Mother reflects on life without Katie Poirier

MOOSE LAKE (AP) -- Pam Poirier sometimes finds herself glancing at the back door of her home, hoping that her daughter will walk in and end the nightmare that started when Katie was abducted from a convenience store and later killed.


"It's four months of hell, if that's the way you want to (put) it," she said. "I'd give up everything to have her back."

The fact that Donald Blom cleared up the uncertainty surrounding Katie's disappearance by admitting he kidnapped and killed the 19-year-old has made things a little easier. In some respects, Poirier said the tragedy has made her family closer, stronger and more spiritual.

"We're not going to be the same family we were on May 25," Poirier said of husband Steve, son Patrick, father Lloyd Simich and her siblings. "But if anything, we're better."

She finds comfort in her faith, family and the hundreds of letters of inspiration she received from strangers. Each night, Pam and Steve sift through boxes and bags of letters, some from as far away as Europe and Australia

A Time to Grieve: Meditations for Healing After the Death of a Loved One By Carol Staudacher

I just finished reading this book. I was up all night. I agree with the other reviewers that generally, this book is not a cover to cover read. In 1985, I was 23 and lost my fiance. As I struggled through the grief, I found little comfort or understanding from my friends and family. I turned to literature. I found few good books, the Courage to Grieve was the best and a great source of comfort. But, Oh how I wish this book was there then!

A dear friend died a few weeks ago and I have been looking for ways to help and support her husband. I came across this title from other Amazon reviewers. I'm not very good with words-and this book captured a swirl of complex thoughts and feelings and put them into words. It encourages, it asks you to be gentle with yourself, it tells you the true meaning of courage--TO FEEL-and it keeps reminding you--hold onto your hope no matter the depth of your pain or the severity of your isolation. You will make it through the grief. This author has given us-- the broken (and mended) hearted a very special gift.

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Katie Poirier

Late in the evening of May 26, 1999, Katie Poirier, working alone at a convenience store in a Conoco service station, just off the freeway near Moose Lake, Minnesota, was abducted by a man, caught on the video tape wearing a New York Yankee jersey with the number 23 on the back.

The disappearance touched off a massive search for Katie which was called off on June 6.

Witnesses reported seeing a black pickup in the area and gave a partial plate number. The plate was ultimately traced to a pickup owned by a man identified as Donald Blom.

In September he admitted to the killing and told authorities remains found in a fire pit on his property were Katie's.

I expect that many of you reading this will recall the case as it was very high profile at that time.

Joanie and I and several other POMC members met Katie's mom Pam, over the ensuing years. For a bit, we were all members of a fledging group known as CVAC, (Crime Victims Action Committee) which was formed to assist persons who needed help interacting with the criminal justice system. Sadly, the program never really got going and we disbanded after a year or so.

We are pleased and honored to have as our speaker at the Crime Victims Rights Week Brunch, Katie's brother, Patrick. He has spoken many times to various groups regarding Katie's case and its effect on his family. We, over the years have had speakers from the justice system, parents and politicians, but only once before have we had a sibling.

And she reflects on the memories. There's the search for Katie's junior prom dress that drove both crazy. Katie's passion for french fries with a side of ranch dressing, Cabbage Patch dolls and dresses, dogs and movies and the Green Bay Packers also stick out in her mind.

She smiles at how Katie, at 5 feet 2 and barely 100 pounds, could eat and eat. "Just a peanut," she said. "And she eats like a horse."

Not even Blom, a convicted sex offender, can take those memories away.

"Everywhere I turn, it's Katie," she said.

"Everywhere I am, it's Katie. It is going to be hard for me thinking of her taking care of me now, rather than me taking care of her."

The Poirier family has suffered through a host of emotions -- concern, hope, anger, anguish and frustration -- since Katie was abducted four months ago Sunday.

Early on, it was hard for Poirier to get out of bed. "I'd just sit with the covers over my head -- I didn't care," she said. "It even took a lot to dust off my coffee table. I had to sit down. Leaving the house was very hard. And if I'd go, I'd want to come right back."

The physical toll also mounted. She started smoking again. She lost 25 pounds. She stopped wearing makeup.

But Poirier will try to resume her old routines.

She planned to return today to her job as a social worker in Moose Lake for the first time since Blom's Sept. 8 confession. Steve Poirier, a biologist who runs a business in Superior, Wis., is back to work and busy. Patrick, Katie's 21-year-old brother, works for his dad and plans to go back to Fond du Lac Community College in Cloquet this winter.

But it appears likely that the Poiriers will have to endure a court trial because the plea deal that brought Blom's confession is no more.

Last week, Poirier showed up in court and watched as Blom was led to and from the courtroom. It was the first time Pam Poirier had faced Blom since his arrest.

"I don't know if it was Katie or God," she said. "But I wasn't nervous. I had to look evil in the eye and I did. And he didn't win."

After Thursday's hearing -- when the plea agreement fell apart for the second time -- Pam, Steve and Patrick went out to eat. They were able to laugh.

"Donald Blom is not in our house," she said. "The day of the service or that weekend, we would not talk about him. We're leaving him outside. He's not at our dinner table, he's not with us (when we watch) our TV shows. The devil has not entered our house. He's tried. But he might as well go on."


From Rita Reker, St. Cloud
