26) Ti	he	of:	Modern version of a game first invented by Milton Bradley, it was released in 1960 and endorsed by Art Linkletter, whose portrait appeared on the \$100,000 bill within.
27) T	he	of:	<i>Preacher</i> character who murderously gunned down both the Devil and God (obviously taking Nietzsche entirely too seriously).
28) T	he	of:	Term used by George W. Bush to describe the nations of Iraq, Iran and North Korea.
29) T	he	of:	Founded in Connecticut in 1882, this is the world's largest Roman Catholic fraternal organization.
30) T	he	of:	1992 P.D. James novel that describes a world of mass infertility, with humanity nearing the verge of extinction.
31) TI	he	of:	Name given to ancient Babylonian laws inscribed upon clay tablets and stone steles; it contains one of the first examples of the concept of "innocent until proven guilty".
32) Tl	he	of:	Founded in the aftermath of World War I, it was the first international organization whose primary function was to maintain world peace. Unfortunately, it failed.
33) Tl	he	of:	Ancient Chinese treatise written by Sun Tzu that has influenced military, political and business leaders even to the present day.

34) 1	Γhe	of:	Name given to the forced relocation of Native American tribes from the Southwest to the Indian Territory in what is now Oklahoma.
35) 1	Γhe	of:	Name of the newspaper with the largest English-language circulation in the world.
36) Т	Γhe	of:	Early silent film serial that made a star out of Pearl White, and may have inspired the term "cliffhanger", due to its filming on location at the New Jersey Palisades, with the main character dangling from a cliff at the end of one chapter.
