April 19 — Special Collection for the Center for Justice

The Center for Justice was founded in 1999 by Spokane lawyer Jim Sheehan because as Sheehan saw it, the courts too often favored the strong while the powerless often could not afford representation. "Justice is about fairness, protecting the wider community from abuse by the moneyed few." The Center advocates for citizens in such issues prisoners' rights, reinstatement of drivers' licenses, and restoring voting rights. But that's not all. The work of the Center has grown to also include: Spokane Riverkeeper, a for-impact environmental advocacy program that works to protect the health of our Spokane River and Smart Justice which advocates for policy reform and working to create a more fair, just and effective regional criminal justice system. The Health and Justice Initiative assists healthcare providers in using the law as a tool to lower costs and improve health. The Center for Justice is also active in Police Accountability advocacy for the rights of citizens and independent police oversight in our community.

Growing Generosity: 2015-16 Stewardship

The signs of spring are everywhere, and if the blooms have yet to appear in your yard, not to worry — predictions are for a wetter than normal spring! April is the month we will be pouring energy into growing something else at UUSC — generosity. Generosity comes in many forms, of course, but one of the most vital is the sharing of our financial resources with our church. Throughout April, we'll be concentrating on raising pledges for the funds needed for the work we do here at UUCS to Create Community, Find Meaning, and Work for Justice.

Shortly after the first of the month, every member of the congregation will be receiving a packet of information in the mail outlining the pledging process for the 2015-16 church fiscal year that runs from July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2016. We encourage you to complete the green pledge form and return it as soon as possible to the church office. If you prefer, you can complete your pledge form online on the church website at www.uuspokane.org.

On Sundays in April, members of the congregation will share how your generosity makes possible the work they do at UUCS. And, of course, you'll have an opportunity to complete and turn in your pledge form then, too.

Regardless of how you return your pledge, we encourage you to get it in as soon as possible so that we can



begin planning for the upcoming year. Consider increasing your pledge — the average annual pledge needed to meet our budget needs is \$1200 per member. Many of our members give more than that, and we are very grateful. That amount is not reasonable for some of us, but do you know that if 10 percent of our members each gave \$10 a month, the resulting revenue would be close to \$5,000? No pledge is too small. Every amount is appreciated and put to good use.



TREASURER'S REPORT

We are a generous congregation and together we do much to make our community and our world a better place. At eight months into our fiscal year, we're in good shape year-to-date, with over \$14,000 in the black. Our expenses remain fairly consistent throughout the year and our revenues vary quite a bit. We spent almost \$10,000 more than we took in during February, which represents our typical after-New-Year slump in collections.

The Board and Finance Committee are watching our finances very closely as there is a \$17,000 gap between our budgeted pledges and our actual pledges. I'm concerned with what the next few months may bring. We are delaying what expenses we can, but that alone won't solve the problem. Thank you for keeping up with your pledge commitments it takes all of us together to make this work.

2015 FINANCIAL REVIEW IN BRIEF

On Wednesday, March 18, members of the Board of Trustees (BOT) Finance Committee (Herb Bonallo, former UUCS Treasurer, and BOT members Ann-Scott Ettinger and Donna Bordon-Rhodes) conducted a financial review of church accounting systems, processes and procedures. The review consisted of interviews with church Business Administrator (Jet Tilley), Treasurer (Marie Bjork), and contract Bookkeeper (Connie Smith-Blackburn) regarding procedures and controls, as well as random tests using the congregation-approved budget to determine the reliability of the accounting system and conformance to the budget.

Based on the interviews and tests, the reviewers determined the procedures employed to manage church finances are in keeping with the accounting principle of internal control, which requires a separation of tasks and duties in order to protect assets. The reviewers also found the recording of pledges and other cash receipts to be appropriate and complete, and no discrepancies or exceptions when tracking payments to vendors, employees, and individuals from financial reports back through the system to source documents.

Thank you to everyone who participated in the review for making it a process that allows for both verification of good practices and enhancing our systems. Both the reviewers and those being interviewed made suggestions for procedural improvements that were accepted and put in place. If you'd like to see the full Financial Review Report, please contact any member of the review team or the church office.

CELEBRATING RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Tracy's Reflections

Years ago, when my sons were young, they were excited for a play date. We drove to get the friend, but when we got there the boy said, "I changed my mind, I don't want to go." He wasn't upset or worried. He just wanted to do something else.

The mom shrugged with a half apologetic smile, and that was that, he wasn't going. My children were devastated. They had been looking so forward to the play date. I was shocked. When my children made a commitment, they kept it, because I knew it was hurtful to break commitments. This mom let her son know that what he wanted and his happiness were more important than being thoughtful and kind.

