Anthony Robb reports on events at the Borough Council. In his words -

"RESULT!"

As one of Sedgefield's newest residents may I use your columns to congratulate the village veterans on a wonderful victory at last Friday's Borough Council planning meeting. Our Town Council and Residents' Forum put the case against the proposed 87 hectare caravan / chalet park extremely well, with arguments that were encyclopaedic, energetic, enlightening and entertaining. Reports in the local press prior to the meeting seemed to make the approval of the scheme a forgone conclusion and yes, it was a formidable task taking on the Borough Council's own planners but as the meeting progressed it became clearer and clearer that this wasn't a case of rampant "NIMBYism" but a thoughtful, thorough exposé of the weak rationale underpinning the proposal.

For those unable to attend here are some of the winning arguments:

- The effect on wild-life would indeed be huge and devastating to known badger, bird and bat populations
- The planned tree-screening simply emphasised the inappropriateness of the proposed site. A similar strategy at Wynyard Park had failed miserably
- The Highways Authority had not looked at the effects of increased traffic on an already chaotic situation in the village
- The daily per capita spend of caravan dwellers is £1.59 compared to the £59 of the average B&B/Hotel resident. Far from benefiting the local economy it was possible that it might, in fact, suffer
- It was not that the calculations of the total energy consumption of the caravans were, as the proposal claimed, "too difficult to do" but rather that the results were too horrendous to publish
- The travelling too and from, and the energy used by, the site would leave a massive carbon footprint

General issues concerning the lack of real and binding accountability with respect to residential status, occupancy and environmental guarantees were also raised. Lastly, hats off to the Trimdon Councillor who pointed out that it came down to a choice between "people and profit" and would be voting for the people and against the application.

Hats off again, perhaps, to the Councillor who pooh-poohed the points about "genetic footprints" (sic); he probably helped our case too!

Friends of Joshua Hodgson will be pleased to see his photograph here on our front page. Joshua, who was 13 on the 19th January, has a bright future as a Rugby player, but as he is a modest and unassuming lad, we feel that his successes to date should have a wider audience.

Sedgefield Village Neighbourhood &Crimewatch Panel Minutes of Meeting held on 11th December 2007

1. Minutes of Previous Meeting - 9/10/07 - accepted & approved.

2. Matters Arising: Item 5) Secretary reported lack of progress re "No Cold Calling" is down to waiting for requirements/approvals from Durham County Council to attach signs to street lighting columns.

3. Treasurer & Secretary's Report were read out, no questions arising.
4. Representative Reports: a) Community Force: Tim circulated his report to members and gave further details in respect of certain items in the report. C/man thanked Tim for his good work in the village.

d) Crime Prevention Officer Neil Langthorne said he believed the article published in the Sedgefield News November issue (N/H/Watch minutes of 9/10/07 meeting) had contributed to raising the fear of crime and was maybe not what should be circulated to every house in the village. He felt the article was too negative and suggested that promoting the good points was what was needed.

On Operation DARC & the need for house lighting, Neil gave some new feedback into thieves tactics - how a For Sale sign & unlit house is an invitation to burglary; he also described an excellent Xmas card initiative (which greatly impressed members). Neil handed over a number of Crime Prevention calenders to be issued to those that would benefit most. C/man thanked Neil for the calendars.

Both Sgt. Brian O'Connor & PC Keith Todd added their dismay over the October minutes appearing in Sedgefield News, which they felt reflected badly on their individual efforts to Police our village and also gave a wrong impression of the Police.

Sgt. O'Connor stated that Sedgefield is to get a replacement PCSO when Dean Wilson moves on, members welcomed this.

