Me & My Shadow, As Close as Can Be

One day in early spring a little black cat came strolling in through Diane Tabor's cat door in Port Orchard, seeking friends, attention and snacks. The young tomcat was so sweet and gentle that Diane wanted to keep him. She and her husband, Frank, had lost their 17-year-old Siamese, Sammy, a few months earlier. But Frank had recently had hernia surgery and was not ready to add a fifth critter to their household, particularly since one of their present four companions was a rather assertive little Eclectus parrot.

Diane went through her neighborhood knocking on doors to see if anyone knew about the stray kitty, but no one had heard of a missing cat and there were no fliers posted in the area. So she called her daughter, Danelle, in Bremerton. However Danelle had just suffered an incidence of Bell's palsy, which causes extremely sudden partial paralysis of half of the facial muscles for a transitory time (generally up to a year). With two young

sons in the house, she just didn't think she could afford additional bills at the time, though she had a great yard for the kitty to play in and loved cats.

later, Diane was talking
to a friend
about finding
a home
for the

kitty, when the friend suggested that the Peninsula Spay/Neuter Project might be able to help out. Diane donated \$50 to PSNP towards the cost of the kitty's neuter surgery, and the helpful PSNP volunteer even picked up the cat and delivered him to his new home with Danelle in Bremerton. The kitty loved his new family right from the start, and he was named Shadow because he followed everyone around.

When I visited a month later, as a pet photographer, I was surprised to find such an extraordinarily cooperative kitty. Not only was I able to get good photos of Shadow in the first few minutes, but he went up to each of his family members, especially Zack the Pirate (age 8), getting and giving loves all around. Shadow clearly adored his new family and had made himself right at home, even hanging out when Danelle's partner, Matt, holds band practice in the living room! His favorite game is playing ball with Thomas (age 10), who tosses a ball for Shadow to catch and roll back! He loves to exchange loves with his new family, and they were sincerely grateful to PSNP for helping this incredibly sweet kitty find a happy new home.

Since we first told you about our goal to start a Humane Alliance model spay/neuter clinic in Pierce County, we have been busy! In order to start such a clinic, we need to raise \$200,000. We are happy to announce that we are half way to our goal, thanks to a very generous \$20,000 challenge grant offer presented by Don & Eleanor Vandenheuvel, and we are confident that we can meet it! These caring individuals have been supporters of both PSNP and the Humane Society for many years.

Our priority for the time being is fundraising, as well as increasing awareness of this project in the community. We've been fortunate to have talented volunteers design fliers, brochures, posters and other promotional materials for this purpose. And "Dine to be Kind" was so well received that we will offer it annually. PSNP volunteers have also been working to identify and apply for potential grant funding from various sources both locally and nationwide.

Coalition members have been busy conducting microchipping clinics, staffing outreach events and present-

ing programs at service clubs around the area. This activity will continue with a flurry during the summer months. We hope to see you in person as we are out and about this summer. If you see us, please stop by to say hello!

PS – We are often asked about the appearance of the word "HUMAnE" in our coalition's name. Some of you may know the answer to this riddle, which can be found in the six-year-old history of PSNP. The original name of the organization, which is still on file with the IRS, is "Humans United to Minimize Animal Euthanasia". The acronym fits the word "HUMAnE" with the exception of the "n" in the word animal, thus the altered letter "n".

Dine to be kind

The first annual "Dine to be Kind" was held on June 21. Local restaurants and clubs offered a percentage from the day's sales to the Coalition: HUMAnE clinic fund. Coalition volunteers greeted diners and shared information about the need for a full-time spay/neuter clinic in Pierce County. DTBK committee chair Patty Rusnak stated, "This year's donations will be used to help open the clinic, with subsequent years' funding being used for continued support as needed for other programs." A special thanks to the Spar Tavern, Harmon Brewery, Babblin' Babs Bistro, The Ram in Lakewood, and Club Sapphire for opening their hearts and cash registers to help save animal lives. How excellent to see spay/neuter covered on a national stage like that!

Stay Tuned

For developments related to California Assembly Bill 1634, aka the California Healthy Pets Act. This controversial bill would require spay/neuter for most cats and dogs six months and older in the state of California. While we support the intent of the legislation, we would feel better if the mechanics of the legislation were spelled out more clearly for instance including a provision to provide quality low-cost spay/neuter clinics in areas where they're most needed.

This bill will likely have been voted on in committee by the time this newsletter reaches you. If it passes, then it'll move to the full assembly docket. If not, it dies in committee. You can check updates at the official AB1634 website at www.cahealthypets.com/home.htm. If nothing else, this bill has generated some great discussion and interest in companion animal overpopulation.

Keep Your Eyes Open

Especially if you live in rural parts of Washington where people are known to abandon animals. In the last Washington State Legislative Session, Senate Bill 5227 was passed which upgrades the penalty for animal abandonment from a misdemeanor to a gross misdemeanor. While that's not quite the "life in a Turkish prison with no hope for escape/parole/etc" that we were urging, it's at least a move in the right direction.

Next time you see someone dump a dog from a car at the end of Herron Road or any of our other notorious dumping sites, be sure to get a license plate number and call your local authorities. While the chances are that home probably wasn't the best one for Fido or Fluffy, at least you can give these people a little of what they deserve.

Thanks to our own State Senator Derek Kilmer for co-sponsoring this legislation.


