Dear SPMS Learning Community Member,

First semester is in the books! I hope your student experienced both success and opportunities for growth. I am reminded by my own children each day that, as much as I would like to make success happen for them, they need to own their own challenge if they are to going to reap the benefits of their successes and their failures. We are already **beginning the scheduling process for next school year**. We do not take team or teacher requests. Elective course selection booklets for the 2016-2017 school year are posted on our website along with the online form needed to choose middle school electives for next year. All students will have core classes including math, science, social studies, language arts, and a literacy course every day as well as physical education every other day. We are also working to implement a health literacy class at both 7th and 8th grade. This elective booklet is for the remaining Encore (elective) courses that will fill out your child's schedule. Hopefully you have already read through the course descriptions and filled out the online form, but if not, please do so. If you need paper copies, stop in the office and pick them up or call and we can send them home with your child. Middle school is a great time to try new things, so please encourage your child to explore! If you have questions about Encore course selection for next year, call your child's counselor or the office, and we will gladly help you.

At SPMS, we ask our **6**th **graders to be good citizens, 7**th **graders to be role models, and 8**th **graders to be leaders**. We refer to those roles routinely as we talk with students making our school a great place. Each month, our staff recognizes students at each grade level who have fulfilled their roles in an exceptional way. They are recognized with a certificate as well as their picture in the newsletter. Our 8th grade staff also chooses a Middle Level Leader for each month. This award is sponsored by the Optimist Club, and its recipient is recognized at their meeting with a certificate and a savings bond as well as featured in the local newspapers. School Counseling

8th grade students are getting ready to transition to High School!

The High School Counselors came and met with the 8th grade students in January. The counselors shared information about course selection, credits, and transitions to High School. The students completed their registration on line with the counselors the last week of January. If you have questions about your child's registration you can call your students MS counselor or the HS counseling office at 643-5910.

Parents of 8th grade students met with the HS counselors on Wed. January 20th to review the registration process and to discuss the transition to High School.

The middle school counselors will be going into 8th grade classes for 3 days in early February to discuss with students their interests abilities and learning styles. We focus on student's strengths and how their strengths can help them with their transition to High School. Student complete an interest inventory using Career Cruising an internet based tool to aid students in planning for their future. Career Cruising uses assessment tools to match students' interests and skills with careers.

The program can be used to research job descriptions, earnings, education needed to perform various jobs, career pathways and post-secondary education information. Students are introduced to career pathways and how this information can help them plan for High School Course selections. Students start their portfolio using Career Cruising and add to it throughout High School. This tool allows student to keep an up to date portfolio of achievements, extra-curricular activities, work experience, volunteer experiences and classes they have taken or plan to take.

Grade 6

6th Grade Art

January is a time of transition. Students are finishing their time in art in 6th grade, and art becomes an elective. Grade 7

English Team P: This month in English on Team P, we will be starting our second full class novel, <u>Touching Spirit Bear</u>, which tells the story of a boy struggling to survive in an unfamiliar place, as well as within himself. We'll just be finishing up our persuasive essays, where students took a closer look at issues in their independent "Mystery Month" novels.

Team-S Science: During the months of December and January team S science classes studied Gregor Mendel and his genetic experiments. We will be identifying the factors that control the inheritance of traits in organisms and describe the principles of probability and how Mendel applied them to inheritance.

Science students on **Team P** Science students on Team P are continuing to explore topics in genetics during the month of February. They have become skilled in predicting the outcome of monohybrid crosses and will move on to explore more

complex problems dealing with human genetics. Students will also learn to interpret pedigrees. They will discover how DNA codes for the proteins that give organisms the traits they possess. The unit will conclude with a brief survey of current advances in genetic technologies.

English students on **Team S** February is the start of a new semester, so students will be starting many new topics this month's. For grammar, we will continue Sentences of the Week (SOWs), focusing on commas. In writing, we will complete several short writings as well as one on-demand writing assessment. Finally, in literature, we will continue our independent reading and begin a new literature circle, in which students will select from a variety of books with a survival theme.

Math 7

Students in Math 7 are wrapping up a unit on integers. We have been developing algorithms for adding, subtracting, multiplying and dividing integers and applying them to real world situations. We have also been developing strategies solving multi-step problems using the order of operations. Ask your child what PEMDAS stands for! We will wrap up the unit with some work with the distributive property (using an area model) before starting our next unit, Expressions and Equations.

In Expressions and Equations, we will be generating equivalent expressions using the fact that addition and multiplication can be done in any order with any grouping. We will also extend this understanding to subtraction (adding the inverse) and division (multiplying by the multiplicative inverse). We will then use linear equations and inequalities to solve problems and will build on these concepts through the use of tape diagrams.

