Job Summary:

Under the direction of the Home Care Nurse and Community Health Worker, to assist clients with the activities of daily living to promote maximum independence in the community.

DUTIES:

1. Duties of the Personal Care Aide/Home Care Worker will vary according to the Care Plan that has been developed by the Home and Community Care Nurse/Community Health Worker.
2. Provide assistance with personal care; such as bathing, oral hygiene, toileting, dressing, grooming, mobilization and transferring and lifting when required.
3. Assist with the preparation of healthy meals; encourage and assist the client to eat when required.

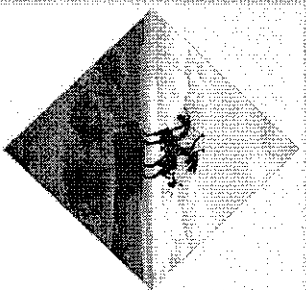
Endangered Coho

Due to current conservation concerns there will be no directed communal fisheries on the **threatened stocks of wild Interior Fraser Coho salmon** returning to the Adams Lake Band traditional territories. Individual fishers will be provided information recommending the same.

Mature coho are reddish on the sides, green on the back and head, often dark on belly. 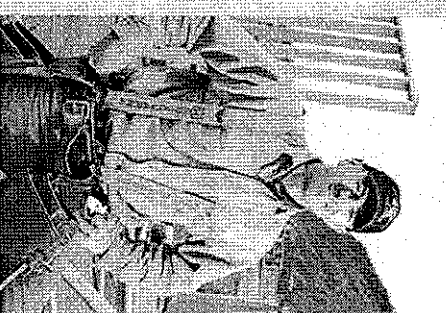

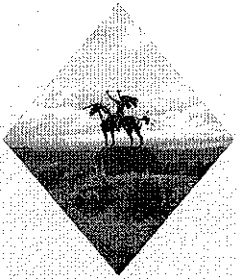

Highway dig uncovers artifacts

Band-led archeological assessment suggests one continuous heritage site, chief says

Every shell, bone fragment, arrowhead and stone that turns up in an archeological survey underway along the Trans-Canada Highway between Pritchard and Chase is being carefully recorded and preserved.

"Everything's significant," said Gord Moore, project manager for Terra Archaeology. "Archeology's like a puzzle and so that every artifact we find is another piece of the puzzle."

Work at the site began two weeks ago as Terra, hired by Sexeltkémé — the Lakes Division of the Secwepemc Nation — began mechanically stripping away land to reach subsurface levels.

Field technicians from the various bands involved — Neskonlith, Tk'emlups, Little Shuswap, Adams Lake and Splatine — comb through the excavations looking for any signs of human existence. They've found plenty so far.

The project was an unexpected complication of highway upgrading along the stretch, upgrades that initially were supposed to proceed two years ago.

Then, in 2009, human remains were found at a burial site discovered on a knoll next to the highway.

Those remains were carbon dated at 1649 AD, or prior to contact with Europeans.

That finding halted construction planning as First Nations set about negotiating a process

whereby ancestral remains, spiritual values and archeological work could be accommodated.

"We've been working on a government-to-government basis since 2009 to address concerns around ancestral remains because this corridor is a cradle of civilization in Secwepemc territory," said Chief Judy Wilson on a visit to the site Tuesday.

Extensive archeological work has been done in the past in the same area. Most notably, Gore Creek Man, at 8,200 years the oldest human remains found in Canada, was discovered on the opposite shore of the South Thompson River.

A partially completed oral history of the area needs more work and could take decades to assemble, Wilson said.

"We're learning as we go, through talks with the Ministry of Transportation and local government, so all of us have had to be very creative and very patient."

What is significant about this project is that it lays the groundwork for future archeological work in traditional Secwepemc territory extending from Monte Creek to the Alberta border, she noted.

"Basically, what we're finding is a continuous heritage site along the corridor."

Evidence found so far at the site includes a hand maul (a heavy hammer) about a foot in length — an uncommon find, says archeologist Moore; "diagnostic bi-

face, commonly known as arrowheads; deeply-based midden deposits, including freshwater mussel shells; and animal remains.

