PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

The month of February is upon us. This is a special time to celebrate "Love". Be sure to indulge your children

with lots of love, hugs and praise.

I would like to thank parents for your support with your child's learning. The middle school years pose many emotional challenges that often affect academics. It is essential that we work together to keep them on the right track. Counselors and teachers are available, so please feel free to call them. After school programs are also available to assist students with tutoring and completing assignments.

The 2nd round of testing for the Hawaii State Assessments (H.S.A.) has begun. Students are required to have a score of 300 and above to be considered proficient in their grade level. Students who score 300+ on both reading and math assessments become members of Club 300. Club 300 members earn a t-shirt that allows them a fast pass in the lunch line and access to the club lounge to hang out during lunch recess. 227 students qualified for Club 300 after round 1.

School attendance is essential for students to learn. We need them to be here. I ask for your cooperation in ensuring your child reports to school everyday and on time. On any given morning an average of 50+ students arrive late to school. This sets them off for a difficult morning. Tardy students will be assigned to detention.

Please partner with us as we strive to increase student achievement at Kalakaua Middle School. Encourage your child to do their best everyday, come to school ready to learn, and be sure that homework is completed daily. Working together with you is our privilege. Thank you for the opportunity!

Geographic Exception (GE) Forms

The school your child attends is based on your (parent's or guardian's) legal address. If, for any reason, you would like your child to attend a different school, please follow the steps below:

- 1. Have your child stop by the attendance office to pick up a Geographic Exception form.
- 2. Fill out Section 1 of the form. You must fill out a separate application form for each school you are applying to. You may apply to as many schools as you wish.
- 3. Attach a self-addressed, stamped envelope to each application form submitted.
- 4. Have Kalakaua Middle School's attendance office fill out Section 2 of the GE form.
- 5. You may either leave the form with KMS's attendance office and we will forward it to the school(s) you are applying to, or you may take it to the school(s) yourself.

Please note: The GE period for next school year is from January 1 – March 1, 2012. You will be notified of the school's decision after March 1. If you have any questions, please call us at 832-3134.

WIDA TEST

All English Language Learner (ELL) students will be taking the *ACCESS for ELLs*[®] English language proficiency test. This test is for students whose first or home language is not English and measures a student's ability to use the English language. The test specifically identifies how well your child is reading, writing,

speaking, and listening in English. The four sub-parts of the test take approximately three hours during the regular school day.

The testing window is: January 22, 2013 - February 28, 2013.

Teachers and students have been working hard to achieve the

best results. The test will help teachers identify areas where support may be needed. The test also allows schools to monitor individual ELL student progress on an annual basis, a requirement of the No Child Left Behind (NCLB) law.

Your assistance is needed to prepare your child to take this test. Help your child get plenty of rest each night. Make sure your child eats a good breakfast, and gets to school on time. Five discipline tips to improve your teen's behavior in school

Your teen's behavior in school affects the teacher's ability to teach, as well as your teen's ability to learn. However, parenting a teen can be a real challenge. Try these six parent-tested, teacher-approved discipline tips:

- 1. Stay actively involved in your teen's life. Go to his games or performances. Meet his friends.
- 2. Don't overlook drugs and alcohol. They are a part of many teen parties. And they can take a serious toll on your teen's health and school performance.
- **3. Involve your teen** in setting rules. He'll be more likely to follow them.
- **4. Set consequences** and follow through. Predictability is a parent's best friend. A consequence doesn't have to be severe if your teen knows with certainty that you will impose it.
- **5.** Work with your school. If the school contacts you about a concern, don't instantly decide your teen is right.





WHAT CAN PARENTS DO TO HELP PREPARE FOR THE HSA?

- 1. Be sure your child is in school on time, especially on test days. (Avoid scheduling doctor's or dental appointments on testing days).
- 2. Have your child attend afterschool tutoring to keep up with class work.
- 3. Make sure that your child has a good breakfast on test days.
- 4. Make sure that your child has plenty of sleep the night before test days.

School Emergency Information for Parents and Guardians



The Hawaii State Department of Education is committed to providing a safe environment for students, staff, and visitors. We work closely with national, state, and local safety officials such as Police, Fire, Emergency Medical Services, Emergency Management Agencies and the Department of Health to ensure our schools are well prepared in the event of an emergency. Each school conducts drills throughout the school year to help students and staff prepare for possible emergencies. How You Can Help BE PREPARED FOR A SCHOOL EMERGENCY

- Ensure that your child's emergency contact information is accurate and current.
- All DOE schools have emergency plans. Become familiar with your school's emergency plan and parent/guardian reunification procedures in the event of a school evacuation.

IN CASE OF A SCHOOL EMERGENCY

Although your first reaction would be to call or rush to your child's school, please follow the tips listed below.

• <u>DO NOT</u> call or rush to your child's school. Phone lines and staff are needed for emergency response efforts

- <u>DO NOT</u> phone your child. Staff and students are discouraged from using cell phone communication for safety reasons.
- Tune in to local TV/Radio stations for official school news alerts.
- Rely only on official communication from school or public safety officials.
- Listen for official information regarding reunification with your child. Students will be released ONLY to parents/guardians who are documented as emergency contacts and who present a picture ID such as a driver's license, military ID or passport.
- Go to the DOE website: *doe.k12.hi.us* for emergency updates.

Safety Terms & Procedures

In the event of an emergency at your child's school, it is important to know these terms:

Lockdown

A lockdown takes place if an internal or external threat is identified at the school. All school doors are locked and students are confined to classrooms. No entry into or exit from the school will be allowed until an "all-clear" announcement is made.

Shelter in Place

Students take refuge in designated areas to protect them from hazardous materials or severe weather. No entry into or exit from the school will be allowed until an "all-clear" announcement is made.

Evacuation

Certain emergencies may require students and staff to evacuate school. Evacuations are conducted when it is no longer safe to remain on campus. All schools have evacuation sites and conduct evacuation drills annually. In the event the emergency continues and students are not able to return to campus, parent or guardian reunification procedures will take place. Please become familiar with your school's re-unification procedures.
