

MAKING SENSE OF THE CIVIL WAR

CCPL has received a Making Sense of the Civil War grant from the Maryland Humanities Council, and I invite you to participate. The third discussion will be on the theme "Making Sense of Shiloh." Book discussed will be America's War - Part 3. Watch our website for announcement of scholar. date and location.

The fourth discussion will be on the theme "The Shape of War." Books discussed will be Crossroads of Freedom and America's War - Part 4. Watch our website for announcement of scholar, date and location.





COMMUNITY GIVING

Corky's Mitten Trees December 2 through January 3

This holiday season marks the 30th year the Carroll County Public Library has provided holiday help to our neighbors in need. CCPL receives donated gloves, mittens, scarves, and hats, for both adults and children, through mitten trees set up at all six branches. Donations will be accepted at all CCPL branches until Friday, January 3.

Each branch has a Corky's Mitten Tree, named after the library's penguin mascot, and patrons can hang store-bought or homemade donations on the tree. Items collected will be donated to local charitable organizations.

Toys for Tots Through December 17

CCPL has partnered with the Carroll County Sheriff's Office and United States Marine Corps Reserve Toys for Tots Foundation to collect new, unwrapped toys from now until Christmas, and distribute the toys as Christmas gifts to less fortunate children in our community.

Residents may drop off new, packaged, unwrapped toys in collection boxes located inside all library branches, at library headquarters in New Windsor, and at the Sheriff's Office in Westminster. Sorry, used toys will not be accepted.

Over the years, Marines have established close working relationships with social welfare agencies, churches, and other local community agencies to distribute the toys to needy children in the community. While Toys for Tots Coordinators organize, coordinate and manage the campaign, the ultimate success depends on the support of the local community and the generosity of the people who donate toys.

CCPL HELPS CUSTOMERS UNDERSTAND THE AFFORDABLE CARE ACT

A primary goal of the Affordable Care Act is to help the 14% uninsured and eligible Marylanders gain access to quality, affordable healthcare. Eligible Maryland residents will be able to enroll in a health plan or Medicaid to get coverage that starts in January 2014. Even if you have never been able to afford insurance before, you may qualify for financial assistance or qualify for Medicaid through expanded eligibility guidelines.

Confused about your health care options? The library is here to help! Trained ACA Assisters are available at all six Carroll County Public Library branches to help you understand the Affordable Care Act. Assisters have completed over 40 hours of training; they are prepared to help you create an account on Maryland Health Connection, review plan options, and answer questions. They can also assist with Medicaid enrollment as needed. If you are interested in meeting with an Assister, please review the online calendar and call your local library to schedule an appointment.

WHAT IS THE MARYLAND HEALTH CONNECTION?

The Maryland Health Connection is a new marketplace to compare health insurance options and enroll in a plan that best meets your needs, whether Medicaid or a private insurance plan.

- 14% uninsured in Maryland
- 6-month open enrollment period begins Oct. 1, 2013 and ends March 31, 2014
- Medicaid enrollment period continues year-round
- Coverage effective as early as January 1, 2014
- Many people will get savings they can use right away to help them pay for insurance in Maryland Health Connection (including an individual with income less than \$45,960 or a family of 4 with income less than \$94,200)

CATALOG TIPS

CCPL staff has created catalog tips to help our customers use the catalog as effectively as possible. To find these tips, go directly to catalog.carr. org, or if you are at the library home page, click on the Catalog home link under the catalog search bar. Here are three of the tips you will find on catalog.carr.org:

How do I place a request on a TV series or magazine?

- 1. Find the title you want to request in our catalog
- 2. Click on the "Place Request" button on the right, next to the series. A pop—up will appear that shows where the items are located, the disc numbers, and if the item is checked in.
- 3. Locate the disc number or issue that you are interested in requesting within the pop-up. To the left of the disc number or issue, you will see a hand holding a book, click on the hand to place a request on that disc number or issue.
- 4. Enter your library account information (if not already logged in) and select a pick up location.
- 5. Repeat this process for each disc or issue that you want to request.

How do I manage holds so I can receive discs or TV series in order?

- 1. From the library's home page, click on "My account" located under the search bar.
- 2. Login with your library account information.
- 3. Under the My Account tab select "Requests."
- 4. Check the checkbox to the left of the request(s) you want to suspend (for example discs 2&3 in a series).
- 5. Click the "Suspend/Reactivate Selected" button at the bottom of the screen (you will remain in your spot in the queue until you reactive your request).
- 6. Enter a date for it to automatically activate and click "Submit." (Please note: You can reactivate before the date you set.)
- 7. To activate an inactive request, follow the steps above and enter today's date to reactivate the request.
- 8. Repeat as other discs become available in order to receive the discs in order.

How do I create a reading history of items I have checked out?

The library does not keep a record of materials you have checked out after they have been returned and fines have been paid. In order to keep your own history of books you've read:

- 1. From the library's home page, click on "My Account" located under the search bar.
- 2. Login with your library account information.
- 3. Under the My Account tab, select My Record, click on "Contact Information and Preferences" and under Preferences check the box next to "Maintain Permanent Reading List," and click "Submit Change Request" at the bottom of the screen.
- 4. To find reading history, click on "Reading History" under the My Account tab within your account.
- 5. You can delete your reading history at any time by logging into your account and unchecking "Maintain Reading List" under Preferences. Note: If you uncheck, your reading list is gone forever. You may want to print a copy before deleting.

This winter we are highlighting two books that focus on American space travel:


The Astronaut Wives Club by Lily Koppel







Simple Activities that Promote Early Literacy

EVERY CHILD READY TO READ AT YOUR LIBRARY

Carroll County currently has the highest percentage of children ready for school when they enter kindergarten within the state of Maryland; however, the library is interested in sustaining and maintaining our position of excellence in the state and ensuring that our children continue on a path to success. Children who enter kindergarten with pre-reading skills have an advantage. They can focus on learning to read instead of first learning essential pre-reading skills. Children who start kindergarten ready to read have greater success throughout their school years.

The Carroll County Public Library is actively encouraging parents and caregivers to provide early learning opportunities around their homes. Get many suggestions and tips by attending library programs and visiting your local branch or mobile services vehicle.

Learning to read begins before children start school. From the time they are infants, children learn language and other important skills that will help them learn to read. Developing early literacy skills makes it easier for children to read once they begin schooling. You can help your child get ready by providing early literacy opportunities around your home.

- Talk and listen to your child as you prepare meals or do household chores.
- Sing songs and nursery rhymes, and play music. The library is a great place for music CDs especially for children.
- Have books within easy reach for your child. Make a special spot just for reading. The holidays are a perfect time to give books as gifts, so that your child may see books as special.
- Give your child many chances to scribble, draw, and write.
- Have a prop box with inexpensive items that your child can use for imaginative play.

Remember, it's never too early or too late to help your child develop language and other early literacy skills. Here are five of the best ways for children to get ready to read: talking, singing, reading, writing, and playing. These activities are easy to do with children of all ages. You and your child can enjoy them throughout the day—at home, in the car, or anywhere you spend time together. Children learn best by doing—and they love doing things with YOU.

Your library has many resources to help you talk, sing, read, write, and play with your child. Bring your children to the library to enjoy books, audiobooks, music CDs, read-along kits, school readiness kits, storytimes and other programs, services, and other resources—all free!
