President's Message

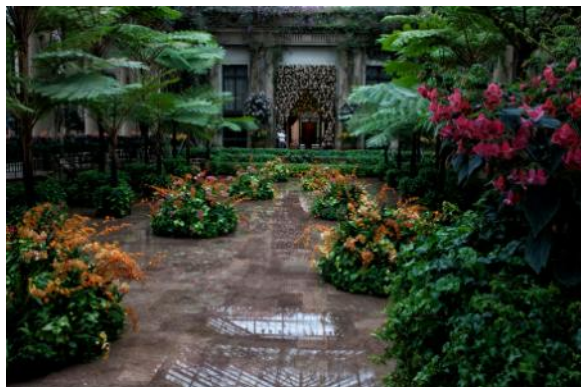
Greetings to all of you!

The calendar tells me it is Spring and looking outdoors on gray skies with temperatures around forty degrees does not minimize my excitement with the arrival of Spring.

Do not forget to register for Springbrook and come play with us on April 22-24! (Details on Pg. 3 and 4)

Without any question spring is my absolutely my favorite season of the year as we go from the dull grays to the vibrant greens and all of the pollen that goes with that beauty. In celebration of spring I'm going out to one of my favorite gardens on this earth, Longwood Gardens (<http://longwoodgardens.org>).

Let me provide you with a bit of history of this remarkable place. In the 1,800s the two Pierce brothers rode on horseback around New England collecting specimens of all of the native trees. Upon their return home they created a woods (Pierce's Woods) but much later the younger generation of Pierces decided they had no interest in the woods so they were in the process of selling the woods to a logging company. Pierre DuPont, one of the creators of Nylon, who lived nearby decided that he would buy the property to prevent the logging. Initially he had no idea what he would do with it, but felt it wrong to have a beautiful forest destroyed. He also built his home on the property which you can tour.



The result is truly a photographer's playground if you like living things. The entire property now has 1,200 total acres but 325 acres are devoted to the area we all can enjoy. It's hard to give you an idea of the scale of their offerings, but let me say that on one of the areas known as the garden walk there are 250,000 tulips planted (not a typo, a quarter of a million tulips). On the floor of Pierce's woods in early Spring there will be a quarter of a million crocus! I can remember being in the Conservatory at Christmas where the supervisor called down to the green house as one variety of poinsettia was not looking the best and when the greenhouse called back the answer was that they had 400 in reserve. To give a little plug about Christmas at Longwood they string forty miles of outdoor lights down the various garden paths!

One of my favorite things about Longwood is weather doesn't always make photography difficult because there are four acres "under glass" that are groomed perfectly so the weather outdoors does not matter. The largest of the indoor areas is the orangery which is the size of two basketball courts side by side with a lovely path around the border and through the middle. Next to the orangery is the exhibition hall where there is also another display which often is reflected because they flood the floor!

The East Conservatory also about the size of two basketball courts, has more than one waterfall and a number of flowers and often tropical plants! There is a children's garden with lots of things to see, play with and get wet (Longwood provides towels). An orchid room allows you to view at least 400 of Longwood's 1,200 orchids. How about a tropical area, a desert area, palm house, fern walk, they're all there and more! In summer there are fabulous water lilies including the huge platter lilies that are at least 3 feet in diameter.



Outdoors there are usually three separate fountains: the big fountain in front of the conservatory which is the size of a city block, one at the outdoor theatre, and an Italian water garden. Right now the big fountain is under renovation but prior to this renovation it had 1,750 water jets, colored lights and did a show every two hours. At the height of the program it would push 10,000 gallons of water per minute! Two evenings a week there was a light and water show set to music and run by computer – breathtaking.

Tripods and monopods are allowed until noon every day but if it is a slow weekday at the garden and I would suggest you go during the week; the volunteers will allow you to use your tripod longer. The other thing I really like about Longwood is that they've got over 20 motorized carts you can rent for the day, or if you become a member you can use for free. Those carts can go everywhere in

the entire 325 acres. Longwood has created a ten-acre solar array and intend to be off the grid by 2018. There is a cafeteria on the property and a rather nice restaurant as well. Longwood Gardens is thirty miles south of Philadelphia and is associated with the little town of Kennett Square. (<http://longwoodgardens.org>)

During the first week in April Longwood will be my destination and I get chills even thinking about it.

Hi Jo,

Thanks for your article on participating in art fairs. My experience has been similar to yours, although we've never managed to actually make any money. For several years we did the art fair - which is actually an art and craft fair as nearly all of them have been in the last 10 years, here in Northfield. As near as I can tell from talking to other exhibitors, very few of the artists make money. I did some research and discovered the "distraction factor".

The distraction factor is what happens when an art fair becomes something else. Like an art fair WITH a concert. Or an art fair that's part of the Defeat of Jesse James weekend here in Northfield, MN. Over the two days, when the organizers claim 8000 visitors, there's a car show, kids tractor pull, soap box derby, rodeo in the evening and two afternoons, beer tent, bands, indoor craft thing in the hockey arena, and a big parade Sunday afternoon. Needless to say, the distraction factor is huge and while there may be 8000 people, not nearly that many go through the Art and Craft fair. Far fewer buy anything, and of those a very small number buy "art"...

The same is true of other shows... I've read entries from show-goers that say they won't do any fair where there is seating for visitors in other venues - grandstands for concerts or other events associated with the fair.

Unfortunately, after a number of years of doing shows, we finally looked at the real return on our time, and realized for the time it takes to pack up for the show, drive to the show if it's out of town, set up the tent and prints AT the show, do the show, tear down, drive home and unpack everything, we made less than the minimum wage 15 years ago! This isn't counting the time and materials to process the images, make the prints, and mount and frame the prints. Coupled with the cost of being juried and possibly rejected, and the practices of some shows to artificially limit the number of artists in favor of crafts, we've reduced our involvement significantly.

Before considering a show, I've learned to check with the show organizer and ask a few questions:

How many entries do you receive in a typical year?

How many entries do you typically receive from photographers?

How many total exhibitors will be in your event?

How many "artists" will you be including in the event?

Of those artists, how many will be photographers?

I've asked about income, average income, average for photographers, and so on, but the organizers typically say they don't have these numbers or they aren't reliable.

What I found, for example, when I looked at a nearby show was approximately:

1100 applications, each charged \$30 for jury fee.

280 entries from photographers.

75 exhibitor booths.

25-30 artists.

Probably 6 photographers, 9 painters, 6 or so sculptors, and so on.

Which means this show, whether rain or shine, successful for the participants or not, took in \$33,000 in jury fees, and another \$10,500 in booth fees at \$140 each. 6 out of 280 generates a lot of jury fees and a very low 1 out of 50 likelihood of getting into the show.

I've been told by organizers that the jury fees "cover the cost of jurying". In one case, I called the organizer and reached one of the office staff. In response to my question about how they juried, she admitted, "Oh, we don't actually HAVE a jury. Whoever is here just looks at the entries as they come in and decides."

I've also heard of practices where some members of the jury were show exhibitors and attempted to minimize the number of direct competitors they allowed into the show. BUT, like you, I've always found having people view my work and enjoy it to be the most fun. Being asked where an image was captured definitely takes me back to the event.
