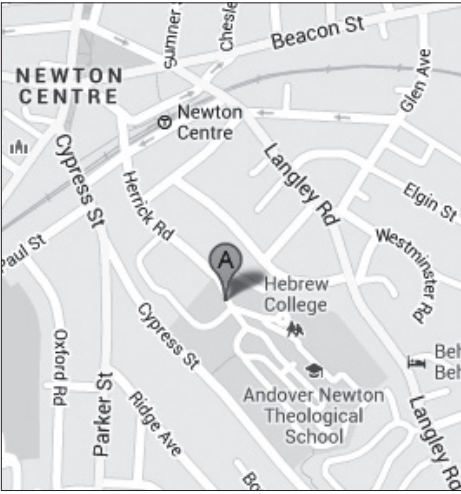

ARRIVING BY CAR:

**From points South:** From I-95 (also known as Route 128), take exit 20A (Route 9) east toward Boston. Proceed 2.1 miles on Route 9 to the Newton Centre/ West Roxbury right hand exit. Turn left onto Parker Street at the end of the exit ramp and proceed for .6 mile. Turn right onto Braeland Avenue. Then take the first right onto Herrick Road and follow the signs up the hill to the campus.

**From points North:** From I-95 (Route 128), take exit 21A. Turn right onto Route 16 East at the end of exit ramp and proceed for .3 mile. At light turn right onto Beacon St.; follow for 3 miles to Newton Centre. Cross Centre St. at traffic light and bear right onto Union St. Take first right onto Herrick Rd. and follow the signs up the hill to the campus.

**From points West:** Take the Massachusetts Turnpike heading East. Take Exit 17 (Newton/Watertown). Stay in the right lane and turn right at Centre Street. After you have turned onto Centre, the Eliot Church will be on your left in less than a block. Proceed 1.8 miles on Centre Street, past the Commonwealth Avenue intersection to the Newton Centre business district. Turn left at the light at Beacon Street and take an immediate right onto Union Street. Take your first right onto Herrick Road. Continue straight up the hill to the campus.

ARRIVING BY RAPID TRANSIT (MBTA):

Take the Green Line, Riverside Branch (D Train), to Newton Centre. As you get off an outbound car at Newton Centre, Herrick Road is on the left. Turn left at the end of the ramp and proceed on Herrick Rd. up the hill to the campus – a 10 minute walk.

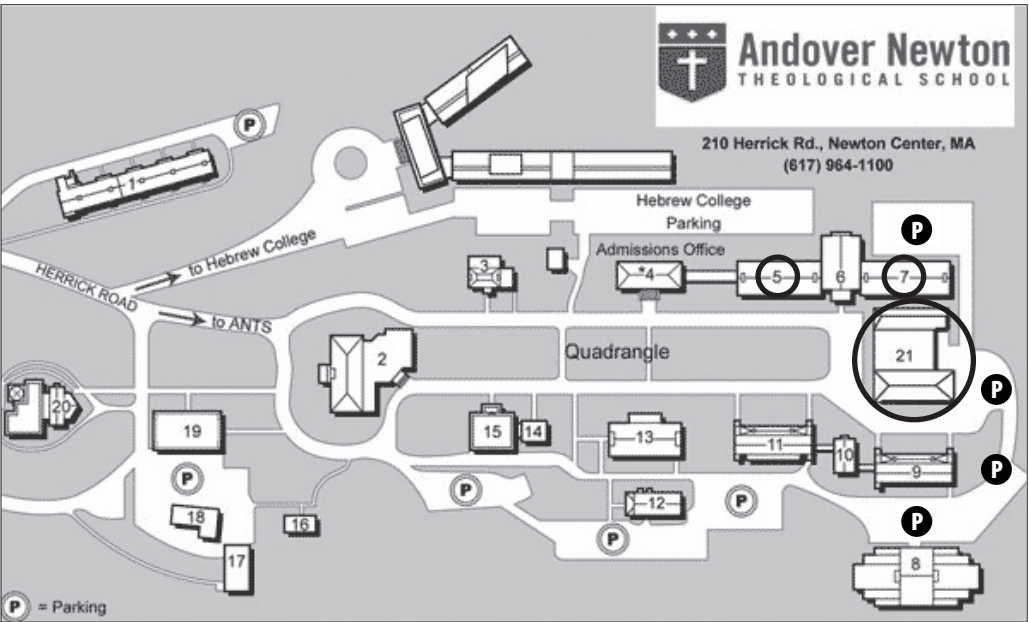

#### MASTERPIECES OF FRENCH LITERATURE

Enjoy reading and lively discussions of French Masterpieces, with Ingrid Kisliuk, PhD., author, scholar, and teacher at Tufts and Boston College. This session we will examine *The First Man* by Albert Camus (translated by David Hapgood, Vintage Books, 1996) and *The Life Before Us*, by Romain Gary (translated by Ralph Manheim, New Direction Books, 1986). This is a 5 class session. No class May 11. Classes run from 11:15-12:30.

#### OPERA, THE FIRST BROADWAY

Learn about opera and its composers through video and audio. We will open with the famous and beloved *Madama Butterfly*, by Puccini, followed by Verdi's first success *Nabucco*. Then we will look at Jules Massenet's *Manon*, Bellini's bel canto opera *I Puritani*, and Strauss's *Der Rosenkavalier*. We will end the session on a light comic note with *The Mikado* by Gilbert and Sullivan. With New England Opera Club President, John Tischio. This class runs from 11:15 –12:45.

#### OLIVE KITTERIDGE

New York Times bestselling author, Elizabeth Strout, binds together 13 complex, luminous narratives into one novel, through Olive, an unforgettable, larger than life character. With Rhona Swartz, BA and MA from Boston University, and long-time teacher. Limited to 10.
