Welcome to St. Elizabeth Ann Seton

Register in the Parish In order that we may better serve you, please register in the parish. This way you are known to us when requesting the services of the church. Registration forms are available in the gathering space of the church or in the gift shop.

Sacrament of Baptism Baptisms for infants and children up to 7 years of age are celebrated on Sundays during Mass or on the 1st & 3rd Sundays at 1:45pm. Parents should attend the baptism class on the first Tuesday of the month at 7:00 pm in the Church and register in the parish.

Sacrament of Matrimony At least one party must be a registered, participating member of the parish for at least 4 months. A 6 month minimum time period is needed to complete the marriage preparation requirements. The first step is for both parties to attend the marriage preparation class on the third Tuesday of the month at 7:00 p.m. in Room 2 of the Church. If either party was married before, he or she is to make an appointment to speak with a priest prior to attending the class.

Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick Call the parish office at any time if you need to receive the anointing of the sick. In case of hospitalization, let the hospital staff know that you would like to have one of the Catholic priest chaplains see you.

Holy Communion to the Sick If you are at home, please call Tom & Patty (285-5573) and an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion will visit you. In case of hospitalization, inform the admissions department that you are a Catholic and would like to receive Communion.

Mass Intentions Mass requests are scheduled through the parish office during office hours. If a specific date is desired, please schedule as far in advance as possible.

Funerals In the event of a death of a loved one, please contact the Funeral Ministry at 403-8416 BEFORE making arrangements with any of the professional services. Pre-planning is available.

House Blessings For those who live in our area, house blessings are available by appointment. Please register in the parish before requesting your house to be blessed.

A Stewardship Moment

In today's second reading we listen to one of the most compelling exhortations for Christian living: "Whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him" (Col 3:17). "Whatever you do"---that means the whole of life is to be related to Christ Jesus. Everything in life, every activity, can become an act of glorifying the Lord. Good stewards commit even their daily routine to Christ: doing everything "in the name of the Lord." Perhaps it would be a good idea this week to memorize this marvelous verse and repeat it to yourself frequently. Make it part of your morning prayer each day.

Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph

Subordinate Clause

The second reading today has both a long form and a short form. The short one omits the verses about wives being subordinate to their husbands. That verse offends many women (and men smart enough to agree with their wives). St. Paul, of course, meant no offense. In fact, he saw men and women as equals in the eyes of the Lord (Galatians 3:28). Remember that after Paul lists the qualities of a Christian, he tells us that love is the most important. What he recommends for wives, husbands, and children is based on that love. Think of how you would do anything for someone you love. That is the kind of subordination Paul is talking about.

Look at how those last verses apply to the Holy Family. Mary loved Joseph enough to go with him to Bethlehem for the census. She trusted him enough to go to Egypt based on his dream message from the angel. When a later dream warned him to return to Galilee instead of Judea, Mary went along with it. Her faith and love gave her the freedom to be "subordinate" to Joseph.



Joseph rose and took the child and his mother by night and departed for Egypt. — Matthew 2:14

Joseph did not treat Mary as his property. He loved and trusted her enough to take her into his home when he learned she was pregnant. He raised Jesus and taught him to be a carpenter (Mark 6:3). And even Jesus "went down with them and came to Nazareth, and was obedient to them" (Luke 2:51).

Today's feast is part of the Christmas season. It shows us how God became one of us, even to the extent of sharing the joys and troubles of family life. As members of the body of Christ, we can try to see Christ in our own families--in the joys we share, in the pains of growing up, in the miracle of new life. St. Paul also tells us to be grateful; perhaps one of the best ways to give thanks to God is in the love we show to our closest relatives. Tom Schmidt, Copyright (c) J. S. Paluch Co.

The Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy

Since the Second Vatican Council, parishioners have been encouraged to sing the texts of the liturgy. Much of the music of the liturgy is based on Scripture, and thus on the words and life of Christ. Music expresses the faith of the Church, but also builds unity and harmony. Singing and praying requires the use of our lungs, the breath that comes out of our being. Breath is an ancient word for the Spirit. When we pray and sing, the Spirit given to us in Baptism flows through us, empowering our words and music with Christ's presence. When members of the Church pray and sing, their words are infused with Christ's words. It is indeed Christ, present in the action of singing and prayer, who takes our prayers to God. Catechesis of the Good Shepherd

The Program

The Catechesis of the Good Shepherd (CGS) is an approach to the religious formation of children that is rooted in the Bible, the Liturgy of the Catholic Church, and the self-teaching educational principles of Dr. Maria Montessori. This method of nurturing the faith life of children evolved from children themselves. Beginning in Rome in 1954, CGS is the result of a long period of careful observation of children by Dr. Sofia Cavalletti, a Hebrew and Scripture scholar, along with Gianna Gobbi, her Montessori collaborator.

Level I, II and III

There are three levels of Catechesis of the Good Shepherd beginning with the Level I atrium for children ages 3– kindergarten. The Level I work revolves around the Parable of the Good Shepherd.



Children spend three years enjoying and nurturing a relationship with the Good Shepherd. Many are deeply affected by the endless love of the Shepherd for his sheep.



Level II is for children ages 6 -9(grades 1-3). The children deepen their understanding of Catholic identity, while the parables bring the children closer to the moral teachings of the Catholic Church. In Level III, 9-12 year-olds (grades 4-6) listen to the Old Testament, following the history of God's plan for salvation, linking all people together in communion. They begin to ask, "What is the Reign of God, and what is my place in it?" It is a primary question which lays the foundation for a lifetime commitment to God.

Training for Catechists

This course is designed to attune participants to the religious life of the 3-6 year old child and to provide specific methods and materials to foster the faith formation of this age group. Each Level builds on each other and Level I is the foundation for Level II and III.

Stewardship



Generosity



You are called into one body. Bear with one another; forgive one another; let Christ's peace control you (Colossians 3:12-21 [12-17]). With all the giving taking place this month I felt it an opportune occasion to reflect on the virtue of generosity – one of the hallmarks of Christian stewardship. Authentic generosity is born out of the virtue of gratitude, and we in North America certainly have much for which to be grateful. In fact, we do well to always and everywhere give thanks to God, because all that we

possess is his gift. When we are grateful to God we are inspired to give, not out of a sense of obligation or duty, but because giving is one way we can say thank you to God.

For generosity to be authentic it needs to be sacrificial and at the same time joyful. We need to give up something! Giving what we do not need is nice; but, it is not necessarily being generous. Sacrifice means that we give out of our own need and not simply from what is left over. When we sacrifice it makes the generous act more joyful because by saying no to something that we need or want, we are able to say yes to the greater good. There is nothing more life-giving than knowing that someone less fortunate is benefiting from your sacrifice. Whether you are giving your time or money, when the virtue of gratitude is behind the gift, the spirit of joy will naturally accompany the generous act. Joy makes the generous act mutually beneficial – joy shared is joy multiplied. Without joy, neither the giver nor the one receiving the gift will experience any benefit. Imagine giving, but doing it reluctantly or under compulsion; you would not be very motivated because there is no joy there. Joy is found inside an attitude of gratitude.

A simple formula for authentic generosity could be – share ten percent, save ten percent, spend eighty percent, in that order. I call it the 10-10-80 lifestyle. When we live well within our means we cultivate an acute awareness of our abundant blessings and this creates the desire, and the confidence, to share our gifts with authentic generosity. In gratitude our generosity is then rooted in our needing to give rather than giving to a need. This article is part six in a series of 12 reflections on stewardship virtues by ICSC member, Dan Potvin, Director of Stewardship for the Archdiocese of Winnipeg, Canada.
