### YOM KIPPUR DISCUSSIONS AT THE CHASE

# 1:00- Uncovering Systems of Oppression

2:15 Facilitated by Dr. KB Frazier and Ed Reggi - The shooting death by a police officer of Michael Brown in Ferguson and the ensuing outrage and unrest has affected us all in one way or another. Instead of politics and strategy, in this session we hope to focus on the events in a Yom Kippur fashion—by searching within ourselves for hidden truths. Facilitated by CRC members Ed Reggi and Dr. KB Frazier, who have been part of a holy response in Ferguson from the beginning, we will attempt to discover together how oppression and racism touches each and all of us. We hope to experience some healing within, so we may be better equipped to bring healing to our region.

# 2:20- Eye on Israel

3:30

*Facilitated by Rabbi Deana Sussman* - As liberal Jews, our relationships with Israel are often times complex. In recent months, these viewpoints and assumptions have been tested as our eyes turned to the tumultuous events of the Middle East. And whether we are right or left wing, secular or observant, we are all engaged in some capacity with Israel. Is Israel a Jewish State? Is it a state for Jewish people? Or, is it a country for all of its citizens? Our viewpoints may differ, but as long as we make room to hear one another, we have the opportunity for growth and change. In this breakout session, Rabbi Deana will facilitate a discussion about what Israel represents to each of us on a fundamental level.

# Law & Order: The Place of Policing in our Lives

*Facilitated by Rabbi Susan Talve and Roger Goldman* - Please join our own Roger Goldman who has devoted his legal career to fostering a police-public partnership through such efforts as state licensing of police, limitations on racial profiling and other ways to enhance police professionalism, which have the effect of protecting the civil rights and liberties of citizens. Along with Roger and Rabbi Susan will be others who have been on the front line in Ferguson as we create a safe and respectful space to reflect on what we have learned and where we go from here to bring healing to our community.

# Teachings of Reb Zalman

*Facilitated by Rabbi Randy Fleisher* - The wonderful guru, or zayda, of the Jewish Renewal movement passed away this past summer. As a tribute, or Festschrift, to Rabbi Zalman Schachter-Shalomi's wonderful, expansive, and deep teachings, Rabbi Randy will lead a study of passages from his last trilogy of books: Jewish With Feeling, Credo of a Modern Kabbalist, and Integral Halacha.

## 3:30- The Book of Jonah

**4:30** Facilitated by Michael Getty - The book of Jonah is traditionally read on Yom Kippur afternoon, so this is a wonderful time to study this story that touches on so many of the themes of Yom Kippur. From this session you can go right to Yizkor and the dramatic Neila service that concludes the Day of Atonement.

### 5775 Yom Kippur Contemplative Dance

*Facilitated by Sarah Anne Patz* - A gentle movement structure using guided breathing and imagery will help us connect our heart's intention with movement. We will take time to find our individual narrative and respond with a dance of gratitude and forgiveness.

Simchat Torah Celebration and Service/Religious School Open House and Consecration

Please join us for one of the most amazing Jewish experiences you will ever have as we unroll the Torah and celebrate! We will also formally welcome our kindergarten and new students to the CRC Religious School community in a ceremony where they will receive their very own Torah scroll.

We are so excited to announce that the service will also feature a performance by the band *Klezundheit!*, which has performed at CRC for every Simchat Torah since 1999. *Klezundheit!* has also performed on KFUO's radio show "Live from the Garden," and has played concerts and church services at various locations around St Louis, most memorably a Lutheran Mass with all Klezmer music. We have performed two concerts in Asuncion Paraguay, and will be performing at the international "Music in the Mountains" festival, January 2015 in Posos de Caldas, Brazil. *Klezundheit!* is directed by Bob Herman, and features Paul Wexler on clarinet, Tom Bruce on trumpet, Paul Huppert on violin, Bob Miller on trombone and Leon Burke, vocals.

### YOM KIPPUR SWAB DRIVE

CRC has partnered with the Gift of Life Bone Marrow Foundation, The Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism, and the other reform synagogues in St. Louis and across the country to bring an exciting and unique opportunity to help save lives. On both Kol Nidre and Yom Kippur, we will be holding a swab drive to help collect potential bone marrow donors.

Potential donors will be entered into the bone marrow registry. From the time you join the registry until your 61st birthday, you could be a donor for someone suffering from a life-threatening blood disease and help save their life. Registration is simple. It requires a quick cheek swab and completion of a consent form. Potential donors must be between the ages of 18 and 60 and in general good health.

#### WHAT SHOULD YOU KNOW ABOUT BECOMING A DONOR?

Becoming a bone marrow or stem cell donor is a serious commitment. To help you make the right decision, please read the following:

What will happen if I am a match for the patient? You will be contacted by a Gift of Life representative and asked to give a blood sample. This will help the transplant center determine if you are the best possible match for the patient. If so, you will be counselled on the donation process. You will also be screened to make sure you are medically eligible and that your donation poses no risk to the patient. If all goes well, you will be asked to donate bone marrow or stem cells.

**How is bone marrow collected?** Bone marrow is found in the hollow cavities of the body's large bones. It is withdrawn from the pelvic bone in an area called the lilac crest. The procedure is done in a sterile hospital operating room with needles and syringes under either under general or regional anaesthesia. Marrow regenerates quickly within four to six weeks. Donors should anticipate taking a few days off after the procedure to recover.

**How are peripheral stem cells collected?** In order to increase the number of stem cells in the blood, donors are given injections of a medication called Filgrastim. Stem cells are collected through a procedure called apheresis, which requires a needle to be placed in each arm. Blood is removed from one arm, processed through a cell-separating machine where stem cells are collected, then returned to the donor in the other arm. The collection lasts up to five hours over the course of one or two days.

**What information will I be given about the recipient?** The donation process is anonymous. The only information you will receive is the recipient's age, gender, and diagnosis. In some cases, donors and recipients are permitted to meet one year after the transplant. Patients' religious or ethnic backgrounds will not be disclosed.

Important Reminders: You may be a match for ANY patient. The donation process is anonymous. Donation requires a time commitment of up to 40 hours. Follow up steps involve needles. You must be between 18 and 60 to register.
