# **Academic Plan of Study**

# **Program Summary Information:**

- Declaring the Major: Minimum of 2.5 GPA requirement; Passing scores on all three parts of the Praxis I or acceptable alternatives (SAT or ACT scores); Grades on EDUC 2100 and SPED 2100 of "C" or better. Students must also complete an "Application for Admission to a Teacher Education Program" in the Office of Teacher Education Advising, Licensure, and Recruitment (TEALR) in the College of Education.
- Advising (Dual Program): Students in the Dual Program will attend mandatory advising sessions each semester. The Coordinator of the Dual Program and/or the Advisor for the Dual Program will facilitate the meetings.
- Advising (General Education): By advisors in the Office of TEALR in the College of Education.
- Minimum Grades/GPA: GPA of 2.5 or higher must be maintained; Grades in professional education and concentration coursework must be "C" or better and the overall GPA in these courses must be a 2.75
- Teacher Licensure: YES, Special Education and Elementary Education provide a Special Education
   General Curriculum K-6 license and an Elementary Education K-6 license.
- Night Classes Available: NO
- Weekend Classes Available: NO
- Other information: A yearlong internship (YLI) is a requirement for completion of the major. This YLI must begin one semester prior to student teaching. An application is required for admission to the YLI and must be completed early in the semester prior to beginning the YLI see Office of Field Experiences' website (<a href="http://education.uncc.edu/ofe/">http://education.uncc.edu/ofe/</a>) for YLI application deadlines. Student teaching is required the last semester upon completing all other coursework required for the Dual Program. Student teaching requires an additional application, that students meet all GPA requirements, and must include the Dual Program Coordinator's and/or Advisor's recommendation.

# **Program Requirements:**

The Dual Program has a very *structured* curriculum and sequence of courses. Freshmen who intend to pursue the Dual Program are classified as-Pre-Education majors in Special Education and Elementary Education. During the pre-education phase students are advised by TEALR advisors regarding General Education and how to meet the requirements for admission into the Dual Program.

Upon completion of the education prerequisite courses and 30 hours, students apply for admission to the Special Education - General Curriculum and Elementary Education K-6 Dual Program. Upon admission

to the program, students are advised by the Coordinator of the Dual Program where they plan the remainder of their program of studies.

All students seeking to apply to the Special Education - General Curriculum and Elementary Education K-6 Dual Program must submit a completed "*Application for Admission to a Teacher Education Program*" to TEALR. The following are the criteria for admissions to Teacher Education and the Dual Program:

Minimum criteria for admission to the Dual program:

- Completion of at least 30 semester hours with grades of "C" or above in General Education requirements
- Overall GPA of at least 2.5
- A grade of "C" or better in EDUC 2100 and SPED 2100
- Passing scores on all three parts of the Praxis I (Reading, Writing and Mathematics) or acceptable alternatives (SAT or ACT scores)
- Admission application through the TEALR Office
- Completion of a Professional Statement (see Application for Admission to a Teacher Education Program Dual Program)
- Preadvisor's recommendation and approval (TEALR Advisor)

- 2. To be admitted to the Teacher Education Program and take any 3000/4000 level Professional Education courses, students must have completed an admission application through the TEALR office, attained a "C" or better in EDUC 2100 and SPED 2100, passed all three parts of the Praxis I test, and attained an overall GPA of at least 2.5 in at least 30 hours of coursework.
- 3. In accordance with legislation enacted in 1992 by the North Carolina General Assembly, the State Board of Governors had directed that undergraduates should enroll in at least 15 semester hours per term, thereby enabling a full-time student to complete a baccalaureate degree program in four years or the equivalent.
