## State of the City: Dollars & Sense



January 2016 shows that the City's finances are in good standing with the City's largest funds of water, sewer, and the general fund showing positive correlations between spending and incoming revenues. This was not the case last year at this same time, but with the democratic decisions made by voters to vote in Measure U and the recently adopted water rate increase, the City of Rio Dell is on track to a sound financial future.

The Finance Department is happy to report that financial stability in the general fund is expected to be restored through Measure U. Revenue collections through the 1% district tax are budgeted at \$160,000 for the current fiscal year. Measure U revenues go directly into the general fund, which is the largest source of funds for the City's police services.

On another positive note the sewer funds are bringing in sufficient revenues to support operations, debt, capital improvements, maintenance, and repairs. The total cost of the City's new wastewater treatment plant totaled \$12.5 million. The City received \$6 million in grant funds for this project and the remaining \$6.5 million will be repaid over the next 28 years through revenues received from customers for sewer services. The annual debt payment is \$302,933. The final payment has already been collected and set aside to be paid in 2043 which brings the City into compliance with the State Water Resources Control Board grant funding agreement.



The billing for January 2016's water usage will be the first billing to include the new phased in water rates. The new rates correct a long existing deficit in the water fund, comply with financial obligations to the State of California and provide some matching funds for needed capital improvements to the system. The City is now poised to take advantage of hundreds of millions of dollars in water grants being made available statewide to help replace aged and failing piping and storage systems. These investments help insure that we leave a working water system to the next generation. The alternative was a bankrupt water fund, unable to engage in the most basic of repairs and draining the General Fund of money as the system was liquidated.

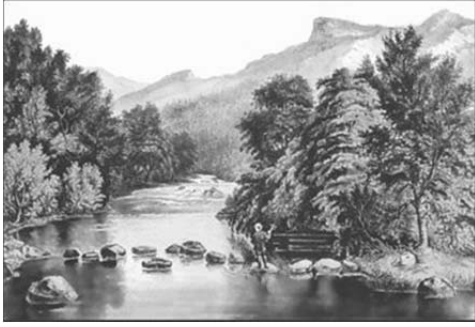

## Help Prevent Sewage Spills into the Eel River

Used water from our toilets, sinks, showers and washing machines travels from our homes and businesses through a complex maze under city streets to a treatment plant, where bacteria and pollutants are removed before the water is sent into the Eel River. Along the way, a lot can go wrong, potentially spewing dirty wastewater into basements, city streets and waterways. The City's Wastewater plant during dry weather receives about 200,000 gallons a day to treat. During storm events the plant frequently treats 1 to 2.5 million gallons per day, depending on the amount of rain. These storms cause a huge stress on the collection system because the piping was not designed to handle storm runoff, just the sewer flows.

Here's how you can help prevent sewage spills:

### In Your Home

- **Minimize water use when it's raining.** Wait to wash clothes or run the dishwasher until the rain stops to lessen the burden on the sanitary system. Reduce water use by installing low-flow toilets and shower heads, and turn off the water when you shave or brush your teeth.
- **Dispose of household chemicals and automotive fluids properly – not down household drains or curbside storm drains.** Anything you put down sinks and storm drains can end up in local creeks and the river or ocean.
- **Don't put fats, oils or grease down the drain.** These substances clog both your plumbing and the sewer system, causing backups.
  - Pour cooled fats, oils and grease into a can with a lid, or mix it with an absorbent material such as cat litter, and put it in the trash.
  - Wipe down greasy pans and dishes with a paper towel. Dispose of the paper towel in your kitchen scrap recycling or in the garbage.

- Don't use hot water or the garbage disposal to wash grease down the drain. Water cools through the pipes, causing the grease to harden into clogs further along in the sewer system.
- Drop off large amounts of cooking oil – like used oil from a turkey fryer – at grease recycling locations.

