

Kandiyohi County Farmers Union Scholarship

Description: The Kandiyohi County Farmers Union will offer scholarships in the following categories: Freshman and Continuing/Non-Traditional Student. At least one \$250.00 scholarship will be given in each category, depending on merit.

Eligibility: Scholarships will be awarded to members or children of Kandiyohi County Farmers Union members who are under age 21. All areas of study or majors will be considered. Freshman and Continuing Students must be enrolled full-time in a post secondary school. Non-Traditional Students (student's over the age of 25) must be enrolled at least ½ time. Recipients are required to submit an unofficial transcript upon completion of the first semester to receive their scholarship funds.
