President's Message

School Board Chairman Llryong Moon and Braddock District School Board member Megan McLaughlin will be our guest speakers; they'll bring us up to date on what's happening with our school system. Understanding the status and needs of the school system is important since we are now entering the annual budget cycle. Over the next two months the Board of Supervisors will finalize their spending plan and set the tax rates and fees we'll pay for FY15 which begins July 1, 2014.

Fairfax County Executive Edward L. Long was scheduled to present a multi-year FY 2015 and 2016 budget plan at the Feb. 25, 2014 Board of Supervisors meeting. Fairfax County Public Schools (FCPS) Superintendent Karen K. Garza has release her proposed budget. Fairfax County is facing budget shortfalls in both FY 2015 and 2016 due to increasing FY spending requirements. The Fairfax County School Board has adopted the FY 2015 Advertised Budget of \$2.5 billion, a net increase of 2.4 percent, or \$59.4 million, from the FY 2014 Approved The FY 2015 budget includes Budget. reductions of \$96.5 million that would be achieved, in part, by eliminating 731.2 positions.

Traffic Issues

We have received a number of complaints regarding speeding on Jervis Street between Heming Avenue and Ravensworth Road and illegal U-turns at the intersection of Jervis Street and Ravensworth Road. We have spoken with the community liaison officer at the Franconia Police Station and they have agreed to increase patrols on Jervis Street and Ravensworth Road; particularly during rush hour periods.

The posted speed limit on all the streets in our community is 25 MPH. We are a relatively crowded residential community; there are a number of cars parked curbside which reduces visibility for those backing out of their driveways; in places it can be difficult for cars going in opposing directions to pass one another; and we have a number of children and adults walking in the neighborhood. Speeding exacerbates this congestion and significantly increases the risk of an accident.

Making U-turns on residential streets is illegal regardless of how wide the street is. Other drivers do not anticipate such maneuvers; again, significantly increasing the possibility of an accident.

Clean Streets Initiative – Trash and junk can only be placed at the curb if you have a service coming to collect it and no earlier than the night before collection. The county is working on ways to address violators.

Recycling – All trash services in Fairfax County are required to pick up items for recycling. However, all services do not collect all the same items. For example, AAA does not accept pizza boxes or aluminum foil, American does; none accept things like wax covered paper, Styrofoam, glass or metal house wares, dishes or glasses, ceramics, light bulbs, batteries clothing or tires. Be sure to check with your service to see what they process; put everything else in the trash. Adding trash to your recycling only raises the cost of the service because the company has to separate it out and dispose of it.

Fairfax County Website – The county website www.fairfaxcounty.gov has a wealth of information for residents including all the rules, complaint forms and where to go for services. Check out Electric Sundays; days when you can recycle unwanted TVs and electronic at the 4618 West Ox Road facility.

Wild Animals

Residents are reminded not to feed the wild animals in our community; it is against county law. Food attracts all animals; not just the cute ones for whom you intend it. Deer and rabbits that will eat all our greenery; mice and rats that will find their way into our homes; and foxes which may prey upon our small pets.

Growing Older?

If you're not please tell us your secret. If you are the county has a program that may interest you -Villages: Age-in-Place Supported Communities.

What is a Village? The Village concept is a growing grassroots movement that aims to provide the support that older adults may require when choosing to age-in-place. The idea is simple: neighbor helping neighbor. Villages help older adults stay in their communities by helping to coordinate and deliver services and support within their communities.

How does it work? Village organizers, who are typically ages 50 and older, create volunteer programs for seniors in their communities as well as vet and negotiate with service providers to assist older adults in their homes. A broad range of services may be available, including rides to medical appointments, discounts at local theaters, reliable home repair services, and home health care. Many Villages also offer social activities and informational seminars for their members.