### **On Your Property**

- **Inspect your sewer cleanout.** The cleanout typically is a small pipe, about 4 inches in diameter, used to access the lateral line for cleaning. Make sure the cap to the cleanout pipe is on and has not been damaged and replace it, if necessary, to prevent rain water from entering the sewer system.
- **Have your household sewer line inspected and replaced if necessary (or urge your landlord to do so).** A lateral line connects the pipes in your house to the main city sewer pipes. Lateral lines are often old and frequently cause sewer backups from blockages or tree roots.
- **Avoid planting trees and shrubs near your household sewer line.** Plant roots are one of the most common causes of lateral line problems.
- **Eliminate any connections between your storm sewer pipes and sanitary sewer pipes.** Disconnect downspouts and sump pumps if they are connected to the sanitary sewer system. These connections cause spills and are illegal. This seems to be a common occurrence in Rio Dell so please disconnect.
- **Consider installing a gray water system to capture and reuse nearly-clean water for your garden.**

If you are experiencing any sewer backup issues please call City Hall at 707-764-3532 and they will get the Public Works staff to come out to your location. Staff will see if it's a problem we can fix on the City's side or we will let you know if you need to call a plumber.

## **Do You Have Flooding Issues?**

During major storm events the City makes sand available for sand bags. Availability of the bags themselves is not guaranteed, however they can be purchased at most home supply stores. The sand is made available in the parking lot behind City Hall.

## Misuse of Publicly Available Recycling Containers



Eel River Disposal and the City of Rio Dell provide a recycling container in back of City Hall free of charge for residents with recyclable materials.

The container is now picked up twice a week and its contents are recycled through the City's contract with Eel River Disposal. This is an incredible free service to residents, but it is also a service that can be abused. Materials that are not recyclable are being placed into the recycling container, creating a lack of space for users who have recyclable materials. Sometimes this garbage is not even placed inside the container, but instead it is strewn around the container, making the removal and emptying of the container unnecessarily time consuming and potentially dangerous. Some of the inappropriate dumping's has included material such as mattresses, batteries, furniture, used oil, diapers, clothing and Styrofoam.



### Not Acceptable to Recycle

- ◆ Auto/Mirror or Tinted Glass
- ◆ Food Wastes
- ◆ Blueprints / Overhead Transparencies
- ◆ Carpeting
- ◆ Clothing
- ◆ Hazardous Waste or Containers
- ◆ Crystal / Glassware / Dinnerware
- ◆ Disposable Diapers
- ◆ Light Bulbs or Fluorescent Tubes
- ◆ Metal or Steel Objects: Nails, Wires, Etc.
- ◆ Paper Towels, Napkins or Facial Tissue
- ◆ Shrink-Wrap
- ◆ Pyrex or other Ovenware
- ◆ Styrofoam
- ◆ Wax Coated Cardboard
- ◆ Hypodermic Needles

Remember, it's important to: Rinse food from containers and remove lids. Break down all large items to maximize space. And, to not place items in front of the recycling container, blocking access.

## City Considering Establishing Commercial Medical Marijuana Regulations Rio Dell's "Golden Goose?"

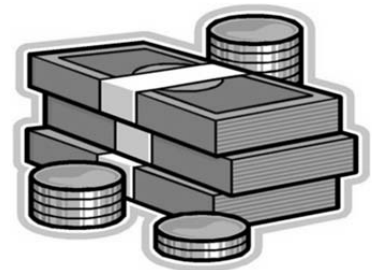


On October 9, 2015 Governor Brown approved the Medical Marijuana Regulations and Safety Act (MMRSA), a package of three bills enacted by the legislature on September 11, 2015, AB 243, AB 266 and SB 643. The MMRSA provides for comprehensive, concurrent regulation and licensing by state and local governments of medical marijuana as an agricultural product, including its cultivation, processing, testing, manufacture, distribution, transportation, dispensing, and delivery.

The Medical Marijuana Regulation and Safety Act is significant for local jurisdictions because it:

- Protects local control by requiring that all marijuana businesses have a local permit or license – in addition to a state license.
- Provides public safety by providing mandatory minimum statewide security requirements and specifying criteria for state licensing, including disqualifying felonies;
- Protects public health with mandatory minimum statewide health and safety standards, backed up by mandatory product testing; and
- Ensures patient safety with quality assurance protocols requiring random sample testing by certified laboratories for all medical marijuana sold in California.