Children in our society have learned that lesson. Happiness is more important than kindness and so is personal achievement. When the Making Caring Common Project, a program at Harvard, surveyed 10,000 youth, 80% said achievement and happiness were their life priorities. Only 20% said being caring was a priority.

Meanwhile, in another study, 96% of all parents said their children's moral character was a "very important, if not essential." However, that is not what the youth thought. Eighty-one percent said happiness or achievement was their parent's top priority for them. Most said that their parents would be prouder of them if they got good grades than if they did something good in their community.

For Unitarian Universalists empathy and kindness ground our faith. However, it can be easy for any parents to get caught up in the cultural ideals of personal happiness and achievement.

The Making Caring Common project reminds us that our children learn what we teach. If we tell our children caring matters, model kind behavior, and help our children practice caring, they will become more compassionate and kind. So instead of saying to our kids, "the most important thing is for you to be happy," we say, "the most important things are for you to be happy and kind to others."

When we help our children make decisions, we remind them to consider the impacts of those decisions on others. When they want to leave the band or sports team, we ask how that will affect others who are counting on them. When they don't want to go to church or a family event, we remind them being in a community is not just about their own enjoyment, but about the ways their presence matters to others.

We act as role models. We are compassionate and kind toward people. We offer service to those in need. We ask our children not only "how was your day?" and "what did you learn?" but also, "what did you do that was kind?"

We share this earth with many people. Everyone has a responsibility to treat others with care. My hope is that our church community offers us all hundreds of opportunities to practice that art.

Welcome Happy Campers

We are excited you will be joining us at camp this year! Enclosed are packing suggestions, specific ideas for youth and children, the Cardboard Boat Race rules, and directions to the camp.

A few reminders this year: We will be transporting luggage both to and from a spot near your cabin, so please pack in something that is easily transported. You are also welcome to carry your luggage yourself. Luggage transportation will be Friday evening from 5:30 till about 8:30. On Sunday there will be designated spots for each cabin to put luggage, which we will pick up after worship. If you need to leave early on Sunday please let us know; you may need to carry your luggage to your car.

All meals will be provided by the camp from Friday dinner (6:30 - 7:30) through Sunday breakfast. Camp officially ends Sunday at noon, but we are free to stay at camp for the afternoon. If you would like to hang around on Sunday to swim or visit, please do. Bring a snack for lunch if you choose to stay as the kitchen will be closed after breakfast.

All the cabins have heat and electricity. The cabins have bunk beds, sleep about 10 people, and are usually shared by two or three families or groups. The restrooms and showers are in a separate building. An exception is Lakeview Lodge, which is in the basement of the dining hall/lodge and has bathrooms inside. If you are in Lakeview Lodge, please check in upstairs before you move in downstairs. You will be sharing the bunk area with others so please be considerate.

Every camper should bring a sleeping bag, pillow, and clothes for every kind of weather. Bring a warm coat, toiletries, comfortable shoes, insect repellent, and flashlight.

A lifeguard will be on duty Saturday afternoon so please bring swimsuits and water toys. Canoes and rowboats are available when the lifeguard is on duty. Any camper who would like to bring their own boats is welcome to do so and may boat at any time, no lifeguard necessary! Please feel free to bring fishing gear and sports equipment, soccer balls, baseball, football or Frisbee stuff. Be sure to put your name on anything you want to take back home with you.

There will be massage therapists available again this year on Saturday. If you are interested bring your checkbook (they will be charging about \$60 an hour) and sign up in the lodge Friday night.

Camp is a community-based endeavor; please sign up to volunteer for camp activities. Everyone is responsible for cleaning their own cabin and helping with their assigned cleanup task Sunday morning.

Call for more information on car pooling, cabin assignments, or any other questions you might have. We're looking forward to spending the weekend with you!

We will have structure programming on Saturday morning, please find a way to participate. There will be active options, thinking options and sharing options. Glad that you are joining our community for the weekend!! Thanks!!

UUCS SOLAR SNAPSHOT

As of Wednesday, March 25, 2015, at approximately 2 pm, our 75 panel solar array has produced 52 MWh of electricity since it went on-line in November 2012. This equals the amount of energy it takes to:



- Equivalent to 17,317,439 AA batteries
- · Power a light bulb for 456.2 years
- · Average mobile phone 1,611.6 years
- · Run a refrigerator for 31.5 years
- Produced the capacity of 16,703,563 AA batteries
- Drive 2,302.8 laps of the Monaco Grand Prix
- · Light up the Eifel Tower for 21 nights

As well, planting a tree offsets the same amount of CO2 as 55.3 kilowatt-hours of clean energy production, which means

our system has off-set the carbon equivalent of 940 trees!


