Greetings all. This time of year is great to see things growing and developing in our gardens and paddocks, and Council too have many things in development at the moment.

Long Term Financial & Asset Management Plans

Some of you have been involved in the development of Council's plans in the last couple of weeks. These plans are to help provide Council with a financial direction and sustainability for the future. They are available at the Council office and on the website, and there is still some time for you to provide your feedback and input, so I would encourage you to do so!

Port Neill Foreshore Plan

Also coming out for you to have your input on is the draft Port Neill Foreshore Upgrade Concept Plan. This plan has been developed with much input already from the Port Neill Progress and Community, and they are also available for you to have input in. It is aimed at improving and developing infrastructure to meet the needs of the community now and into the future. It brings together a common design for landscaping and streetscaping, and improves the accessibility of the whole foreshore area.

Risk Management

Council as an entity has many obligations put on it from other levels of government. Much Council staff time gets invested into some of these areas. One such area is Risk Management, which incorporates areas such as Work Health and Safety, Emergency Planning, and Financial Auditing. As you could expect, Work Health & Safety is the biggest legislation area for Council to comply with, which are regularly externally audited. In recent years there has been a lot of work put in by both office and outside staff, and we have seen our WHS audits improve by 74% and our Risk Management audits by 96%. This results in a larger financial rebate from our LG Insurance Providers. This is an area that is certainly not visible by the public, but it is imperative for an organisation like ours, so I must commend all our staff.

Burning Permit Within the Township - Outside the Fire Danger Season

To assist with the control of burning within a township outside of the Fire Danger Season, Council now has a form, to be completed and an inspection of the materials to be burnt, before the commencement of any burning for both Domestic and Non-Domestic premises.

Required Conditions:

You must:

- Arrange for a Council Authorised Officer to complete an inspection before burning.
- If creating stockpiles ensure they are no bigger than 3m x 3m x 2m high;
- Make sure you have a 4 metre break around and above the area you want to burn;
- Only burn dry matter (paper, cardboard, timber and garden waste);
- Have appropriate fire control equipment in good working condition or garden hose with adequate water pressure on standby;
- Inform your neighbours you intend to burn;
- Immediately extinguish the burn completely, if it proves to be causing a nuisance to another person's property;

You must not:

- Leave the immediate burn site if there is smoke or any of the material is still smouldering;
- Burn multiple stockpiles at once;
- Attempt to burn materials mixed into soil;
- Burn tyres, plastics, green garden wastes, chemical containers, chemical treated timbers or any other hazardous wastes;
- Burn in the open on any street, road or laneway.

Bushfire Risk and Treatment Public Consultation

A Draft Bushfire Management Area Plan for the Lower Eyre Peninsula Bushfire Management Area has been developed by the Lower Eyre Peninsula Bushfire Management Committee with the assistance of the SA Country Fire Service.

Through this planning process, an assessment has been made of the existing bushfire risk to assets and the adequacy of current control measures within the Council areas of Lower Eyre Peninsula DC, Tumby Bay DC and the City of Port Lincoln.

The Plan also identifies additional treatment strategies that are designed to contribute to an overall improvement in the resilience of the wider community and those assets identified in the Plan.

This Draft Plan is made available for public consultation commencing on the 12th May 2015 and concluding at the close of business on the **23rd June 2015**.

Keeping of Animals & Birds in Townships

Residents residing within the Townships of Lipson, Port Neill, Tumby Bay and Ungarra are permitted to keep animals and birds on their property as long as they comply with the guidelines to prevent animals and birds causing a nuisance or being injurious to health. This includes poultry, rats, dead animals, nuisance birds, etc.

Guidelines for Keeping Animals and Birds

Prevent animals and birds causing a nuisance or being injurious to health.

Section 254 of the Local Government Act, 1999, provides Council with the 'power to make orders' to prevent a person (s) from doing or refrain from doing a specified thing. The provisions cover:

Unsightly condition of land;

Animals that may cause a nuisance or hazard.

To help residents within the Townships understand the expectation of Council in these matters the following guidelines for keeping animals and birds are provided to help avoid action being taken under the Order Making provisions of Section 254 of the Local Government Act, 1999.

Poultry Shelters

Poultry should be contained in a structure which:

- (1)(a) has a floor area of at least one square metre for each bird therein;
 - (b) is provided with a shelter of solid construction or sheet metal in good condition with a rainproof roof and an internal floor surface constructed of or paved with concrete or other material approved by Council to a smooth, hard, impervious finish with a floor area of at least 0.3 square metres for each bird therein;
 - (c) is maintained at all times in good order and repair and in a clean and sanitary condition free from rats, vermin, offensive odours or conditions; and which is located:
 - (d) not less than 25 metres from the front boundary of the property;
 - (e) not further forward on the property than the rear half thereof or the rear alignment of any house thereon;
 - (f) not less than one metre from any boundary of the property; or
 - (g) not less than 15 metres from any dwelling or one metre from a shed.

Roosters & Other Birds/Animals

(2) Person(s) should not keep or allow to remain on the land of which he or she is the owner or occupier any noisy bird or animal, where the noise emanating from the noisy bird or animal may cause a nuisance to any neighbour.

