Please join us on June 5, 2014 for a full day presentation by Dr. Perry on the Neurosequential Model of Therapeutics and its impact on children, families and the community.

Dr. Bruce Perry, MD, PhD

Dr. Bruce Perry is recognized internationally for his work on the effects of trauma and neglect on neurodevelopment. Over the last 30 years, Dr. Perry conducted both clinical and neuroscientific research on brain development and trauma, especially in children. Over the past ten years his research has focused on integrating emerging principles of neuroscience into clinical practice.

As the Senior Fellow at the ChildTrauma Academy in Houston, TX and adjunct Professor of Medicine at Northwestern University. Dr. Perry trains individuals and organizations worldwide based on the developmentally sensitive, neuro-biologically informed approach to clinical work (NMT) and education (NME). He is the author of hundreds of articles as well as several books, including *The Boy Who Was Raised as a Dog* and *Born for Love* (in collaboration with Maia Szalavitz).

A graduate of Stanford University and Amherst College, Dr. Perry received his M.D. and Ph.D. from Northwestern University. He completed a residency in psychiatry at Yale and a fellowship in Child and Adolescent Psychiatry at The University of Chicago.

NMT

The Neurosequential Model of Therapeutics (NMT) is a developmentally sensitive, neuro-biologically-informed approach to clinical problem solving. NMT integrates core principles of neurodevelopment and traumatology to inform work with children, families and communities. The Neurosequential approach has three key aspects: training/capacity building, assessment and then specific recommendations for the selection and sequencing of therapeutic, educational and enrichment activities that match individual needs.

Dysregulated individuals have difficulties benefiting from educational, caregiving and therapeutic efforts targeting the "higher" regions of the brain. The trauma-informed perspective provided through the use of NMT and the brain mapping process leads to interventions that are designed to replicate the normal sequencing of development, helping regulate and organize the brain's functioning.

By examining past and current experiences as well as functioning and assessing adverse experiences and relational health, an estimate of the timing and severity of developmental risk can be done. This information provides insight into how this has effected brain development. This leads the way for the creation of developmentally appropriate activities that help regulate and reorganize the brain.