The State law allows the City to establish taxes on commercial medical marijuana activities. Other jurisdictions have generated significant revenues (millions) by taxing medical marijuana activities. These revenues can be used to fix streets, acquire land and develop parks, provide for additional police officers, build community centers, make small business loans, etc. **The new regulations could prove to be the "Golden Goose" for the City.**



The new law has established ten (10) State cultivator license types issued by the Department of Food and Agriculture. Please note that the City is allowed to and plans to be more restrictive than the State limits.

- **Type 1, "Specialty Outdoor"** for outdoor cultivation using no artificial lighting of less than or equal to 5,000 square feet of total canopy size on one premises.

- **Type 1A, “Specialty Indoor”** for indoor cultivation using exclusively artificial lighting of less than or equal to 5,000 square feet of total canopy size on one premises.
- **Type 1B, “Specialty Mixed-Light”** for cultivation using a combination of natural and supplemental artificial lighting at a maximum threshold to be determined by the licensing authority, of less than or equal to 5,000 square feet of total canopy size on one premises.
- **Type 2, “Small Outdoor”** for outdoor cultivation using no artificial lighting between 5001 and 10,000 square feet, inclusive of total canopy size on one premises.
- **Type 2A, “Small Indoor”** for indoor cultivation using exclusively artificial lighting between 5001 and 10,000 square feet, inclusive of total canopy size on one premises.
- **Type 2B, “Small Mixed-Light”** for cultivation using a combination of natural and supplemental artificial lighting at a maximum threshold to be determined by the licensing authority, between 5001 and 10,000 square feet, inclusive of total canopy size on one premises.
- **Type 3, “Outdoor”** for outdoor cultivation using no artificial lighting from 10,001 square feet to one acre inclusive, of total canopy size on one premises. The Department of Food and Agriculture shall limit the number of licenses allowed of this type.
- **Type 3A, “Indoor”** for indoor cultivation using exclusively artificial lighting between 10,001 and 22,000 square feet, inclusive, of total canopy size on one premises. The Department of Food and Agriculture shall limit the number of licenses allowed of this type.
- **Type 3B, “Mixed Light”** for cultivation using a combination of natural and supplemental artificial lighting at a maximum threshold to be determined by the licensing authority, between 10,001 and 22,000 square feet, inclusive, of total canopy size on one premises. The Department of Food and Agriculture shall limit the number of licenses allowed of this type.
- **Type 4, “Nursery”** for cultivation of medical cannabis solely as a nursery. Type 4 licensees may transport live plants.

The State Department of Public Health is responsible for the regulations governing the licensing of cannabis manufactures and testing laboratories.



Manufacturing involves the process of taking all or portions of the raw plant and transforming the cannabis into a concentrate, an edible product, or a topical product either directly or indirectly, by extraction methods, independently by means of chemical synthesis, or by a combination of extraction and chemical synthesis. A manufacturing licensee may not send a product directly to a dispensary, but instead will have to send all cannabis through a distributor and testing licensee, who will test for concentration, purity of products and contaminants.

Manufacturing licenses to be issued are as follows:

- **Type 6, “Manufacturing Level 1”** for manufacturing sites that produce medical cannabis products using nonvolatile solvents.
- **Type 7, “Manufacturing Level 2”** for manufacturing sites that produce medical cannabis products using volatile (i.e. butane, hexane, ethanol, etc.) solvents. This process will be regulated at a higher level. The State Department of Public Health shall limit the number of licenses of this type.

Testing is required for all cannabis and cannabis products. Testing licensees (laboratories) must adopt standard operation procedures using methods consistent with general requirements for the competence of testing and calibration activities, including sampling, using standard methods established by the International Organization for Standardization.

- **Type 8, “Testing”** Testing licensees shall have their facilities licensed according to the regulations set forth in Section 19341 et. seq. of the Business and Professions Code. A testing licensee shall not hold a license in another license type and shall not own or have ownership interest in any other license type.

