

The numeracy support team will continue to support our students in furthering their mathematical ability.





Community West Victoria Learning Link School Partnership Program

– an adult literacy program designed to be run within your school community.

This initiative commenced in January 2015 and we are very pleased that 4 schools have already partnered with Community West Victoria over the last 9 months. The education program has greatly benefitted the parents who have problems with English language and literacy, addressed the challenges schools face engaging with parents because of language or cultural barriers and improved parent participation in school activities.

Community West Victoria is a non-profit multi-program agency servicing Melbourne suburbs with a greater focus on the City of Brimbank, City of Melton and Bacchus Marsh.

We deliver a range of early intervention and prevention programs including Adult Education Programs, Family Support Programs, Community Engagement and Development Activities and Legal Programs.

Our adult education program will focus on delivering English as an Additional Language (EAL), a fully accredited course funded by the Victorian Training Guarantee (VTG) Program.

The program is offered to parents within the school premises and can be organised at a convenient time (preferably during school hours). Upon completion of the course, the parents will be able to obtain a fully Accredited Certificate or Statement of Attainment which can be used towards their employability and/or further studies. Parents have to meet the VTG eligibility guidelines before enrolment. These eligibility guidelines will be discussed at the information session.

The outcomes of the "Community West Victoria Learning Link School Partnership Program" include:

- Improved relations with parents who have limited English language skills;
 - Parents from emerging communities are supported to integrate into the school community and participate in their children's education; and
- Support the parents to participate in community activities and address social isolation

This provides a great opportunity for you to hear from parents currently participating in the program, Community West teachers and other school representatives.

Student Accident Insurance

Parents/carers are reminded that the Department does not provide personal accident insurance for students. Parents and guardians are responsible for paying the cost of medical treatment for injured students, including any transport costs.

Student accident insurance policies are available from some commercial insurers. These cover a range of medical expenses not covered by Medicare or private health insurance.

DEECD Rules About Student Attendance At School

The Department of Education and Early Childhood Development has introduced rules and laws governing student attendance at school. They came into effect on March 1, 2014. We thought it worthwhile to communicate the changes to our community.

Normal parental responsibilities have not changed noticeably and are as per Copperfield College's Attendance Policy which is in the student diary.

The one exception is that the Principal determines whether the reasons provided for non-attendance are reasonable. And if they are deemed not to be, further referrals take place.

Initially the school will explore ways to support the student to attend school; this may include referrals to outside agencies. Should this not be successful a referral can be made to the newly appointed departmental Student Attendance Officers.

Once a referral has been made to this level a process will be put in place which may involve some or all of the following:

- Sending a School Attendance Notice home, which requires a response.
- Assessing of the parent/carer response

- Deciding whether to issue an Infringement Notice
- Sending an Infringement Notice
- Bringing proceedings in Court.

We hope parents/carers can appreciate these rules are being brought in to further maximize your child's attendance at school.

Author Visit: Will Kostakis

Australian novelist Will Kostakis, travelled from his hometown in Sydney to inspire all Year 7 students and teachers. Kostakis humorously taught students and staff about the process of writing and told the audience a tale about his journey as a writer. The audience was forever laughing at Kostakis' jokes and stories, ensuring that his audience wasn't left staring out the window and despite the effervescent fun, there was a meaningful moral at the end of every story.

Kostakis' journey began in grade 6 when his teacher recommended Gary Paulsen's novel *Hatcchet* to read. His teacher quoted "It will speak to you" however Kostakis didn't fully understand the storyline. Instead, when it was time to read the book in class, Kostakis wrote a short story of his own. This was when Kostakis stated "give your characters a problem but the tools to solve it." After being read by classmates and mistakenly put in the hands of the teacher, a short 300 word story was formed. This was a big achievement for an 11 year old boy which then inspired Kostakis' writing career.

Throughout high school, Kostakis wrote many other novels, some being twice the size of *Harry Potter and the Order of the Phoenix* by J.K Rowling. Kostakis posted numerous stories to major publishing companies, however, received rejection letters in return.

"The moral of this story is to persevere. Work towards your goals and dreams and let your friends, family and teachers help you on the way." Kostakis stated. In this moment, Kostakis' story inspired and changed the perspective of his speech. The students realised that it was up to them to work hard and to chase their dreams.

Kostakis' career journey speech was inspiring and left the audience not only energised from

laughter but with the realisation that we must not let anyone get in the way of our dreams. As students, we must be persistent to get where we want to be. Like Kostakis said, we are never too young to start knocking.



Content of Program:

This is a part-time program which normally takes two years to complete. For the first semester, classes will be held weekly on Thursday afternoons. For the balance of the program, classes will be held fortnightly.

The centre has the sewing machines, but it is also good if you own a sewing machine to practice at home

As this is a Government subsidised program, you must be eligible to enrol in the program. Therefore, to be eligible, you would not have an existing certificate III or higher qualification. You can however be currently enrolled in another program (at any level).