Food and Rats

- (3) Persons should not keep or allow to remain on the land of which he or she is the owner or occupier any poultry or animal unless:
 - (1) vermin proof receptacles are provided for storing bran, pollard, grain or other matter intended for the feeding of such poultry, and -
 - (a) such receptacles are at all times kept clean, sanitary and in good order and condition; and

- (b) no food for poultry is allowed to remain outside of such receptacles unless for the purpose of immediate consumption; and
- (2) that person keeps the land free from rats and mice.

Dead animals or birds;

- (4) A person should not:
 - (1) neglect to bury or otherwise lawfully dispose of in a sanitary manner any dead animal or bird belonging to him or her, or in his or her charge of keeping forthwith upon the death of that animal or bird.

No animal or bird to be a nuisance;

- (5) A person(s) should not keep or allow to remain on the land, which he or she is the owner or occupier, any animal or bird so as to be a nuisance or injurious to health by reason of:
 - 1.the number of animals or birds;
 - 2. the noise made by the animal or bird;
 - 3.the dust or odour generated by the presence of the animal or bird:
 - 4. the attraction of flies, rats, mice or other vermin;
 - 5.the nature and location of housing facilities for the animal or bird:
 - 6.the animal or bird not being adequately contained on the land; or
 - 7. the animal or bird being allowed to wander or fly from or to land either alone or in numbers;
 - 8. droppings emanating from the animals or birds; or
 - 9. for any other justifiable reason.

Definitions

"Noisy bird"

*Includes any rooster, goose, pheasant, parrot, cockatoo, galah, or peacock; and

"Poultry"

*Includes fowls, ducks, geese, pheasants and turkeys of either sex over the age of four 4) weeks.

Please note that this information sheet is only intended to provide guidance to the residents with the Townships in the Council District and does not in any way bind the Council.

(Extract from Mitcham Council's Guidelines)

The District Council of Tumby Bay does not have By-Laws covering these matters, it operates under the Local Government Act 1999 – S254 'Power to make orders' directing a person to do or refrain from doing something notwithstanding that a person has followed these guidelines if circumstances exist which in the Council's opinion warrant the making of an Order.

Non-Compliance with an order under the LGA 1999 - S258 is an offence: A person who contravenes or fails to comply with an order under this part is guilty of an offence.



A Soldiers' Story

Joe was born at home at Minlacowie (SA) on 6 September 1889 to Joseph Nankivell and Selina Nankivell (nee Treasure). There were 8 children in the family, 4 boys and 4 girls, of which he was the third youngest. His father was a farmer at Minlacowie.

Joe went to a school on the farm at Minlacowie, which had been built by his father, with his brothers and sisters. He left school at grade 7 and worked on the family farm until the end of 1908 when he moved with the family to a newly purchased farm at Tumby Bay. He then worked on the farm at Tumby until he moved to Melbourne and commenced training for the ministry.

He attempted to enlist in the Army in SA, but was rejected on medical (dental) grounds, so he went to Sydney and successfully enlisted in the Army at Holsworthy on 1 September 1915. After enlistment he was posted to 7th Battalion (Bn) for training and then to 9th Field Ambulance, on the raising of that unit, in March 1916.

On 2 May 1916 he embarked aboard the "Hororata" for Plymouth UK via Alexandria, arriving on 23 June 1916.

After a further period of training his unit was posted to France, arriving in November 1916. He must have done well as a soldier as he was promoted in the field to Lance Corporal on 15 March 1917. Six months later he was killed in action (KIA) in Belgium on 13 October 1917 at the third battle of Ypres, in the final push for Passchendaele which began on 9 October 1917. A notation on his records indicates that he was buried "in the vicinity of Paaschendaele".

The battles for Ypres commenced on 31 July 1917 and ended with the capture of Passchendaele on 1 November 1917; they were fought in the most dreadful conditions where the use of tanks became impossible, the movement of guns was extremely difficult and the German defensive line, using the "pill box" strategy, resulted in very heavy casualties. These battles were won at a cost to the allies of more than 310,000 casualties.

His unit, the Field Ambulance is not a vehicle! It is a group of personnel whose prime role is the evacuation of casualties from the battlefield, a task often undertaken by stretcher bearers and drivers whilst under heavy enemy fire. "The bravery and self sacrifice of these persons is obvious".

The Imperial War Graves Commission was aware that many of those who fell during World War 1 (The Great War) had no known graves; often soldiers were buried on the battlefield with very scant records of the location of their graves. It was therefore decided to honour these service people by a memorial and the Menin Gate was selected as the site for this area, as this had been the one point where hundreds of thousands of men had passed through to enter the battlefields of the Ypres Salient.

The Menin Gate Memorial has the names of over 54,000 officers and men recorded upon it, 6,191 of whom are Australian, with an inscription repeated over the two main arches that reads:

"TO THE ARMIES OF THE BRITISH EMPIRE WHO STOOD HERE FROM 1914 TO 1918 AND TO THOSE OF THEIR DEAD WHO HAVE NO KNOWN GRAVE".

Another inscription which is repeated over the two staircases leading from the main hall is:

"HERE ARE RECORDED THE NAMES OF OFFICERS AND MEN WHO FELL IN YPRES SALIENT BUT TO WHOM THE FORTUNE OF WAR DENIED THE KNOWN AND HONOURED BURIAL GIVEN TO THEIR COMRADES IN DEATH THEY SHALL RECEIVE A CROWN OF GLORY THAT FADETH NOT AWAY".

The name of Joseph Dench Nankivell is recorded on the Menin Gate.