Dispensaries will operate much the same way as they do today from the patient’s perspective. However, on the business side, things will change. Dispensaries will be prevented from purchasing or accepting product from an unlicensed grower, and all products within the dispensary will be tracked and traced from the moment it enters the dispensary to the point of sale.

- **Type 10, “Dispensary - General”** Dispensaries are facilities where medical cannabis, medical cannabis products, devices for the use of medical cannabis, and/or medical cannabis products are offered; either individually or in any combination for retail sale, including an establishment that delivers, pursuant to express authorization by local ordinance, medical cannabis and medical cannabis products as part of a retail sale. Only one retail site is allowed and no other licenses are allowed under the Type 10 license.
- **Type 10A, “Dispensary - No More Than 3 Retail Sites”** A Type 10A dispensary licensee may apply for other licenses in an effort to be vertically integrated, which is required in some cities. And even though a dispensary may obtain a cultivator and/or

manufacturing license, it must first transport all cannabis through a distributor and testing licensee before it re-enters the dispensary (if the grow is located in the same place) for sale.

The Distribution license is intended to coordinate the distribution of cannabis in a tracked and orderly fashion. It is designed to help assure the delivery of safe cannabis for patients by forcing all cannabis through a third party distributor and testing licensee.

All cultivation and manufacturing licensees must send all harvested and manufactured cannabis to a distributor for quality assurance and inspection. The distributor will be required to make sure the cannabis receives a “batch test” analysis and certification before sending it to a dispensary.

As mentioned above, even if a dispensary has a cultivation license as part of its operation at the same location, it must send all cannabis off-site to a third-party distributor for testing before it is dispensed. Although a cultivator and dispensary may have contracted to buy cannabis at a certain price and quantity, the distributor remains obligated to carry out the terms of that agreement and is authorized to charge a commission or fee for doing so. As opposed to a transporter who *may* obtain a distributor license, a distributor *must* obtain a transporter license.

- **Type 11, “Distribution”** A distributor is a person permitted to engage in the business of purchasing medical cannabis from a licensed cultivator or medical cannabis products from a licensed manufacturer for sale to a licensed dispensary.

Traditionally, growers transported cannabis to a dispensary. Now a third party is required to transport cannabis from the farm or processing facility to the distributor and then from the distributor to the dispensary. In fact, a transporter’s license is required to transport cannabis from any one licensee to another regardless of type.

- **Type 12, “Transporter”** Transporters will be prohibited from having a cultivation, manufacturing or any other license by the state. Exceptions include a distributor license.

## **Rio Dell Volunteer Fire Department Information 2015**

The Rio Dell Fire Protection District was originally formed on January 12th, 1941 under the name of "Wildwood" Fire Protection District. The name was officially changed to the Rio Dell Fire Protection District on December 19th, 1961. The district operates with a five member commission of elected officials.

The Rio Dell Fire Protection District, in conjunction with the Rio Dell Volunteer Fire Department, serves the City of Rio Dell and surrounding areas of Monument Road and Blueslide Road. Under the direction of the Fire Chief, we consist of two assistant chiefs and three fire companies. Rio Dell Fire responds to an average of 350 calls per year, including fires, vehicle accidents and medical aid calls. We are proud to be the most active of all volunteer fire department in Humboldt County. Below is a summary of the calls the Department responded to in 2015.

## City Teams with Cal-Fire to Tackle Overgrown Vegetation

What was once an impenetrable thicket near Painter and May Streets is in the process of being cleared up thanks to the work of CalFire's High Rock Conservation Camp. Work undertaken since December of 2015, by the High Rock crew, has cleared significant vegetation along Northwestern and Edwards Avenues. Before they leave, to prepare for the fire season, High Rock will also work on City's river access right-of-ways.

