Thank you to Peter and his team of volunteers for sorting out the library, a great effort was put in by everyone.




FAST

The National Stroke Foundation has developed a simple mnemonic to help you remember the warning signs of a stroke.





- Face Can the person smile or has their mouth drooped?
- Arms Can the person raise both arms?
- Speech Can the person speak clearly and
- understand what you say?
- Time Act FAST and call Triple Zero (000) immediately and ask for an Ambulance. Ambulance recommends that all persons undertake a first aid course with an accredited agency.
