New Trustees & Officers Selected

Two new members were elected to the Society's board of trustees at the annual meeting on Monday, April 28. Judy Benson was returned to the board after a two-year hiatus. She takes the place of Julia Pierson who had completed her latest three-year term. Neil Coleman was elected to complete the final year of Laversa Motes' term. Benson had previously served on the board as second vicepresident and did an outstanding job chairing the membership and social committees. Coleman has been a member of the finance committee for two years and received the Society's First Capital Historical Award with his wife Pat two years ago for their exemplary restoration of the Henry Walke home on Western Avenue in Chillicothe.

At the Society's May 6th board meeting, Henry Herrnstein was elected to a one-year term as board president. He moves into that position after several years as first vice president. Erc Picciano was elected to move from second to first vice president, and Ron Bowen was elected to take Picciano's position as second vice-president. In addition, Tim Barada was re-elected board secretary, a position he has held since 2011, and Bob Casari was re-elected board treasurer, a position he has held for thirteen years, including a one-year hiatus from the board.

We thank each of these individuals and all our other board members for the generous contribution of their personal time and talents so crucial to the Society's success.



It was discovered they were being sought by printers in cities where they had appeared before coming to Chillicothe.

Fourteen years later the real Ole Bull performed on the Masonic Hall stage, along with his piano accompanist, Edward Hoffman, and soprano, Madame Varian. The circular distributed to advertise the event included the following message.

Messrs. St. Burkley and F. A. Simonds, at the request of many of the lovers of Music in this place, have made an arrangement with this Troupe of Artists, at a very heavy expense, to visit Chillicothe. This will enable the people of this vicinity to have the pleasure of hearing OLE BULL (pictured below) without incurring the outlay of going to Cincinnati. It is hoped that the enterprise of these gentlemen will be met with liberality by the community, and that the attendance will be such as not to occasion loss to them.


Thus, through their efforts, one of the greatest violinist of that time entertained theatergoers in Chillicothe.

George C. Tyler, one of Broadway's greatest producers, was born in Circleville in 1858 and in early childhood moved to Chillicothe with his parents. He became stage-struck as a young boy and determined to have a career in the theater, though not necessarily on stage. When he was only 18, he persuaded his father, George H. Tyler

who was co-owner of The Chillicothe Leader. to lease the Clough Opera House and allow him to manage it. He was successful in presenting first class productions with name stars, but was unsuccessful financially, and his auspicious start lasted only four months. After this failure, he took to the road and worked newspaper jobs until he was hired as the advance agent for leading actor, James O'Neill. A few years later he formed a partnership with Theodore Liebler in

The St. Peter's Church Fire

The first St. Peter's Catholic Church located on the northwest corner of Church & Water Streets in Chillicothe, was built in 1845-46. On Thursday, June 19, 1947, it was destroyed by fire leaving only a gutted shell of the former grand church. The *Chillicothe Gazette* reported the estimated loss at a cost of \$250,000.