Publication of minutes: C/man Ken Saiger reminded everyone that it had been agreed at the start of Sedgefield News that our minutes would be published after each Panel meeting so that our none attending members could be kept fully up to date & he felt it is important to continue to report what goes on in Panel meetings, accurately. Members expressed various views and comments: all present felt that the minutes should continue to be published as they have been over recent months & that the meeting's view of the Police is not a criticism of our local Police, more one of concern levelled at HQ for lack of support to local Police on the ground & for the lack of Officers on the street. Members also confirmed that the 0845 system & lack of direct contact with a Police Officer was one of the greatest sources of public discontent. Several members confirmed that whilst they are well served the 0845 system now, there are still occasional problems.

4b) Village Constable: Keith reiterated his views expressed above regarding the October meeting. He then circulated his list of the Reported Crime in Sedgefield Village for the period **between 10th Oct. & 11th Dec.** this indicated there were **16 crimes**, consisting of: - **2- Burglaries**; **4-Thefts** (includes 1 car stolen); **7- Damage** (includes 1 car related) & **2 suspicious person reports.** Keith stated that crimes in the village are all very minor ones. He informed members about "suspicious persons" reports, thanked two separate householders for their diligence in contacting the Police. Their action enabled the Sgt. & himself to arrest a person that evening & he was confident that these actions had prevented further burglary(ies) in Sedgefield. Secretary thanked the Police for their recent accurate and informative "Ringmaster" messages (above activity was one such message to members on Ringmaster).

4c Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinator: Sarah Norman came to the meeting to inform members in person, that she had now left her Co-ordinator's post & had taken up a new appointment within the Police at H.Q. Sarah thanked members for all their help over recent years and said how she had felt whenever she was in Sedgefield she was amongst friends
5. AOB: Asked why there was no Village Traffic Warden, Sgt O'Connor explained the role of the PCSO which contained that of the Warden.
Police Pay Award: C/man Ken Saiger commented on Government failure to honour the Arbitration agreement with Police, expressing dissatisfaction at this treatment and the consequences for us, the public, as a result of further demotivating the Police. Unanimously endorsed.

The Raffle raised £24. The prizes had been very kindly donated by Mrs. Suddes(1st) and Ken Saiger (2nd).

The next meeting is on Tuesday 8th April at 7 pm, in the Parish Hall.

PCSO Dean Wilson has now started his training as a Police Constable and I am happy to report that PCSO Gavin Rutter has taken over his role. (See below). Crimes reported over the Christmas period included theft of mountain bikes from a shed in West Park Lane and a garage in White House Drive. New 'Stay Safe' website

Sedgefield Community Safety Partnership's new "Stay Safe" website allows members of the public to find out a range of information on crime and crime prevention in the area.

One of the unique features allows you to search an interactive map of your Neighbourhood Policing Area. Simply type in address and postcode to bring up crime rates for your council ward.

The website also has sections on crime reduction, anti-social behaviour and domestic violence. There is information on how to seek help for drug and alcohol problems and links to partners including Durham Constabulary, Victim Support and the Racial Equality Council.

The Operation Darc initiative to reduce dwelling burglary during the dark nights is working well. In December, across Sedgefield Borough area we achieved a reduction of 39% or 9 offences. Let us keep up the good work, remain vigilant and ensure our homes are never left unlit on an evening.

As part of the 'Operation Darc' initiative we are encouraging everyone to ensure new items are Security marked. The easiest way is to use an Ultraviolet marking pen, but there are many worthy products available, including brands such as Smartwater and Selectamark. Please mark your Postcode followed by your house number.

I have recently been requested advice on house burglar alarms. Alarm Technology is of the highest standards now and very reliable. I would encourage everyone to consider an intruder alarm for their home. Ensure the alarm is installed by a NACOSS / NSI approved security company, your insurance company will require that standard.

Community College gains extra funding for 'green' re-build

Sedgefield Community College is one of three County Durham schools to have been earmarked for extra funding as part of a bid to tackle climate change and is in line to share up to £1.15m of government funding. The cash would be used to help lower their carbon emissions.

The schools were chosen because they are all soon to be rebuilt. The money would fund eco-friendly features, like solar power and wind turbines. They are among 200 new schools across the country that could receive extra cash over the next three years to help them meet national targets for cutting carbon emissions.
