### **Music Notes:**

The composer of the Offertory Anthem, Daniel Gawthrop, was born in 1949 in Fort Wayne, IN. He has written works for a variety of instruments and voices, including choral anthems, orchestral works, and many others. *For This One Day*, composed with a text by Jane Griner, was commissioned by the Universalist National Memorial Church of Washington, D.C. The text offers a wonderful sense of hope and faith in times of need:

Lord, give us this day our daily bread; Manna, life, for this one day; Life enough for work and wonder, laughter, joy, and time for play. Love enough to lift the weary, feed the hungry, light the way, And when we thirst, grant Living Water pure and clear, Thy peace assure us. And when we fear, O Lord, do not leave us. When we fail, Lord, do not despair of us. When we see our might, make us count the stars. And when we tremble, Lord, Give us for this one day Thy grace, Thy peace, our daily bread.

Sarah Verasco is the Regional Minister for Fairfield County, serving the 40 churches that comprise the Fairfield East and Fairfield West Associations. The focus of Sarah's work includes local church transitions, resourcing congregational leaders, and providing pastoral support and care for clergy leaders. Sarah graduated from Union Theological Seminary in 2000 and served in three Connecticut congregations before accepting a call to join the Conference Staff. She came to ordained ministry after a meaningful career as a teacher and swimming coach, and a brief stint in the corporate world. These formative professional experiences have proven to be very useful in the varied roles and skills expected of clergy. Sarah was born and raised in New Jersey and currently lives in Fairfield. By changing policies, programs and conditions that allow hunger and poverty to persist, Bread for the World churches and members provide help and opportunity far beyond the communities in which they live.
- John P. Driscoll will give a talk on Bread for the World's effective advocacy on hunger issues. John is co-chair of the New York Advisory Board of Bread for the World. Also participating in the evening's program will be Bread for the World staff members Sarah Rohrer and Ed Hoyt.
