TEMPE CHAMBER HOSTS GOV. JAN BREWER

The Tempe Chamber of Commerce hosted Arizona Governor Janice K. Brewer at an informal business luncheon last month at Bridgeview at Hayden Ferry Lakeside.

Gov. Brewer addressed an audience of 30 representatives from the Tempe business community who gathered to hear her thoughts on the state's economic environment and to offer their insights on how it can work at local levels to cultivate favorable conditions.

The governor addressed issues including protecting Arizona's portion of federal stimulus funding, holding a special November legislative session to address underfunded agencies, working cooperatively with the state legislature to continue supporting the state's social programs, and tax reform as she discussed her plans to balance the state budget and maintain Arizona's fiscal integrity.

"We truly appreciate that the governor took the opportunity to speak

with the leadership of the Tempe Chamber in this informal setting and allowed us to have a one-on-one dialogue with her on issues that are important to us," said Vicki Kringen, Tempe Chamber of Commerce Board Chair.

TEMPE CHAMBER ENDORSES "YES" VOTE IN BOND ELECTION

It's officially autumn. Leaves are beginning to fall, football teams are huddling, and election campaign signs have been pounded into the ground.

One issue of immediate concern to Tempe is that of the Tempe Elementary School District's Nov. 3, \$77 million bond election. The Tempe Chamber of Commerce's Board of Directors has voted to support the bond.

In 2003, the district formed a Long Range Facilities Committee that studied its facilities and building standards. The committee's focus was on priorities such as small schools and small class sizes, condition of existing facilities, educational programs having their own space, equity among schools across the district and the elimination of portable buildings.

The findings showed that schools needed major renovation. Critical maintenance challenges were revealed including roof repairs, mechanical system repairs, plumbing problems and the need to update technology in the classrooms. Although these types of projects typically should be paid from Arizona's Building Renewal Fund, the state has not fully funded the formula for several years. The district's governing board called this bond election because they are committed to providing our children with the very best education possible.

In today's global marketplace our children are competing internationally and economic conditions have made it clear that we can no longer afford to wait until the Building Renewal Fund appropriately funds the district. To continue to top the charts among our sister cities that surround us, we need to ensure that our students have the means to be the best they can be.

By voting yes for the TD#3 Bond Election, we believe that we are putting our money where our mouth is. Let's keep our students among the best, above the rest.

Tempe Chamber of Commerce Inaugurates Algebra Academy

Algebra. It is among the most feared words in a high school student's life.

The Tempe Chamber of Commerce aims to change this perception. The Tempe Chamber has a plan to help students learn – and enjoy – this important mathematical subject. We want these students to succeed in every facet of their future. The Chamber believes in the importance of and is committed to the teaching of Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) for the development of our future workforce.

Realizing that it is imperative that Algebra be a part of all students' educational background, we are co-sponsoring the first Algebra Academy for two weeks in the summer of 2010. For the first Algebra Academy twenty students will be selected after having met the criteria set for the program.

In partnership with Tempe Elementary School District, the Tempe Union High School District and various businesses, we are targeting students entering the ninth grade in the fall of 2010, having passed the pre-Algebra test in eighth grade.

These students will spend mornings at one of the high schools learning the academic elements of Algebra. Then, each afternoon, they will spend time at sponsor companies, learning Algebra standards and their application in real world situations. Ideal students for this program are those who have passed the pre-Algebra test in 8th grade, have an interest in Mathematics, and who need additional motivation and further instruction to be better qualified to enjoy higher education and rewarding careers upon graduation.

This important partnership between local educators and businesses is a source of pride and excitement for our community. The Tempe Chamber of Commerce will provide funding for the course's teacher, student transportation, and lunch. A ceremony of accomplishment will be held on the last day.

The 24 schools in the Tempe Elementary School District consist of 17 elementary schools grades kindergarten through five, a developmental special needs school, an Intervention Learning Program middle school, four middle schools grades six through eight and a K-8 traditional school, Ward Traditional Academy, newly opened fall 2005.

The student population of Tempe Elementary School District No. 3 consists of diverse cultural, ethnic, and socioeconomic groups. Its proximity to ASU promotes our rich diversity. There are approximately 13,800 students in the district. Sixty-eight foreign languages are spoken by students in the district.

SCF WORKPLACE SAFETY PROTECT YOUR WORKPLACE AGAINST THE FLU

Whether it is a common strain or this year's expected H1N1 virus, the flu bug can sweep through your workplace infecting employees and causing lost time. In fact, in an average year, 36,000 Americans die from the influenza virus.

Often, employers don't consider illnesses like the flu as workers' compensation related, but in the grand scheme of lost time and of keeping workers safe and well, having a plan to prevent contagious diseases is as important as fighting against slips, trips and falls.

There's still time to make workplaces safer before the flu hits.

Dr. Robert England, head of Maricopa County Public Health, says current predictions show that at least one in four will get sick this flu season, as the virus spreads. Much of that person-to-person passing will be in the workplace.

Debbie McCune, program director of the Arizona Partnership for Immunization, says employers could expect to see as much as 20 percent of their employees out at one time. This is why businesses need to get ready for the flu season.

Small businesses can do these things immediately:

• **Stress personal hygiene.** – The flu virus spreads through the air or on surfaces such as door knobs, phone handsets or keyboards. Prevention can be as simple as thoroughly washing one's hands

with soap and water or using an antibacterial antiseptic hand gel. Workers should use tissues for sneezing or coughing.

• Urge workers and their families to get flu shots. – The available vaccine guards against the regular flu, which protects

those who are susceptible. A second shot to prevent the spread of H1N1 is another option. Most health insurances will cover the cost of the shots. Consider scheduling a flu shot clinic at work for employees' convenience.

• **Update your workers regularly about the flu.** – Stay abreast of news and information regarding the flu and communicate with your workers.

• Plan for absenteeism. – Create a plan on how to cover workers. The Centers for Disease Control and the Occupational Safety and Health Administration urge employers to allow workers to stay home if they become ill, or even if family members are, so they are not coming to work and spreading the virus to others.
