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# A TEEN'S SELF-REFERRAL LEADS TO SELF-SUFFICIENCY

The day-to-day struggles faced by most teens today are difficult enough. Imagine being 17-years-old, three-months pregnant, caring for your one-year-old daughter with no place to live.

This is the true story of Candyce, a girl who only 18 months ago was losing all hope for her future. Due to family conflict with her mother, Candyce developed a behavior of constantly running away, which eventually resulted in her being bounced from family member to family member.



Candyce referred herself to Family Tree Gemini at age 17, while three-months pregnant and caring for her one-year-old daughter.

Finally, in August of 2008, Candyce and her mother began seeking conflict intervention, counseling and a more stable environment for Candyce and her daughter. After contacting a multitude of community shelters, Candyce referred herself to Family Tree Gemini.

Family Tree Gemini is a 20-bed therapeutic residential facility providing medical and dental referrals, meals, hygiene products, transportation and a structured, supervised environment for adolescents.

After entering Family Tree Gemini, Candyce began to open up about her current fears of experimenting with drugs while pregnant with her second child, her affiliation with local gang members and, most importantly, visitation with her daughter.

Her case manager helped Candyce identify specific goals which included participating in an Independent Living Program, obtaining a job, applying for permanent housing, working towards her GED and regaining weekly visitation with her daughter. As Candyce was truly homeless and had no where else to go, her stay at Family Tree Gemini was much longer than most self-referrals. Fortunately, the time was well spent and Candyce successfully completed all of her goals before exiting the program.

Candyce is now 19-years-old and living at Bridgeway, a home providing education and support for pregnant and parenting teens. She is currently working full-time to care for her son and has regular visitation with her daughter. "Now that I'm self-sufficient, things are great," said Candyce. "My kids mean the world to me and I would not trade them for anything."

This winter has provided its share of cold, wet and snowy weather, and as I reflect on Candyce and her story, I wonder how many times she was outside in unforgiving, inhospitable conditions. Where did she stay? Was she pregnant? How did she survive?

Like all Family Tree clients, Candyce's story is unique. But in this case, her story is one of many that is part of an alarming development: more and more youth self-referring themselves to Family Tree Gemini through our Runaway and Homeless Youth program. These young people are choosing to stay at Gemini so they can get off the streets, cease couch-surfing and escape conflict-ridden and unsafe homes.

Last year Family Tree experienced a distressing 45% increase in the numbers of runaway and homeless youth self-referring to Gemini. But what may be even more disturbing is that this trend continues: so far this year youth voluntarily coming to Family Tree Gemini are up more than 30% again. This trajectory is concerning, because in two years the numbers of youth seeking a safe place with people who listen and offer help, will double. Here are some additional important facts: annually Family Tree staff make more than 3,300 contacts with runaway and homeless youth through street outreach in Jefferson, Boulder and Adams counties; since October of last year we have maintained a wait list for voluntary youth placement because we

are unable to meet the needs; existing funding sources cover only 60% of the necessary costs to operate the program at the current level - a level not capable of meeting the necessary demand for services.

For the majority of these youth, however, reunification with their families is not only the goal, but also achievable with help from Family Tree staff. And once home, we continue to provide case management and assistance to help ensure these families have the resources and skills to remain together. And when family reunification is not a choice, as in Candyce's situation, Family Tree is there to help these youth identify other options so they can become safe, strong and self-reliant.

We're actively seeking solutions to assist us in delivering quality outcomes that address the increasing needs of runaway and homeless youth. Please continue to join with us as we press forward in efforts to end child abuse, domestic violence and homelessness.


