CLUB EXCELLENCE AWARD

Don't let your club miss out on receiving the "Club Excellence Award" for Year 2015-2016. Lion strive Clubs that for excellence in community membership service. growth, leadership development,

communication and club management deserve special recognition. These five elements are critical to the growth and continued progress of any Lions club and are the foundation of the **Club Excellence Award**.

Criteria summary:

- Conduct three or more service projects
- Contribute to LCIF (Lions Clubs International Foundation) our charity arm
- Achieve a net growth in membership or sponsor a new club
- Communicate the club's service projects effectively to the public and the membership

- Have a majority of the club officers participate in a leadership program at the zone, region or district level.
- Host meaningful meetings and submit club reports in a timely manner
- Remain in good standing (pay International dues, state dues, and district dues in a timely manner)

Many clubs have been participating in our "public relations" program this vear. Continue to send announcements about your service projects and fundraising efforts to PDG Provines. Sara who distributes them to club secretaries and presidents throughout the district. Many clubs have seen an increase inter-club in participation in events. (Communicate)

Training sessions for officers are being planned and announced. Encourage your officers to attend one close to you which counts toward this award. (Participation in leadership program)

Qualifying clubs receive a banner patch and the club presidents receive a pin (one of the nicest LCI gives) to recognize their accomplishment. Last year 11 of the 57 District C clubs qualified for this award. Another 11 would have if they had only made a donation to LCIF during the year. 22 District C clubs did not make a donation to LCIF last year. This year we have already cut into this number significantly. Let's not let this happen this year. if your club has not made a donation to LCIF please consider doing so in the near future. Our goal is to have 100% of the clubs participate in "our charity" by making a donation to Any personal gifts LCIF. made by a Lion in your club will also be credited toward the club's participation.

If your club is planning its awards for this year. consider giving a Melvin Jones Fellowship to one of your Lions. I can give you the number of credits your club has earned toward a Fellowship! Just send me an e-mail, and I will get the information to vou. I can also give vou a list of the Melvin Jones Fellows your club has. Perhaps vou missed someone.

Again, LCIF is receiving recognition from Charity Navigator for the prudent use of funds donated to it. manv charities Not achieve recognition from organization for this multiple years. Stand up and be a proud part of this great humanitarian service our organization carries out at home and throughout the world.
