



But they came to the Mojave Desert, the Quicksilver Thirteen. Who are the Quicksilver Thirteen?

They worked tireless from August 2015 to now on an inherited 20 Mule Team Ride. They had been a part of the workings for 25+ years before, but now where is Robert? Brian and Valerie Reeves are the first two of the Quicksilver Thirteen. This year's ride had amazing attendance and organization. Running a 100 mile ride, two 50 day rides, two LD rides and an introductory ride is no small feat. Bless you team members one and two of the Quicksilver Thirteen, without your hard work the Ride would be not.

Just days before the ride, a motorcycle rumbling was heard. A race of motorcycles on the same trail as 20 Mule Team - on the same day was planned. No fear, Nick Warhol and Judy Long are here! Trails were changed and timing was double checked...to keep as few cycles and horse together as possible. 1,400 ribbons, 150 pounds of flour and an untold number of glow bars were set. Nick and Judy make team members three and four of the Quicksilver Thirteen.

In transition from West to East, the fifth member of the Thirteen was supporting the ride as she has for many years. Melissa Ribley was vetting horses from Friday afternoon until end of Sunday. Many kudos to Melissa and Robert for putting on the 20 Mule Team Ride for a decade or more. Robert was not in attendance this year, but Melissa is the fifth member of the Quicksilver Thirteen.

The Queen of Parking, the Manager of Operations, the Driver of Rescue Trailers, the In and Out Timer, Overseer of the Finish Line, Giver of Awards...oh, who else could this be, but Mary. Everywhere, doing everything, keeping the order, keeping the peace...guiding us, supporting us and always keeping us true, it is Mary Anderson who is the sixth member of the Quicksilver Thirteen.

A vet and horsewoman of extraordinary talent came to the event and offered her help. At the long vet lines, she stepped in to take up the slack both at the base camp and at vet stops out on the ride. Our seventh member of the Quicksilver Thirteen is Michele Roush Rowe who has ridden the 20 Mule Team for 12 +/- times.

What a surprise to see the gal who was holding the stethoscope to my horse's girth at Vet Check Three doing P&Rs. She giggled at my dumpling 30 mile horse, but she gladly told me of my daughter's progress through the 100 mile ride. Our eighth member of the Quicksilver Thirteen is Hillorie Bachmann.

With a young horse with a long difficult history, our ninth member of the Quicksilver Thirteen rode into the top ten of the 100 mile ride. This young horse has seen surgery too early in his career but has healed and grown into a strong athlete named Quicksilver WR carrying Sandy Holder to fifth place in the 100 at the 2016 Twenty Mule Team.

A member who has seen the endurance tradition in other countries and has a Tom Quilty Buckle next to her Tevis Buckle, Tracy Hofstrand is our tenth Quicksilver Thirteen member while placing

top ten in the 50 mile ride on day one.

Two days of 50s is a challenge to most, but this Quicksilver member has seen and done more. A true supporter of the Quicksilver Club, Peggy Davidson and Great Balls of Fire took 13th and 10th place Saturday and Sunday, respectively in the 50 mile rides at 20 Mule Team. What a way to start a season Quicksilver Thirteen member number eleven!

As Quicksilver Thirteen members, twelve and thirteen, Jennifer and I enjoyed the club coming together to support a ride that in 36 years has continued the tradition of having a 100 mile endurance ride. Whether riding, managing or volunteering, the fact that Thirteen members of our little Northern California club step up to keep the tradition of a 100/50/30 mile ride in Southern California going is worthy of acknowledgement.

Of History and Tragedy

Lud McCrary's great-grandfather, Joshua Grinnell, his wife Elizabeth, and his step-son, Vid Trumbo, came to California from Iowa in the late 1860s, finally settling along Big Creek in what is now known as Swanton, in 1869. The family is now in its seventh generation and has never left this land. The photo below shows Josh on the right, with Vid, age 52, just behind the haystack on the left, showing only head and shoulders. The photo was taken by the noted photographer, Edward Leland Gifford in 1901. Notice in the left background the tall redwood snag, possibly killed by a fire of long ago. This snag was said to have been there in 1869 when the family first bought and settled this quarter-section of land. Obviously, it was there in 1901, 115 years ago.

Lud had built an arena under it in the 1940s so he could train an unbroke horse for himself to ride. In the 1950s, Lud's dad hosted Sunday evening volleyball games under this tree, inviting neighbors and the young men from the nearby CDF (California Department of Forestry) fire-fighting camp to join in. After an evening of vigorous games, we all had ice cream provided by Lud's mother.

Our eldest daughter, Susan, married Butch Huff under the trees near this snag in 1979.

Lud's nephew, Ken McCrary, lives on the same site as the original Grinnell home, though the house has been rebuilt a couple of times. Ken's wife, Quicksilver member Jeanine, kept her horses in pipe paddocks amongst a few trees in back of the house and near the snag.

On the afternoon of January 22nd, this year, the old snag gave up its watchfulness over all the activities that had taken place in its domain—and fell. It fell between a couple of fruit trees planted by Lud's mother, decades ago. It missed Ken and Jeanine's house by a mere 20 feet. But it caught Jeanine's new horse, her much-loved, "perfect horse", a gaited Rocky Mountain Horse named Red Ryder. He was killed instantly.

The entire family is mourning his passing, sorrow for the loss of the horse's future possibilities, and grief for Jeanine, who is still coping with her loss.

Weather & Clothing:

The weather in March in Gilroy, California is usually very pleasant, daytime temperatures should range from 60° - 75°. However if we do experience an El Niño year, it could be rainy. Bring rain gear. Evenings and morning are cooler, usually in the mid-thirties - to mid-fifties. Bring plenty of sun block, sun glasses, hat/visor, and sunblock for your horse if he/she requires it. Make sure to bring water. The indoor arena is usually quite comfortable regardless of outside temperatures. Our advice is to dress in layers!