## Electric Vehicle (EV) Charging Station Nearing Completion

In Cooperation with the Redwood Coast Energy Authority (RCEA), Schatz Energy Lab (HSU) and the City of Rio Dell, the downtown EV station is just days away from coming online. Recent storms have delayed PG&E from completing a final check of the system, however the system is expected to come online the first week in February. The EV station is paid for through outside grants, and the City will share revenue from the system with RCEA. The main charger is a "Level II" system which charges the average electric vehicle in 4-6 hours and it can charge the increasing variety of electric vehicles on the market today, including the Tesla. The City also reconfigured the parking lot to meet current ADA standards as part of the project, and the handicap spot will have access to a separate "trickle" charger that will be free to those using the ADA space.



**Parking RV's and Trailers:** Section 17.30.180 of the Rio Dell Municipal Code limits the parking or storage of recreational vehicles, including boats and trailers to a maximum of 72 hours on city streets and just 24 hours specifically in the town center along Wildwood Avenue.

## Metropolitan Well Site Update:

The Metropolitan Well Project is a drought relief project designed to diversify the sources of water available to the City. The site is the city's former primary water source, which was replaced and largely abandoned ten years ago. By reutilizing the site and instituting newly available filtration technology, the city is better able to keep costs low and save ratepayer money. As currently designed, the project is approximately \$1.2 million dollars with 95% of the funding coming from State and Federal grants. The current timeline for the project is listed below.

- January 2016 60% Design Review
- March 2016 Final Design Complete
- April/ May 2016 Bidding
- June/ July 2016 Construction Start
- Sept/ Oct 2016 Construction Completion

## Rio Dell Police Department News

- The Rio Dell Police Department is pleased to Welcome Police Officer Jordan Walstrom and Police Officer Evie Valk to our agency. They were hired in November and have completed the ten week Field Training Program and are out working on their own. They are both proving to be excellent additions to the department. Officer Valk has some prior experience with the Fortuna Police Department as well as a military background, and Officer Walstrom has prior experience working on an ambulance as well as in the fire service. Both are graduates of the College of the Redwoods Police Academy and are natives of Humboldt County.
- With the addition of Officer's Walstrom and Valk we are up to what is currently our full staff. We have been spread pretty thin for the last year and we are pleased to have additional people covering shifts. Sergeant Beauchaine and Officer Brady put in a lot of extra hours over the past few months to make sure our shifts were covered.
- We recently received a generous donation of bicycle helmets from the Knights of Pythias California. These helmets will be supplemented with additional helmets purchased through other donations we received and an event is being organized to take place in March to get the helmets to area kids. Officer Valk is leading this effort and has approached the Fire Department, the Chamber of Commerce, as well as the school, about working together on this project. There will be more to come in the near future regarding getting the helmets out.
- We would like to remind residents to keep their dogs in their yards and under their control. Once again we are getting a considerable amount of reports of loose and unattended dogs in the community. We pick up several dogs each week and in some cases they end up getting transported to the kennels in Fortuna. We do our very best to get dogs back to their owners prior to transporting them to the kennels but it is a difficult task with dogs that are unlicensed. We urge you to be compliant with the law and license your dogs at the city, and maintain your dog on your property or on a leash. Thank you for your cooperation. Now that we are back to a full staff we will be more effective in dealing animal control issues and look forward to working with community members to resolve some of the animal issues we are experiencing.
- Our community has 20 hours a day of patrol coverage and 24 hour response to emergencies. Our office is located next to City Hall and someone is generally available in the office Monday through Friday during normal business hours. In those instances, when there is no one in the office, there is a phone located next to the front door. Simply pick up the phone and let it ring and it will be answered by a dispatcher. An officer will respond back to the police station if available or a message will be relayed to the on duty officer who will respond as soon as he or she is available.
- In 2015 the police department handled 1805 calls for service and 382 crime reports. This is 22 fewer total crime reports from 2014. While we have experienced some decreased in certain crimes such as vandalism and simple assaults, we have seen an increase in vehicle thefts, possession of heroin and possession of stolen property. Incidents of petty theft and burglary are roughly the same as in 2014.

- Food 3 days supply (infant, animal etc.)
- Bucket
- Regular bleach
