Members will receive a statement 45 days before their membership expires. (Your renewal month is found on your mailing label.) The dues renewal date is the last day of the month in which members' "annual date" falls. Members' gate card will automatically "lock out" on their renewal date if they have not renewed, and their membership will be considered "inactive" for 30-days, during which time they may still pay their dues. After 30-days on "inactive" status the membership will be terminated. Should they wish to rejoin CCR&P past the 30-days "inactive" status, they must reapply as a new member and attend the Orientation class. (All Life memberships are required to pay the \$15/member annual insurance fee.)

Capitol City Rifle & Pistol Club Board of Directors Meeting May 6, 2005 Meeting began at 7:03 PM <u>Flag Salute</u>



<u>Attendance</u> - Jim Dotterer called the roll. All directors were present except the following: Steve Andrews, Mike Iyall, Jim Greeves, Tom Holladay, Ron Morton, Jerry Rheault, Will Ulry and Bill Wright.

Treasurer's Report - There was no Treasurer's report.

<u>Membership</u> - Jim Dotterer reported total membership is 399. He noted that CCRP is gaining new members as it is losing "old" members for a net change of zero. Bob G. reported that, based on their <u>telephone</u> area codes, some new members live a greater distance from the club than was previously the case. In particular, he mentioned one new member whose <u>home</u> is in Seattle. He also noted that CCRP's presence at gun shows is producing more new members than we gained from participating in the county fairs.

Web Site - Jim D. reported that CCRP is receiving favorable comments regarding its new web site.

<u>Problem at Main Door</u> - Jim D. relayed Will Ulry's report of another tripping incident at the main (large) door to the club house involving a parent of one of the Hunter's Ed students. Will suggested that the door either be kept closed, requiring that the other door be used, or that the trough be covered with a wooden "bridge" for that portion of the door that is opened. Jim encouraged whoever has the wood to construct such a bridge but, also to paint it with stripes to catch people's attention.

Gun Show - Rich Montecucco reported that a few members have staffed the gun show booth several times. He would like to see other members participate. He has prepared some notes outlining how to prepare the booth.

<u>Reducing Need for Paper Plinker</u> - Darrell Gehlsen described how easy it is to switch from receiving a paper Plinker to getting it at the club's web site thereby saving the club money.

<u>Standing Rules</u> - Shirley Rheault and John Cadoo presented further sections of the S.R. Included were "Range Operations", "Club Property", "Legislative Affairs" and the job description for Director of Calendar Scheduling. Following considerable discussion several items were changed. Under "Club Property", # 1 now reads "Prohibited items or actions . .

.", "Rifles firing .50 caliber BMG" will be replaced by "firing .50 caliber BMG" and "except with written permission of the Executive Committee" will be replaced by "except with an approved Event Application"; #13 local bum bans" is replaced by "local burn bans."

Under "Club Property" the firewood provisions, #15 through #18, will revert to those originally drafted by the committee and under "Range Operations" #8, the portion "Upon application" through "satisfactory membership status" was moved to "Club Operations" and, as yet, is not approved. "Legislative Affairs" and the "Director of Calendar Scheduling" job description were approved without change. (Note: When all changes to the Standing Rules have been approved, they will be published on the club's web site).

<u>Club House Situation</u> - Jim D. said that he had not yet received estimates on reroofing the clubhouse but, expected to have them soon. Shirley R. asked Jim to arrange for having the club's sign, by the highway, scrubbed. Ray C. said that the club needs to be realistic about the costs entailed in reroofing the clubhouse. Darrell G. pointed out that directors need to act on the roofing job, not just talk about it. Bob G. offered a motion: do we want to repair the roof? The motion was seconded and passed by a one vote majority. Shirley offered a motion that the club solicit bids for both a new roof on the existing clubhouse and on a new clubhouse. The motion was seconded and passed.

<u>Entry Road Repair</u> - Bob G. provided a "ball park" estimate for repair costs of \$12,000 (\$3,600 for paving and \$8,000 for grading). Jim D. asked Bob to pursue getting a firm estimate. Bob pointed out that the club would likely need to provide the contractor(s) with 30 days of lead time. Considerable discussion followed as to possible ways to stave off the road repairs but, none of the approaches discussed were satisfactory.

<u>Budget</u> - Jim D. indicated that he will identify all the fixed costs (insurance, taxes, etc.) that the club faces and provide these for the June meeting.

<u>Money Market Withdrawal</u> - Since the club is facing major expenditures for clubhouse reroofing and road repair, several directors wondered how <u>money</u> may be withdrawn from the <u>money</u> market account. Jim D. said that he will get that information

<u>Roof Demolition</u> - Ray C. reminded directors that the costs of licenses for and removing and disposing of shingles and other old roofing materials must be included in the roof repair estimates.



Uncle Jim D's Helpful Hints

Today's subject: "Bounce" fabric softener sheets

Fabric softener sheets have more uses than being used in your dryer. Here are some ideas that us guys might find interesting:

- 1. Rub one on the outside of the plastic powder measure tube of your reloading equipment and it will remove the static charge.
- 2. Throw a used sheet in the tumbler to help polish your brass casings.
- 3. Troubles with musty smells in your hunting RV? Place unused fabric sheets in several areas inside the RV. (This only lasts a short while and should be replaced about once a week.) This also works in boats and other closed areas.
- 4. Rainy day cure for wet dog odor... Next time your dog comes in from the rain, simply wipe down the animal with a dryer sheet, instantly making your dog smell springtime fresh.
- 5. Rub a dryer sheet on your skin for an instant mosquito repellant. Don't know what kind of chemicals you might absorb into your skin, but the insects don't want to get it on themselves and will leave you alone.
- 6. Put in an area to repel spiders and mice. (They don't want to get it on themselves either.) This works for a short time.
- 7. about twice a year. The fabric softener chemicals begin to collect on the screen which reduces the air flow. You can cut maybe 20 minutes off your drying time on a load of clothes by cleaning the screen.