Grade 8

Team L Social Studies: Team L students finished a study of modern government and the Constitution with a presentation by Mr. Erlandson and the school police liaison, Joel Ludowicz. As a class we had discussed T.L.O. v. New Jersey and search and seizure in schools along with other court cases dealing with the Bill of Rights and the Constitution. Mr. Erlandson and Officer Ludowicz answered students' questions stemming from our discussions on the law. Now that we have completed our unit on modern government we'll return to the history of the U.S. beginning with George Washington's presidency. One of the themes we will focus on is how does the government change, over time, to give us the government we have today.

Team M Social Studies: During 3rd Quarter, students will learn about the U.S. Constitution and the early days of our nation. We will cover the first seven presidents and discuss themes of neutrality, nationalism, and politics. At the end of the quarter, students should be able to list those presidents in order, explain how political parties developed in our country, and demonstrate a basic knowledge of the Constitution.

Math 8 students will be working on a unit called Thinking with mathematical Models. In this lesson we will be further exploring linear relationships. We started this lesson by collecting data from a bridge experiment and approximated the linear patterns with linear graph models. Our work on writing and solving linear equations will continue, and we will start working with inequalities. In TMM, students will also investigate inverse relationships from descriptions, tables, graphs and equations.

SM-1 Math students will be working on systems of equations and inequalities. Students will learn how to solve systems of equations by graphing, using the substitution method, and using the elimination method. Students will also apply what they learn about solving systems to model real-world situations.

Enhanced Literacy - Team M: Students have been tackling several things this quarter. They are in groups to read and discuss the novel The Silenced by James DeVita. We are discovering how the book ties in with the ideas from Nazi Germany, and how the dystopian factors reflect parts of our society. Students are also writing a dystopian short story. Every Tuesday, each student works on researching a topic of their choice. They will present their information the week of Feb. 15th, first hour, in the library. Parents are welcome to attend. They have a wonderful wide variety of topics-- from why bees are dying, why yoga should be taught and practiced in school, how artificial sugar affects the body, LBGT rights, and much more.

Next quarter, they will finish <u>The Silenced</u>, do a final project (we may do a short film version), study more SAT vocabulary and start reading <u>Fahrenheit 451</u>.

English 8: In addition to studying root words to enhance vocabulary and reading skills, students are writing either a memoir, a persuasive paper, or an explanatory paper. They had free choice about what they wanted to write. They are learning about strong verbs, good leads, and the importance of details. They will continue to work on this next quarter. Students will also be reading the novel Nightiohn by Gary Paulsen about slavery in America which will tie in to Social Studies. Students

will research events and people during the 1800's. Next quarter, we will be doing more reading of non-fiction articles-- and we will be doing a career exploration unit through the guidance office. Students will research a career they might be intererested in pursuing.

Science - In science classes, both Team M and Team L students will begin a new unit on Rocks and Minerals for much of the third quarter. Students will begin learning about the characteristics and properties of minerals. They will grow crystals, make crystal shapes out of paper and eventually use their newly learned skills to identify unknown minerals by scratching them, weighing them and performing other tests and observations on them. After several weeks of learning about minerals, the students will move on to studying the rock cycle and the three categories of rocks.

Leaders, Role Models and Good Citizens

Each month SPMS recognizes Leaders (grade 8), Role Models (grade 7) and Good Citizens (grade 6). These students are nominated by their teachers. In addition, our Sauk Prairie Area Optimist Club honors one of our leaders with a the Optimist Middle Level Leader Award.

Congratulations to our December and January Middle Level Leaders and our Leaders, Role Models and Good Citizens.

Gifted and Talented

The Gifted/Talented Department conducts screenings in February, and April. The screeners are designed to identify students who may need programming outside of the regular course sequence. These screenings include:

- A math screener given to sixth graders to identify students who should be placed in an accelerated math class
- A social studies screener given to eighth graders to identify students who have outstanding talent and/or interest in United States History, and who may qualify to take tenth grade World History as ninth graders. These students then will take the AP U.S. History class at some point in high school, in order to fulfil the curriculum requirements at SPHS.
- The Science section of the EXPLORE test, which is given to all sixth graders. This will be used to identify students who will need further evaluation to enhance their science programming.

Who should take the math or social studies screeners? These screeners are not for everyone. Students who would be eligible to take these screeners would be those who meet the following criteria:

- Maintaining an A or A+ average in the subject
- STAR or State Testing scores in the 90%ile or above in reading for students taking social studies screeners
- STAR or State Testing scores in the 85%ile or above in math for students taking the math screener
- Recognized by teachers as mature, organized and responsible, which includes homework completed on time and a strong work ethic.

Parents who have questions regarding the screeners are welcome to contact the Gifted/Talented Department or their child's teacher.


