salvage surgery about a month ago. The medical costs, including intensive physical rehabilitation and possible future surgeries, have been, and will continue to be, staggering for the young family. Even moreso because Lane had to give up her job and Doug had to stop tutoring at night in order to be with Wil in New York or home with their other chil-

Friends of the family created the Wil Kehler Fund, where many people have graciously made major contributions to help the Kehlers defray some of the costs. And another group of friends has put together what figures to be a monster fundraising dance this Saturday night, 7-11:30ish, at Temple Emanu-El, with the Mark Pender Band, featuring Richie (LaBamba) Rosenberg, trombonist for LaBamba and the Hubcaps and the Max Weinberg 7. The event has been long sold out.

And this brings us back to Judy Stavis, the erstwhile homemaker, parttime runner, substitute teacher, yoga instructor, jewelry maker and fulltime friend, who will be out there on the dance floor this Saturday night.

At WHS, Stavis was not a member of the cross-country or track teams but, as a two-year letter winner in soccer, she did devote much of her free time to running.

"I have always run for fitness, starting back in high school when I used to run before school with (teammate) Sally Parizeau Tyrie," she said. "I just continued running recreationally through college. After having my first child, I decided I wanted to do something for myself and thought training for a marathon would be the perfect release from motherhood.'

Two more children and four marathons (three Bostons and one New York) later, Stavis was out running with a friend in Cohasset last September when she came to an epiphany

"I was telling her the Kehler story," Stavis said, "and I looked at her and said, 'I am so far away from them and I feel helpless, so ... I'm going to run the New York City Marathon and raise money for Wil.' I didn't feel right just asking my friends for money, so I thought if I did the marathon, more people would give."

And give and give and give they did. When all was said and done, by the time Stavis crossed the finish line on November 2 wearing her "Wil Power"t-shirt, she had raised \$16,000 for her good friends' bedridden son.

Yes, you read that right, sixteen thousand dollars!

"I just asked people to donate whatever they felt comfortable giving," she said. "I had people asking me to send them information on how to donate. Cohasset is a small town (7,500 people) and word travels quickly when people are involved in

FOOTBALL UPDATE

It's WHS vs. Plainfield for the 104th time, tomorrow morning, 10:30, at Hub Stine Field in Plainfield. WHS, which has won the past two Thanksgiving games, comes in with a 6-3 record, while Plainfield is 4-5. Both teams have lost three of their last four

Tomorrow will be the final game for a talented group of WHS seniors, featuring Tony Dilorio, Ricardo Johnson, Eric Moran, T.J. Mruz and Chris Sheehan, and including Dan Ludlum, Josh Firestone, Craig Dyer, Jihaad Billups, Brett DeFazio, Henry Kwok, Mike Clark, Jordan Johnson, Matt Marcus and Tom Maxwell.

Johnson comes into the game with 1,009 yards this season, the school's first 1,000-yard rusher since LeRoy Gallman in 1988, and just the seventh in history. DiIorio has passed for 1,144 yards, 24 yards short of Joe Monninger's single-season record set in 1970. This is the first time WHS has had a 1,000-yard rusher and passer in the same season. Sheehan has 28 catches this fall, two short of his school record set last year.

Through nine games, WHS has scored 278 points, a total surpassed only five times in school history: the 1977 team had 413 points in 11 games, 1970 had 354 in nine games, 1947 had 354 in 10 games, 1998 had 301 in 12 games and 1966 had 282 in nine

WHS and Plainfield have been playing since at least 1900, but the first Thanksgiving meeting between the two schools was in 1944. That game followed two full years of no athletic events between the schools after Plainfield coach Jack Liddy pulled his team off the field late in the 1941 game because of what he felt were a couple of questionable calls by the officials.

Before 1944, WHS's Thanksgiving Day opponents had included Madison, North Plainfield, Nyack (N.Y.), Haverstraw (N.Y.), Pearl River (N.Y.), Ridgewood and Ferris (Jersey