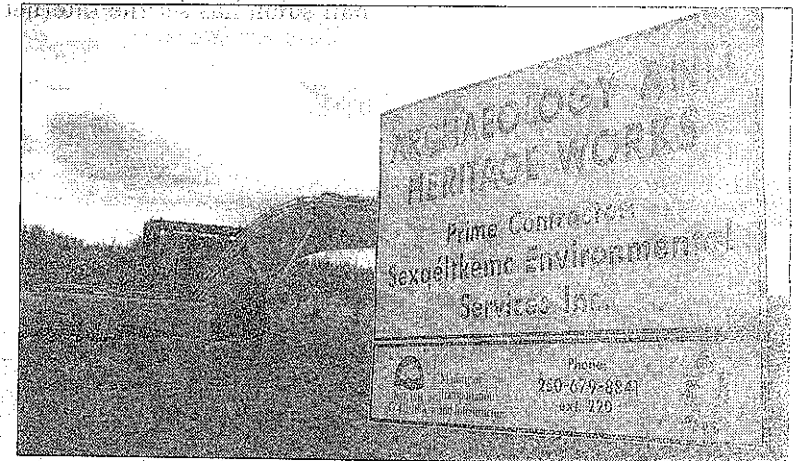
Indications are that the river, now about a half-kilometre away, rippled right past the knoll in ancient times.

Moore also pointed to a fist-sized chunk of rhyolite, a mineral used for tool-making that is not naturally found in the immediate area.

"In 15 years, I've never seen a cache of them like this," Moore said. "There's a huge source in the Arrowstone hills outside of Cache Creek. It's a very high likelihood this came from there."

The maul was not a tool that early residents would have left behind. Rather, it would have been handed down from generation to generation.

"When we approach archeolo-



gy, it's not just about artifacts," Wilson said. "More important are the spiritual values of the land, the stories, legends and historical accounts."

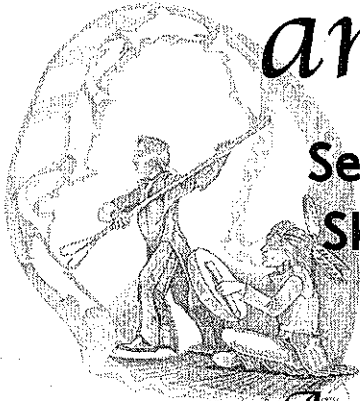
Their belief system is based on a continuum, meaning ancestral

remains must be held sacrosanct. "Our culture's alive. It's continuing in the past, present and future. To us, time isn't linear. It's all around us and our ancestors are still with us."

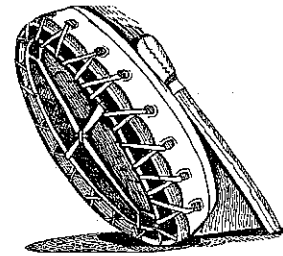

It is expected that every person using the bus will demonstrate a concern for safety and respect for their fellow passengers and their bus by observing the Code of Conduct as follows:

- 1) Riders shall arrive at least 5 minutes before bus departure times. Riders are to line up and enter the bus in an orderly manner.
- 2) Riders must remain seated and orderly at all times. Seats may be reassigned at the discretion of the driver and the Adams Lake Indian Band
- 3) **No eating of lunches and snacks shall be allowed.**
- 4) After disembarking, if riders need to cross the road from the designated stop, they shall do so three (3) meters in front of the stopped bus. Crossing the road behind the bus is dangerous and not permitted.
- 5) Small carry on items contained in an appropriate fashion and that can be easily accommodated on the lap of the rider may be taken on the school bus (i.e. items) that:
 - Are completely housed or contained in an approved case/container (i.e. backpack, sports bag)
 - Will not impede the safe use of the seat with fellow student(s)
 - Are lower then the seat in front
- 6) **Inappropriate behaviour will not be permitted, such as:** smoking and the lighting of fires. Matches or lighters, disrespect, inappropriate behaviour, and/or swearing.
- 7) The following will not be tolerated: transport of alcohol, drugs/narcotics or any illegal substances and being under the influence is strictly prohibited, also
- 8) **Students must provide their principal and/or bus driver with a written permission from their parent or guardian to ride a bus that they are not registered on or to disembark at a stop other than their normal location.**
- 9) Students shall abide by the same Code of Conduct as would be expected at their schools. As the bus is an extension of the Adams Lake Indian Band, the driver has the authority to discipline any student who misbehaves both to and from school that includes at or near a bus stop.
- 10) Students will be held responsible for willful damage to the school bus.

NOTE: Each driver has complete authority over his/her bus. Adams Lake Indian Band recognizes and supports the driver's authority over all passengers. **Parents or Guardians shall be advised of all cases of reported misbehaviour in writing to the Adams Lake Band.** Rights of Appeal are available to parents, guardians and students when a disciplinary action is initiated.
